# OLD SETTLER TELLS OF GREAT SIUSLAW COUNTRY

Vivian, Oregon, March 28, 1908.  
Editor Guard:—With your permission we will say a few words about the Siuslaw country, which in its undeveloped state seems to have greater possibilities than any other part of Lane county. About thirty years ago the Eugene and Siuslaw wagon road was surveyed and was opened to travel as far as the head of tide about 1886. The country was then very sparsely settled from 1855 until 1890, in which year the Siuslaw & Navigation Company made a railway survey to connect the two cities being mostly men with families, and all desirous of making permanent homes, were greatly elated at the prospect of a good means of transportation.

All went to work with a light heart and full of hope, clearing up the fine rich bottom land along the main Siuslaw and its tributaries, planting gardens and fruit trees and vines, which were soon bearing the finest and best fruits in the whole county. Then the panic of 1893 came, which was always hard on a newly settled country, but the people were mostly determined, so they kept steadily at work making roads, clearing land, setting out orchards, raising stock and to help along with immediate needs of a little cash shingle and sawk making and peeing chains. But then the panic was over the Siuslaw & Eastern Railway and Navigation Company became the Siuslaw & Eastern Railway & "Imagination" Co. and quite a number of the settlers abandoned their claims or sold for a small sum and left the country very much disheartened. But we are pleased to state that a lot of the first settlers are here today, still full of hope that outsiders will see our undeveloped resources and will come to our assistance with a good means of transportation, which would be a good paying investment from the beginning. While we have fine agricultural lands along the bottoms and benches our mountain sides are covered with an immense lot of fine merchantable timber, millions and millions of feet.

Eastern timber men have found us out long ago, and quite a number are investing heavily in our timber lands. There seems to be a general opinion among investors that we will have a coast railroad in a few years which will develop our timber industry, but in our humble opinion the business men of Eugene and Lane county would make a grand investment and do the proper thing to push an electric railway into this country at the earliest possible moment. Siuslaw has already helped to make Eugene what it is, and with a railroad from Eugene west to tide water on the Siuslaw you would see the town spread in all directions. Besides, it would open up our country, and give homes to hundreds of industrious families. Eugene is blighted by her opportunities if she neglects Western Lane county, where the timber is so abundant, with all its fruits, fisheries, timber, game, sports, hunting grounds, etc.

# HALSEY'S GANG OF YOUNG ROBBERS ARE CAUGHT

Roy Hayes, aged 18, and Robert Ramsey, aged 17, members of a Halsey gang of young robbers, were arrested in Portland yesterday afternoon by Detective Joseph F. Reilly of the Southern Pacific Company and taken to Albany yesterday by the officers.

The two lads, together with half a dozen more youths of that locality, have been in the habit of looting merchandise and confectionery stores in the vicinity of Albany and Halsey for several months, and were not caught until Detective Reilly rounded up the two boys yesterday and they confessed to numerous depredations. Detective Reilly was put on the trail of the youngsters after they had broken into a box car and stolen a cask of wine, which brought immediate action on the part of the railroad officials.

# AN ATTEMPT TO ASSASSINATE GEN. BULKLEY WELLS

Telluride, Colo., March 28.—Former Adjutant-General Bulkley Wells narrowly escaped death or serious injury at his home at an early hour this morning by the explosion of a dynamite bomb placed near his bed on the outer porch on which he was sleeping, as in his custom. Wells was hurled with the debris many feet from the wrecked house, the sides of which were torn out completely. Hardly a stick of the bed remained, but Wells is said to have escaped without injury. The house had been guarded against such an attempt by patrols and electric lights.

Helsingfors, March 28.—At the close of a heated debate in the Finnish diet this morning the Socialist members carried a vote of lack of confidence in the senate by a vote of 71 to 47. The debate arose over certain anti-Finnish interpellations in the Russian duma.

# BOMB THROWN IN NEW YORK CROWD THIS AFTERNOON

New York, March 28.—Two men were killed and a number of persons injured this afternoon when what had been a fairly peaceable meeting of unemployed developed into an anarchistic demonstration and a bomb was thrown and exploded. A crowd numbering probably ten thousand had gathered in Union square to take part in the meeting. Many women were in the gathering and several speakers of local prominence had been announced to make addresses. A force of 150 policemen, most of them mounted, were on duty.

# CRUISER TACOMA'S MAIL POUCHES ARE OPENED

Caracas, March 28.—Via Willemstad, Caracas, March 28.—Minister Russel has advised Dr. Jose De Jesus Paul, foreign minister, that three pouches of official mail brought into La Guayra for the cruiser Tacoma, had been opened at La Guayra. Russel said it was a very serious matter and asked for an investigation. Paul replied that the opening of the pouches was accidental, and that only a prejudiced mind could call the occurrence "very serious," as the contents of the pouches were not disturbed.

The incident of the mail bags, coupled with the return of the Tacoma to La Guayra today, caused the greatest excitement in Caracas. President Castro's organ, El Constitucional, publishes an editorial entitled, "What Does Roosevelt Want?" in which it declares that Secretary Root under the influence of President Roosevelt and inspired by American holding claims against Venezuela, is following a premeditated plan of creating a conflict with this republic. The paper states that the United States purposes to raise the flag of conquest in South America and that the American government does not intend to recognize the finality of the decision of the Venezuelan courts and the mixed communications.

# ROSALIA BAUSCH DIED EARLY THIS MORNING

WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT OF EUGENE SINCE 1876 DIES OF PARALYSIS AFTER USEFUL LIFE

# COMPLETE AVENUE TO KLAMATH FALLS THIS YEAR

Klamath Falls, March 28.—The California Northwestern is to be completed in Klamath Falls this year is evidenced by the vast progress being made in construction and track-laying. By the first of April the track will be finished to Dorris, and already two camps have been established between Dorris and Klamath river, where the grade across the swamp lands will be finished for a stretch of 8000 feet by the middle of April. The dredger of the Mason Construction Company is working two shifts, steadily lifting earth to the grade day and night. The 8000 feet nearing completion extends from the channel to the straits of Wild Horse butte, and it will be a short piece of work from that point to the west shore line.
