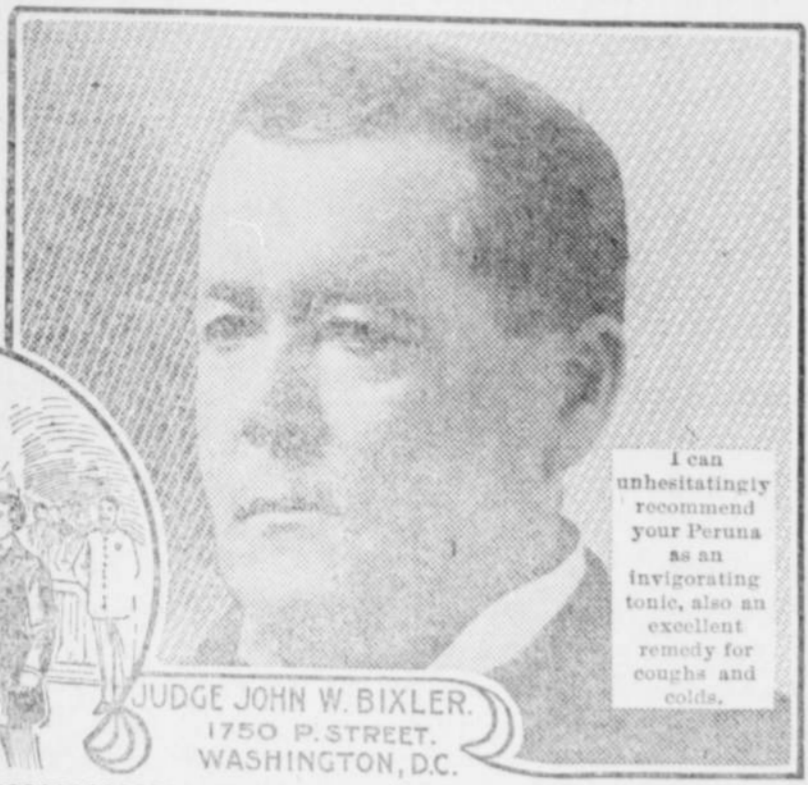

PRESIDENT URGES LEGISLATION CURBING ANARCHY

Washington, April 9.—In one of the shortest messages which he has yet transmitted to congress, President Roosevelt today called attention to the necessity for further legislation on the subject of anarchy. With the message he transmitted a report reviewing the legal phases of the question by Attorney-General Bonaparte. The message of the president is as follows: "To the Senate and House of Representatives:— I herewith submit a letter from the department of justice which explains itself. Under this opinion I hold that existing statutes give the president the power to prohibit the postmaster-general from being used as an instrument in the commission of crime—that is, to prohibit the use of the mails for the advocacy of murder, arson and treason; and I shall act upon such construction. Unquestionably, however, there should be further legislation by congress in this matter. When compared with the suggestion of anarchy, every other oppression sinks into insignificance. The anarchist is the enemy of humanity, the enemy of all mankind, and his is a deeper degree of criminality than any other. No immigrant is allowed to come to our shores if he is an anarchist; and no paper published here or abroad should be permitted circulation in this country if it propagates anarchistic opinions. (Signed) "THEODORE ROOSEVELT. "The White House, April 9, 1908."

Besides his direction to the postmaster-general to exclude from the mails such publications as "La Question Sociale," President Roosevelt in his letter to Attorney-General Bonaparte asking for an opinion on the legal phase of the subject, says he has the particular case called to the attention of the governor of New Jersey by Secretary Root that the governor may proceed under the state laws. The opinion of the attorney-general which the president transmits to congress embraces the discussion of the whole subject from many angles. His first conclusion is that the articles in question which advise the use of arms and dynamite for the purpose of annihilating the police and other officials in order that anarchy may prevail constitutes a "sedition libel" and is undoubtedly "a crime at common law."

He declares that there is no federal statute which makes such publications an offense against the United States, and that the federal courts consequently have no jurisdiction in the matter. That there is full power in the possession of congress to make such publications criminal the attorney-general asserts and quotes Chief Justice Fuller of the supreme court, and Justice Field as authority. The greater portion of his opinion is devoted to the question of whether in the absence of any legislation by congress the postmaster-general has any right to exclude such publications. On this point his conclusion is correct. The postmaster-general will be justified in excluding from the mails any issue of a periodical otherwise entitled to the privileges of second-class mail matter which contains articles constituting sedition libel and counseling such crimes as murder, arson and treason.

FRESHMEN HAZED AT THE O. A. C.

Thirty freshmen of the Oregon Agricultural College were given their bachelors degree yesterday afternoon at Corvallis by the upper class men. The freshmen were seized, overpowered and dragged down the main street of the city, and taken to a barber shop, where the hair on the top of each freshman's head was shaved off. Snowell Lawson, of this city, was among the number of freshmen treated to the scalping process. He says the freshmen for the most part took the hazing in good spirit.—Albany Herald.

DEMOCRATS TO NOMINATE CHAMBERLAIN AT THE POLLS

The Democrats of Oregon, by their own volition, are expected to write the name of George E. Chamberlain in on the primary ballots on April 17 and thus nominate him as the party's choice for United States senator. In announcing his candidacy for the senate, Governor Chamberlain took the ground that he would make the race, provided the members of the party by their votes at the primary election called him to the task. He outlined his position regarding the senatorship, and then left the matter of nomination in the hands of the voters. It is expected, therefore, that he will be given the full party vote of nomination, this being accomplished by writing his name in the blank space left on the nominating ballot.

Roy Humphrey, of Unity, will put in several hundred feet (board measure) of logs for Mac Crow the next few weeks. Mac is making preparations to slash the brush and clear the land as soon as possible. Bert Hebert, of Hazel Dell, is deputy assessor, and is now near Rush Island looking after the assessable property of the Middle Fork district.

Washington, April 8.—Administration officials today expressed amazement over statements in President Castro's organ, El Constitucional, having as their basis the Tacoma mail pouch opening incident. The editorial received the closest attention, and mingled with the feeling of amazement over the sentiments of President Castro is one of regret and mystification over the whole course which Venezuela has pursued in dealing with the United States. "Twice within the last 15 years we have gone to Venezuela's aid when that country needed assistance."

The platform opens with an expression of regret over the illness of Governor Guild and the hope of his rapid recovery, and also expresses the belief that he is entitled to the nomination for vice president of the United States. The platform declares absolutely for the principles of protection, but

JAPANESE INSULTED AMERICAN FLAG

Pekin, April 9.—A detailed report has reached this city of an insult to the American flag at Mukden, where the United States consulate was invaded by a band of Japanese ruffians as a result of a quarrel between a Japanese letter-carrier and the Chinese servants of Willard D. Straight, the Consul-General. It appears that the postman attempted to make his way into the consulate by a private entrance, and when ordered to depart to return a little later with a party of friends who forced their way into the building and engaged in a hand to hand fight with the Chinese, even invading Mr. Straight's bedroom. To make the matter more serious, Mr. Straight reports that he was given small satisfactions by the Japanese Consul-General at Mukden, who offered no apology and openly showed his sympathy with the Japanese thugs, four of whom were arrested by Mr. Straight personally, as the police gave no aid.

TIMBER OWNERS FEAR BIG FIRES

Seattle, April 16.—With an unusually dry spring and light snow in the mountains, timber owners and loggers fear the worst forest fires since 1900. Today timber land owners organized a forest fire fighting association, and the incorporators being representatives of the large timber land owners.
