

COTTAGE GROVE CHILD BURNS TO DEATH

Cottage Grove, Feb. 1.—Laura, the 5-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Hayes, died early this morning from the effects of burns received yesterday. Her mother received a nearby neighbor and insisted on the child being warm by the stove before going shopping. The stove door being open the little girl's dress caught and she was soon dressed in flames. The child's screams attracted the mother, who rushed to the rescue, but reached the child one too late, as nearly all its clothing was burned off. Medical aid was procured at once, but the child was too badly burned to recover.

GARFIELD CHANGES HUTCHCOCK POLICIES

Washington, Feb. 2.—It is the purpose of Secretary Garfield to so conduct the interior department and to interpret the public land laws as to actually aid every bona fide entryman who is endeavoring to establish a home on the public domain. Secretary Garfield holds that the land laws were enacted for a purpose, and so long as the law is not abused, he intends that the law shall enjoy and its provisions, and so long as he acts in good faith shall have the encouragement and aid of representatives of the department. In other words, Secretary Garfield is proceeding on the theory that every man is honest until proven guilty; he is human enough to recognize that honest men make errors which do not lay them, or should not lay them, liable to the law.
