THOUSANDS OF HOBOS ON THE WAY NORTH

There are said to be 25,000 hobos between Los Angeles and Portland, coming north, and some things indicate it. Yesterday afternoon 135 arrived on the freight at 3 o'clock and 180 on a freight at about 8 o'clock, about 315 in all. There are about 5000 between Sacramento and Portland, according to the operators, riding on freight cars and living some way. Recently 500 men at work at Kenneth for the railroad were discharged and started on the trip north. It takes hustling to keep them going. Twenty stayed in the city last night, with 25 cents worth of bread, collected by Night Watchman Catlin for them.—Albany Democrat.

According to Harry Schlosser, the hoo acreage in Oregon this year will be less than last year. Mr. Schlosser says that from present indications growers will not raise so extensively this year, and he estimates that the acreage under cultivation this year in Oregon will be about 3,000 less than last year. Should the crop, however, be of first quality, the decrease in acreage would not be felt.

PLANT BEET SEED HERE FOR EXPERIMENT

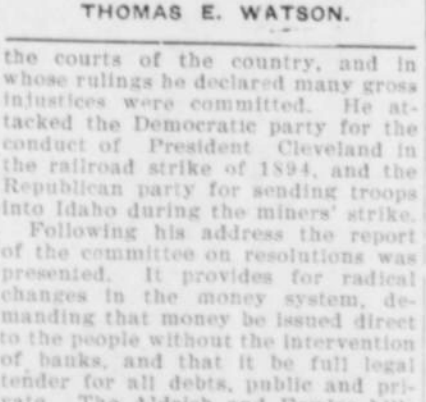
The Commercial Club's promotion department has been in correspondence with the Pacific Sugar Construction Company, which a year and a half ago built a plant north of Colusa in Glenn county, California, and in nine months' time founded a splendid city on what formerly was a barley field. The club asked for some of the sugar beet seed, which the company furnishes its patrons, and the California concern sent two pounds of the seed, sufficient to plant one-seventh of an acre, and while the manager wrote for the seed primarily in order to experiment with it himself, he is anxious to have some of the progressive farmers plant some of this seed so that it may be given a fair test. ALLEN FRUIT CO. SUES WEBER-BUSSEL CO.

The Allen Fruit Company, of this city, today began suit in the circuit court against the Weber-Bussell Canning Company, the Seattle firm which bought cherries here last summer and which announced some time ago that it would build a cannery in this city this year, to recover \$1255.68, with interest at 6 per cent from July 31, 1907. The Allen Company alleges that between June 29, 1907, and July 4, 1907, it delivered and sold at the instance of defendant at Eugene 77-558 pounds of the best quality of Royal Anne cherries for which the defendant agreed to pay the plaintiff 5 1-2 cents per pound, but it is alleged, no part of the sum has ever been paid. Woodcock & Potter are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

WATSON CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT

St. Louis, April 3.—Thomas E. Watson, of Georgia, was nominated today by the Populists for president, and Samuel H. Williams, of Indiana, for vice president. Late this afternoon the Nebraska and Minnesota delegations bolted the convention because of its refusal to nominate Bryan.



St. Louis, April 3.—George A. Honicker, of New Jersey, was made chairman of the Populist convention today, after considerable opposition. Honicker made an address of considerable length in which he attacked the courts of the country, and in whose rulings he declared many gross injustices were committed. He attacked the Democratic party for the conduct of President Cleveland in the railroad strike of 1894, and the Republican party for sending troops into Idaho during the miners' strike. Following his address the report of the committee on resolutions was presented. It provides for radical changes in the money system, demanding that money be issued direct to the people without the intervention of banks, and that it be full legal tender for all debts, public and private. The Aldrich and Fowler bills are denounced. The plank on trusts demands that the government own and control the railroads and all public utilities which in their nature are monopolies; public ownership of telegraph and telephone lines, and a parcel post is also asked for. The platform favors the initiative and referendum, and power to recall from office disloyal or inefficient representatives; the enactment of the employers' liability act within constitutional bounds, and other matters for the improvement of labor conditions are set forth. There was considerable opposition to certain planks, especially to the money plank.
