JURY FINDS VERDICT AGAINST MRS. HOFFMAN

(From Friday's Daily Guard.) The Hoffman vs. Scott case in the circuit court went to the jury last evening and the jury was out until about midnight, returning a sealed verdict. It was opened in court this morning and it was found that the jury had decided in favor of Scott. Mrs. Eugenia Hoffman sued Duncan Scott to recover \$4000, which she alleged that she let him have with which to make an investment. Twenty days were allowed by the court in which to file a motion for a new trial.



DIED.

Rev. John Handsaker, for many years a resident of Lane county, Oregon, and who died March 8, 1908, at Tacoma, Wash., of paralysis at the age of 86 years, 5 months and 15 days, was born in Derbyshire, England, September 22d, 1821, and in 1843, with his widowed mother and other members of the family, came to America. Sailing from Liverpool, 44 days were required to reach New Orleans, and eleven days more to St. Louis, Mo. They located in Madison county, Illinois, where a log cabin was built, and some years afterward the lumber was sawed with a "whipsaw" for the frame house occupied later. After engaging in various pursuits Mr. Handsaker, with his own family, moved to Oregon in 1874, locating at Goshen, a new village then springing up on the new O. & C. railroad and engaged in merchandising. He was agent for the Oregon & California Railroad Company, also for the Wells-Fargo Express Company, and postmaster. In 1888 they located at Tacoma, Wash. At an early age deceased united with the Methodist Episcopal church and was a minister for many years until ill health compelled him to forego the labors of his chosen profession. He leaves a loving wife and several sons, also two brothers, James, at Mattoon, Ill., and Samuel, in Eugene, with many old-time friends to mourn his death.



CHITTIM BARK MARKET IS WEAK.

From present indications the cascar market will be the lowest this season that the country has seen in recent years. The Guard has made careful inquiry of the various dealers and this is the consensus of opinion on the question. Indeed, market conditions are so unsatisfactory this season that many of the largest dealers do not expect to be in the market at all this year. At the present time and for several months past the market has

been dead. There has been no demand for the bark at any price. This in the face of the fact that the peel was short last year and almost six months has elapsed since the last season closed. On top of this dormant market the low price of labor and the dull times are expected to result in a large peel this season, further depressing an already low market.

The following from the Oregonian of recent date will interest the people of this county.

"The outlook for the cascar bark market is not good. Trade has

been early stagnant for several months, with prices tending downward and the indications are that the situation will be even worse in the future, owing to the failure of one of the largest handlers of this commodity in the world.

"The Stallman Fulton company, a wholesale drug firm in New York, with branches in Chicago and London, failed recently. The failure was precipitated by the sudden death of Mr. Stallman. Immediately following the failure, cables announced that London brokers had offered 50 tons of bark on the London market at 30s, equivalent to 5 cents a pound here. This lot was believed to be a part of the holdings of the Stallman & Fulton Company, and the fear was expressed that the receiver for the company might force on the American market the New York holdings of the firm, which are supposed to be large. Such action would absolutely swamp a market already demoralized."
