**PHONE SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS HAVE BEGUN**

The extensive improvements to the Pacific States Telephone Company's system in Eugene, as mentioned exclusively by The Guard a short time ago, the company having set aside \$25,000 for the work here this year, have begun. A force of men is at work digging trenches in the alleys for the underground conduits for the telephone wires in the business section of the city. A carload of the conduits arrived from Portland yesterday and were hauled down town this morning. They are wooden pipes about six inches in diameter and are chemically treated so they will last well beneath the ground. From now on the company will maintain a large force of men making the improvements mapped out for the summer.

**HOMESEEEKERS COME TO OREGON STEADILY**

**DESPITE FINANCIAL STRINGENCY NUMBER IS EQUAL TO LAST YEAR'S**

No considerable falling off of the colonist movement from last year's figures is shown in the reports of the last week or two from the Union office and Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company agents. While the expected increase did not materialize, due to the effect of last fall's financial stringency, there is still an encouraging activity in colonist travel to the Pacific Northwest. The record for the week ending April 15 showed 390 homeseekers coming through Huntington on colonist tickets. While this appears to be a heavy falling off when compared with last year's figures for the same week, it is given a more encouraging color when it is seen that of the week's business only 14 were destined to points north of Portland, while of last year's 1147 colonist passengers coming through the Huntington gateway during that week 375 were bound for points north of Portland. The difference in the total coming to Oregon points makes the average for Portland nearly equal to that of last year.

Of the total for the week a decided gain was shown in the number of passengers to some points in Oregon. Astoria got 15 instead of last year's 3; points south of Portland secured 150, as against 69; Hood River got 11 instead of 8; The Dalles got 20 as compared to 6 for the week last year; Baker City got 21, a gain of four over a year ago; there were 23 to Walla Walla and 11 to Lewiston.

**BIG ROBBERY OCCURS IN PORTLAND**

Portland, April 20.—A double safe cracking was successfully carried out here early this morning in which jewelry and ostrich plumes to the value of \$1500 were secured. The robbery in practically every detail, the police, was the same as the Lundy jewelry robbery in San Francisco ten days ago. The police believe the same gang did the work. Most of the loot was taken from the office of C. H. Markell & Company. The safe was broken into and as in the case of the San Francisco robbery no explosives were used. The other robbery occurred at the Aultman & Taylor Machinery Company's office. Here the robbers made three bad starts at drilling, but at the fourth attempt forced a half inch drill through to the tumblers. Then with the aid of a pump and sledge the inner lock was wrenched and the safe door torn open.

**JILTED BY GIRL HE KILLED HIMSELF**

Crazed with responsibility because he had been jilted by his betrothed, Custer Dinwiddie, of Gold Hill, yesterday morning at 2:15 sent the charge of a shotgun crashing through his head while lying in bed beside his sleeping brother, Willard Dinwiddie, at his home four and a half miles east of Mt. Angel. Drawing the gun up under the covers along side of him, he placed the muzzle against the upper part of the chin and pulled the trigger with his thumb or finger, the charge going up through the head and coming out of the right temple and lodging in the opposite wall and door, splattering the wall and door with blood and brains. Besides the two brothers, Mrs. Willard Dinwiddie and a lady friend were in the room. Started out of their slumbers by the shot, the women screamed, and to add to the confusion it was some time before Willard could find a match to light the lamp which stood on an adjoining chair. But it needed no light to show what had happened. The gurgling of the blood from the gaping wound in the throat of the suicide told the terror-stricken trio that a terrible tragedy had been enacted.—Salem Statesman.

**BOURNE PLEASED WITH RESULT OF OREGON PRIMARIES**

Washington, April 20.—When asked if he had anything to say regarding the result of the Oregon primary elections, Senator Bourne said: "Yes; I am deeply gratified, although in no manner surprised, at the overwhelming victory which Statement No. 1 advocates have won in Oregon. I trust its opponents will realize that the principle has come to stay. I did my utmost to assist the enforcement of that principle. I took no hand whatever in the contest, for reasons stated in my interview, given your own and other Portland dailies some weeks ago. Senator Fulton's and my own relations have been, to me at least, extremely pleasant, and friendly, and I trust will continue so. I hope and expect that Senator Calkins' relations and my own will be equally pleasant."  
Senator Bourne joined with Representatives Hawley and Ellis today in recommending the appointment of William H. Leitner postmaster at Huntington. Bourne was host at dinner last evening, his guests being Senators Aldrich, Hemenway, Curtis and Secretary Metcalf.

