

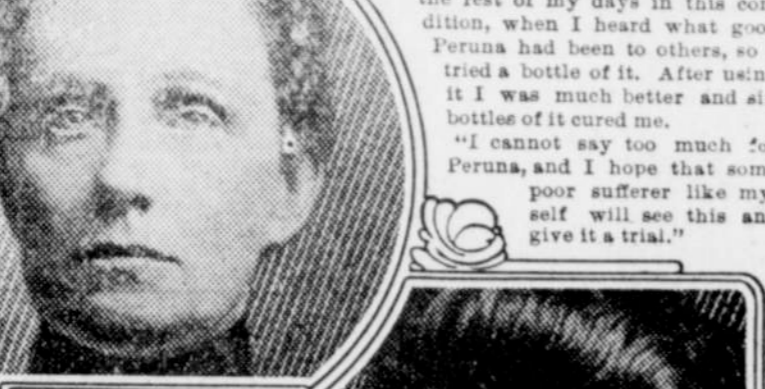

Washington, D. C., March 25.—Impeachment proceedings will not be featured in the United States Senate against Leoburns K. The report of the special committee, consisting of Representatives Noon of Pennsylvania, Webb of North Carolina and Dickman of Michigan, appointed by Speaker Cannon to determine whether the charges were based upon facts sufficient to warrant impeachment of Judge Wilfley today submitted its report to the house committee on the judiciary.

CLASS OF 100 INITIATED BY THE T. F. B.
