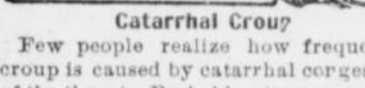

HELLO GIRLS ARE ALL LEFT-EARED

But it's dollars to prunes that every last one of the dear hello girls are literally "left-eared," and they are no exception to the general rule of telephone girls the world over.

Not only are Eugene hello girls, the other valley town hello girls and the hello girls from all over the country left-eared, but the big majority of people who constantly have use for the telephone are left-eared the same as many are left-handed.

To prove it a physician approached one of the telephone girls while on duty. "Left-eared?" said the physician. "Most of you girls are."