**KAY WILL VOTE FOR PEOPLE'S CHOICE**

Senator Tom Kay will probably ratify the people's choice for United States senator whether he be Republican or Democrat, says the Salem Journal. This will help give the Statement No. 1 faction in the next legislature the additional supporters necessary to be able to name the people's choice to be United States senator. Senator Kay also believes that Hines' recent speeches were responsible for the defeat of Fulton in Marion county. Speaking to a Journal reporter Sunday morning, Senator Kay stated: "I believe that Fulton would have received a majority in this county but for the speeches of Francis J. Hines. I cannot say by just what majority would have won, as in any event the result would have been close. "I would support Calkins if he receives the popular vote in the June election and would probably vote for Chamberlain were he to receive the people's choice. As to this, however, I am not fully decided. I believe a great many Democrats registered as Republicans and voted against Fulton and for Calkins, especially in the cities."

**SENATOR FULTON TAKES DEFEAT EASY**

Senator Fulton arrived in Portland last night from Astoria and will leave tomorrow morning for Washington to see what can be done to save the Fulton amendment to the interstate commerce law, which is now in the hands of Senator Elkins and his confederates of the senate committee on interstate commerce, says the Portland Journal.  
"Have you anything to say about the primary election?" Senator Fulton was asked.  
"Well, what do you expect me to say?" replied the senator, grimly. "Simply this: 'Oh, hell!'"

**IMPORTANT LAND DEPARTMENT RULING.**

The General Land Office at Washington, D. C., recently rendered a decision in the case of Mendenhall vs. Taylor, which is of considerable interest to parties holding homestead claims.  
Waldo Taylor of Silver Lake, Oregon, placed a homestead filing on a piece of timbered land in 1903. The 160 acres would cut perhaps 3,000,000 feet or more of merchantable yellow pine lumber. He built a cabin on the place and in a technical sense complied with the homestead law. About a year ago W. W. Mendenhall of Klamath Falls, Ore., filed a contest, alleging abandonment of land and noncultivation. The registered and receiver of land office at Lakeview, Oregon, held antagonistic opinions, the former deciding for the plaintiff, the latter for the defendant. The General Land Office, on appeal, sustained the registrar, and the decision clearly stated that the homesteader must make substantial improvements, must establish a residence and maintain the same, must cultivate the land, not an acre or two but a considerable acreage, and must be able to prove when it comes to a contest that the land has been the entryman's home, permanently, not occasionally, if he desires to make sure of his claim.

At the same time the mechanics from Fort William to Montreal have abrogated their agreement with the company, although paratory to joining other shopmen in a federation to fight the open shop rule.

**NEW HAMPSHIRE TABLES EFFORT TO ENDORSE TAFT**

Concord, N. H., April 20.—The Republican state convention for the selection of delegates at large to the Republican national convention was held here today. The platform renews allegiance to the principles of the Republican party, and while recognizing that existing tariff schedules should be readjusted to current conditions, emphatic opposition is declared to tariff tinkering by piecemeal. It urges the restoration of the American flag to the ocean carrying trade, and generous pension legislation for army and navy veterans.  
On the question of instructions the platform asserts that the real interests of the presidential candidate is not nominated will be best served without specific or implied instruction in the form of resolutions or preference in this convention.  
A resolution endorsing Taft for president was tabled by a rising vote, only 25 delegates out of 763 voting for the resolution.

**JURY CHOSEN TO TRY BANKERS**

Salem, Or., April 20.—A big legal battle in the J. Thoburn Ross case will begin at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, when District Attorney Manning will offer the first of his testimony in support of the charge that Ross and his associates in the Title Guarantee & Trust Company converted to their own use over \$288,000 of state school funds. The afternoon a jury was secured and the opening statements made by the lawyers. Then court adjourned until tomorrow morning, when the introduction of evidence will begin.  
The jury as accepted is composed of Jacob Staiger, F. D. Knight, Charles R. Richey, H. A. Stigmund, George Brown, Joseph Kirsch, C. F. Hays, J. P. Short, P. L. Kennedy, James Forbes, Otto Myers and W. J. Haberly. These men are all from the country precincts, none from Salem.

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
