Ruef's affidavit contains 334 specific objections to Heney's document.

Judge Dunne followed up this indirect attack on the veracity of the two rabbis by saying that if it were in his power he would recommend the grand jury to investigate the persons who had made the statements. He ended by declaring that Ruef would have been sentenced to Folsom for the maximum term provided by law if the supreme court had not come to his assistance.
