### CHINA PROTESTING AGAINST JAPANESE TRADE MONOPOLY

Berlin, Feb. 25.—The Chinese government has taken up with the German foreign office Japanese treatment of trade in Manchuria, and has broached the possibility of the United States and Germany entering into a special agreement concerning the maintenance of equal trade opportunities in the Chinese territories. China's appeal has raised the question of whether or not the ground is not covered in the international agreement already in existence.

### OLD-FASHIONED POLITICAL SPEECH IN HOUSE TODAY

Washington, Feb. 25.—A general arraignment of the Republican party was made in the house today by Garrett, of Tennessee. He charged that duping the people had been its entire career and that the Republican party had just three fundamental arguments, two based on the civil war and its outcome, and that "for two decades the bloody shirt was the party banner and behind its crimson folds they marched to victory after victory"; and third, that Republican success means prosperity and Democratic success does not, and this has become a party hymn. Not for twenty years, he charged, had the Republican party as such faced an issue squarely "out in the open sunlight of judgment and reason."

### THIRTY INJURED IN TRAIN WRECK

Laredo, Texas, Feb. 25.—Thirty are reported injured in a partial derangement of an excursion train carrying a number of northern tourists at Orville, twelve miles north of Laredo. The Pullman coaches remained on the rails, a broken axle being the cause of the accident. Most of the excursionists were from Toledo, Ohio.

### KILLED TWO AND COMMITTED SUICIDE

Lamar, Mo., Feb. 25.—L. E. Hart, a teamster, last night shot and killed his mother-in-law, Mrs. Joseph E. Edwards, seriously wounded his father-in-law, then killed himself by letting a railroad train run over him. In the quarrel he shot his wife, slightly injuring her.

### U'REN ENTERS CONTEST FOR FULTON'S SEAT

Oregon City, Feb. 25.—W. S. U'ren this afternoon announced his candidacy for United States senator, in the Republican primary, and comes out strong against Senator Chas. W. Fulton, whom he charges with being unfriendly to Statement No. 1, and with being allied with Standard Oil and corporation adherents. Mr. U'ren also declares that H. M. Calkins is a compromiser who has said that he favors the people's choice for United States senator, but who has remained silent under the attacks against Statement No. 1. Several times during the last six months Mr. U'ren has openly stated that he would like to be United States senator, but has openly refrained from declaring his candidacy, with the hope that Mr. Calkins, or some other man, would take up the cudgel in defense of Statement No. 1, but he has wearied at last of waiting for Calkins to act and has arrived at the conclusion that Calkins is not aggressive enough to defend the principles for which other Statement No. 1 men stand.

### CONSPIRACY TO MURDER HAS BEEN UNearthED

Denver, Colo., Feb. 24.—It developed tonight that a woman, a member of St. Elizabeth's church who was present in the church yesterday when Father Leo Heinrichs was shot by Giuseppe Alio, the self-confessed anarchist, today told one of the priests of the church that a week or so ago she saw two Italians together in front of the church, and that one of them was pointing toward Father Leo, who was standing nearby talking to a parishioner.

### ANARCHIST BAND WILL BE PLACED UNDER ARREST

Denver, Feb. 25.—Through the efforts of Chief of Police Michael Delaney it is believed that at least thirty anarchists in various parts of the country will be placed under arrest in a few days. Delaney claims that Murderer Alio and a band of about forty men, employed as stone workers, were driven out of Italy two years ago. They went to Spain and were driven from there to Eugene, Oregon, coming later to the United States. They first settled at Paterson, N. J., and then spread out over the country. Four men, including Alio, came to Colorado and the other three may be arrested today.
