MRS. D. R. LAKIN DEAD; WAS PIONEER, OF 1864. BETTER THAN EVER. Sheriff Flisk reports that taxes are coming in better than ever before, and when they become delinquent next Tuesday he thinks there will have been collected over \$235,000. The assessment roll calls for over \$325,000 in tax money, and if the amount figured upon is collected by Tuesday, it will be a record-breaking collection. Up to 10 a. m. this morning \$144 receipts had been written.

J. C. GOODALE DIES IN CALIFORNIA. Welby Stevens this afternoon received a message from Sawtelle, Cal., stating that his father-in-law, J. C. Goodale, formerly of Coburg, had died there. He was well known to a great many Lane county people, having conducted a sawmill at Coburg for many years. He was the father of Mrs. Welby Stevens, J. C. Jr., Charles and William Goodale.

LOCAL OPTION. Today the petition for the local option election was filed and the question of whether or not the sale of liquor shall be prohibited in Lane county will be placed on the ballots at the coming June election. The petition contains the names of 591 legal voters of the county, the clerk having gone over the list and struck out all of the names which do not appear on the registration books. There were not many of them. The law requires ten per cent of the voters of the county to sign the petition, and many more than the required number were on.
