are probably about 2,000,000 sheep and 20,000 head of cattle.

The Straits of Magellan reach practically 315 miles from the Atlantic to the Pacific, divided into two parts, with the eastern somewhat longer than the western. At Cape Froward, the dividing point, a turn at almost right angles is made. The widest portion is nearly 50 miles, while the narrowest is barely one mile. Since the boundary settlement between Chile and Argentina, of 1881 the Straits of Magellan have belonged to the former country, but the waterway is not to be fortified and is always to be open to international navigation.
