## SENATOR BOOTH HELPS UNIVERSITY STUDENTS' FUND

Hon. R. A. Booth, of Eugene, has just given to the student loan fund of the University of Oregon a check for \$500 to be used as an irreducible educational loan fund for students. The fund will be known as the "Booth Loan Fund" and will be kept separate from the general loan fund which at present is distributed in loans ranging in amount from \$15 to \$80 among ten students of the University. Since the establishment of the general fund five years ago more than thirty students have been enabled to complete their college course who could not otherwise have done so. The University hopes to establish during the present year a loan fund of at least \$5000, to be loaned under the direction of President Campbell or some one designated by him, to boys and girls all over Oregon who wish to complete their education, but who cannot do so without assistance. It is believed that a loan of approximately \$100 a year at a low rate of interest to be repaid in two years after graduation is much more preferable than an outright gift in the form of a scholarship. The fund will be guaranteed by ten men against loss. Two signatures will be required on each note and a small amount of life insurance will be taken out to insure against loss by death. The present loan fund amounts to approximately \$1000.
