FRUIT NEN RESOLVE FOR THE UNIVERSITY

The program for the horticultural meeting at the courthouse Saturday night was carried out as advertised and the addresses all proved very interesting. Another interesting feature was the question box. Numerous questions pertaining to the growing of fruit were asked and answers given by the speakers and others present.

Before the close of the meeting M. H. Harlow offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted:

Whereas, Efforts are being made to misrepresent the issue of the University of Oregon appropriation, which issue comes up before the people next June; and

Whereas, The amount appropriated for the State University, instead of being exorbitant, is decidedly small compared with the amounts spent for the same purposes in our sister states; therefore be it

Resolved, That we horticulturists of Lane county, assembled in mass meeting under the auspices of the Lane County Horticultural Association and the Eugene Commercial Club, this 4th day of January, 1908, at the county courthouse, Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, that we place ourselves on record as being heartily in favor of the appropriation; and be it further

Resolved, That we earnestly request our fellow horticulturists throughout the state of Oregon to study the question impartially and then act for the best interests of the educational system of the state of Oregon.

S. P. BRIDGE NEAR COBURG COMPLETED

The Southern Pacific bridge across the McKenzie river near Coburg has been entirely completed and the crew and outfit were in Eugene today on their way to Portland. The Eugene-Coburg train brought the work cars and other paraphernalia over to the main line and the first freight train going north took them on toward Portland. The bridge is a splendid structure and replaced an old wooden one that did service for many years. When the recent financial flurry came on the company ordered work on the bridge stopped, along with the curtailment of a great deal of other work, but in a week or two afterward the crew was ordered back to finish the bridge, as it was very near completion.

ROSS NOW READY TO ASSIST BANK

President Ross, of the defunct Title bank, offers to turn over his own estate for payment of depositors, now that W. M. Ladd has agreed to guarantee the bank's indebtedness.

The text of Ladd's agreement has been drafted by District Attorney Manning and submitted to Ladd's attorneys.

Mr. Ladd has not reached an agreement with the American Surety Company. His friends deny that he is trying to shun such an agreement.

According to the text of the depositors' agreement, the surety company will get from Ladd the \$100,000 which it has paid the state and the \$295,910 which it has promised to pay the state in two years with five per cent interest, in three years with four per cent interest. The surety company wants better terms.

Attorney W. C. Bristol, representing the surety company and state, yesterday petitioned Judge Wolverton to order Receiver Myers to restore the state school money, \$288,000, dollar for dollar, as a trust fund, "prior to the payment of money to any other individual," and to defer until this matter shall be determined distribution of \$34,000 trust funds, which the receiver has asked the court to authorize.

Judge Wolverton deferred decision in the matter until January 19.—Oregonian.

WILDEST STORMS IN DECADES ALONG COAST

Siletz, Or., Jan. 2.—This winter has seen the most severe storms along the Oregon coast experienced here since white men have made their habitations in this part of the state. Extraordinary high winds have prevailed at different times and electrical storms have been of exceptional violence. A short time ago the winds one night reached a velocity of over 90 miles an hour and the flashes of lightning followed each other with such rapidity as to make the night lurid, the thunder meanwhile rolling incessantly and with great violence. In many cases large trees were uprooted as though they were weeds growing in loose soil and in some places quite a little damage was done to standing timber by lightning, as well as by the high winds.

OCEAN LINER ARRIVES IN PORT LONG OVERDUE

Queenstown, Jan. 7.—The long overdue Canadian Pacific steamer Mount Royal steamed slowly into Queenstown harbor today. News of her arrival was received with gladness in shipping circles. Shortly after leaving the British coast for Canadian ports she encountered a series of storms, but battled bravely for two weeks until some trouble with her boilers developed, when it was determined to make for the Irish coast. She refused assistance from a tug.

All her 400 passengers are reported well.

WHAT CHEMICAL WORKS HAS DONE

Editor Guard:—We received from January 1st, to December 31, 1907, 144 dead animals; paid for tanning and cash to order the sum of \$87.60.

Before we were here parties so unfortunate as to lose one of those animals were obliged to pay from \$1 to \$2 for the removal of same, and some times even more, also from \$2 to \$3 for burial, so we saved those unfortunate people the sum of \$360, besides advancing in cash for same \$87.60, a total of \$447.60.

We cleaned all the slaughter houses in the surrounding country, which, before we came here, were in a terrible shape, and helped greatly to pollute water and air in Lane county, besides being a great annoyance to the board of health.

Out of the refuse we manufactured 31,840 pounds of chicken feed, a better cleaner and certainly right fresh from the factory, and sold the same in Lane, Linn and Douglas counties at 30 to 50 per cent lower than the imported stuff was sold for.

