## IMPRESSIVE SERVICES OVER MURDERED PRIEST

Denver, Feb. 26.—With the solemnity and reverence due his holy position and character, the body of Rev. Father Leo Heinrichs was taken from St. Elizabeth's Catholic church from the Union station, where it today to the train to be taken to Paterson, N. J., where the Francis Fathers have their American headquarters. The procession was headlined and was witnessed by thousands who stood bareheaded as the body passed, while five thousand gathered about the church awaiting the conclusion of the services. Solemn high mass was recited and the Rev. William O'Ryan delivered the funeral sermon, in which he highly eulogized the martyred priest.

An Impassioned Orator.  
Rev. Father O'Ryan said in part: "That any sermon is attempted on this solemn occasion is not because of Father Leo, the simple Franciscan friar, who is dead, nor even because of the high offense against the Almighty Father of us all, who lives, but because of the society, in which

we live and its outraged and loosened bond of law. Crimes such as that of last Sunday are assaults on no mere individual; they are against you and me and all of us. They strike and wound law and justice in their very sanctuary whence breathes the very life of the civilized state.

Father Leo was struck down, the murderer confesses, because he was a priest, and not for any fancied grievance or imagined injury that the murderer had received from him. He never knew the dead priest, had never spoken with him; their lives, except in that one dread moment of blood and sacrifice, had never touched. Nor did he kill him, as priests have been killed, in hatred of his special creed. But the fiend knew that the priest was some outward symbol and present ambassador of that only authority by which kings reign and magistrates execute justice and human law rears itself in awful dignity and finds its sanction—the authority and government of God. And because the murdered had re-

## MAYOR LANE VINDICATED BY JURY'S VERDICT

Portland, Feb. 26.—Guilty as charged of attempting to blacken the character of Mayor Lane and of offending against public decency, such was the verdict returned last night against Mrs. Belle Waymire and E. E. Radding. The jury in the state circuit court reached its decision concerning the highly contradictory testimony in 30 minutes of actual deliberation. The twelve men were back in court within an hour of the time of leaving the jury box.

Not only did the jurors vindicate Mayor Lane, but after the order discharging them from further service had been made, several of them suggested raising a fund to hire a brass band and serenade the mayor. They said in no other way could they show their feeling of sympathy for a man who had been so grossly maligned. One juror offered to subscribe \$5 to such a fund, and others said they would contribute, but the suggestions were not actually carried out.

Only two ballots were taken by the jury, one of whom voted for acquittal on the first ballot.

Judge Gantenbein took occasion to compliment the twelve men on their finding. "It seems to me to be a just verdict," he said, "and I believe it reflects credit upon you gentlemen and upon the city."

Narrow Escape of Prince and Queen  
The Hague, Feb. 26.—An electric car collided with a carriage driven by Prince Henry in which was seated Queen Wilhelmina. Three wheels of the carriage were torn off, but neither the queen nor prince were hurt.

State of Turmoil.  
London, Feb. 26.—Dispatches from Lisbon, filtered through the rigid censorship in London, indicate that virtually a reign of terror exists at the Portuguese capital, where the Duke of Oporto, to all practical purposes, is acting as absolute dictator. The queen mother is making preparations to transfer her residence to Spain, while the young king tacitly admits his own inability to rule under the present conditions.

Upon the Duke of Oporto, therefore, practically develops the task of ruling the kingdom. He has been given absolute command of all military forces, and even of the police. Arrests are made by scores, and no records made thereof. Suspects are being thrown in prison, and kept there with no opportunity to see friends or even members of their families. Many houses have been searched and their occupants imprisoned.

All signs point to a revolutionary outbreak. For this reason the British cruisers will remain in the Tagus, and the Spanish troops upon the frontier.

## HARRY THAW MAY NOT BE FREE AGAIN

New York, Feb. 25.—Statements emanating from the alienists, who have examined Harry Thaw, indicate that nothing short of a miracle will save Stanford White's slayer from spending the remainder of his life in an asylum for the insane. It is said that Thaw is a victim of of paranoia, which is a progressive disease of the mind. Thaw is entirely in the hands of the state board of lunacy and the alienists at Mattewan, and his fate rests with them. It is customary for these officials to report the mental condition of an inmate 60 days after he is entered, but there is nothing compulsory about it.

## NEWS NOTES

The Iowa Lumber Company is preparing to build two sawmills in the Butte Creek timber belt near Derby, in Jackson county, which it is expected the P. & E. railroad will tap this year.

A dispatch from Los Angeles says three hundred and seventy mechanics in the shops of the Southern Pacific on the east side have been laid off. This is the second batch of employees on the Los Angeles division to feel the sharp retrenchment policy instituted by Harriman on every division of the Southern Pacific.
