FIRST NATIONAL AND CHAMBERS-BRISTOW WILL CONSOLIDATE

TWO EUGENE BANKING INSTITUTIONS WILL SOON COMBINE AND TRANSACT BUSINESS AS ONE WILL OCCUPY QUARTERS OF FIRST NATIONAL WHICH WILL BE ENLARGED—CAPITAL WILL BE INCREASED TO \$200,000 WITH TOTAL OF \$300,000 GUARANTEE

The First National Bank and the Chambers-Bristow Bank of this city will consolidate in a short time and the business of the combined institutions will be conducted in the building of the First National. This announcement was made to the public this morning, such a decision having been reached by the officials of both institutions several days ago.

NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL FOR JUNCTION CITY