Paid out for labor, machinery, more buildings, necessary living, etc., in fact, every dollar kept and spent at home, which before we came here of the money forwarded for said goods never a dollar found its way back to Eugene.

We also manufactured 203 gallons neatfoot and animal oil, 17,000 pounds of skid grease for logging purposes, and tallow forwarded to our connection 137,000 pounds of bone in the rough, also horns, gluestock, etc. All these goods were manufactured into useful articles, which called for lots of labor, and for all such labor we always have and always will pay spot cash after performed.

We also manufactured 23,800 pounds of fertilizer for lawn and agricultural purposes, but were obliged to send some out of the state. It would have done more good at home.

City Recorder Dorris stated to a reporter today that there are a number of bids for the bonds, most of the offered by local capitalists.

GIRL ATTEMPTS TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Hattie Chapman, aged about 20 years and employed as a waitress in the Blue Front restaurant, attempted to suicide yesterday afternoon by swallowing about half an ounce of carbolic acid. She left the restaurant during the afternoon and went to her room in the Holden building across the street. An hour or two later she was wanted and some one went over to the room to call her, but found the door locked. Later the odor of carbolic acid was noticed in the room and entrance was made through a window. The girl was found lying on the bed in an unconscious condition with the bottle of acid half empty by her side. Dr. McDougall was called and he administered the usual remedies. Late in the night she regained consciousness and today she is much better, and will probably recover. She will say nothing as to the cause of her rash act and it is not known why she did it. Her mother, who lives at Elmira, is with her today.

JAPANESE RESERVES ARE NOT BEING CALLED HOME

Washington, Jan. 6.—Mr. Miyakoshi, in charge of the Japanese embassy here, today authorized a formal denial of the report from Vancouver, B.C., that the Japanese government is recalling to Japan its reserve men now in the United States, and that he had not the least intimation of any such purpose on the part of the Japanese government. Moreover, a call to return to Japan of the reservists would necessarily be preceded a considerable time by the mobilization of the reserve now in Japan.

TAFT FAVORS MORE PAY FOR THE ARMY

Washington, Jan. 6.—Secretary Taft is a strong advocate of increased pay for the army, and his annual report just sent to congress dispels any doubt that may exist as to his disposition. The report shows a rapid decrease in the strength of the army, the loss last year having been 428 men, and the pressing need for officers to replace those now detailed on recruiting duty and as military instructors in educational institutions. The secretary declares that the inadequacy of army pay is one of the reasons for the falling off in enlistments.

WILLIAMSON'S ACQUITTAL SEEMS ALMOST CERTAIN

Portland, Jan. 7.—In the light of the supreme court's decision of yesterday Congressman Williamson's acquittal, when his case comes on again for retrial, seems almost certain.

The conviction and punishment of Dr. Van Gesner and Marion Biggs, who were co-defendants with Williamson, seems, in the light of the decision, to have been unmarred.

Dr. Van Gesner was but recently released from the county jail of Multnomah county, after undergoing a sentence of five months' imprisonment and paying a fine of \$1000. Marion R. Biggs is still in the same jail, under sentence of ten months' imprisonment and \$500 fine.

Sentenced by Hunt.

The conviction of Williamson, Biggs and Van Gesner occurred September 27, 1905, on their third trial. They were sentenced by Judge Hunt October 14, 1905. Each of the earlier trials resulted in a hung jury. Francis J. Heney was the prosecutor and the defendants were represented by Judge Bennett, of The Dalles, and Judge Wilson.

The three defendants were accused of inducing various persons in Crook county to take up claims, which, it was charged, they afterward agreed before final proof to sell to Williamson and Van Gesner. Scores of witnesses were called from Crook county and other parts of the state, and an army of special agents was employed in watching the jury, the defendants, their attorneys and the witnesses.

The conclusion of the supreme court is that a contract of sale made by the entryman after he has filed his application for the entry, but before he has made his final proof, is not a violation of the federal land laws. In view of this ruling, a number of the land fraud cases now pending must probably be dismissed, as the same state of facts exists in them as in the Williamson case. It is possible also that the decision may affect the case of W. N. Jones and Thaddeus Potter, who were convicted, but whose cases are now on appeal.

WILLIAMSON WINS APPEAL TO SUPREME COURT

Washington, Jan. 6.—The case against former Congressman Williamson, of Oregon, charged with unlawfully taking up public lands in Crook county, Oregon, in conspiracy with one hundred others, was decided by the supreme court in favor of Williamson. The United States court for Oregon imposed a fine of \$500 and sentenced Williamson to prison for irregularity in admitting affidavits of homesteaders.
