## WARREN WILL ARRANGE ANOTHER STATE FAIR EXHIBIT

At a recent session of the county commissioners' court G. W. Griffin, E. O. Pater and W. M. Greer were appointed as a committee to arrange for a Lane county exhibit at the state fair at Salem next September. The committee has appointed E. M. Warren to get up the exhibit and arrange for it in the pavilion, and he has already begun to interest the farmers in the matter. It will be remembered that last year Lane county won second prize and a hard try will be made this year for first. Many unprejudiced outsiders were of the opinion that last year's Lane county display should have been given first, but a college professor from somewhere in Washington gave it to Benton with some giving Lane's more than a cursory glance. Mr. Warren thinks that by beginning early this year he will be able to get up an exhibit that cannot be touched by any other county. The best of the products on display at the Lane county fair, which will be held here the week before the state fair is held, will be taken to the latter.

## MILITARY ROAD LAND GRANT REPORTED SOLD

A contract has been closed for the transfer and immediate colonization of the lands of the Oregon Military Land Grant Company, comprising 500,000 acres in Southern Oregon. The deal was consummated by H. A. Hunter, president of the land grant company. The grant is taken over by the corporation, to be known as the Oregon Valley Land Company of Kansas City, Mo. The consideration is about \$1,500,000.

A complete plan of colonization has been adopted, following the lines of the purchasers in the disposition and settlement last year of the San Luis Valley Land Company's large holdings in Colorado. The negotiations between President Hunter, of the Oregon grant, and the Eastern people have been under way for nearly a year, and its successful conclusion means much for the southern part of Oregon east of the Cascade mountains.

The great tract held for several years by many of the Booth-Kelly Company and later by the Hunter organization, has never yet been offered to the public, and has remained practically a sealed book to the people at large, although it has for a quarter of a century been known as a region of vast development possibilities. Since the last year's active campaign of surveying by Hariman and Southern Oregon, the grant has come into notice more than ever before. It will be tapped by the Oregon Eastern Railway to be built by the Southern Pacific, and the Oregon Short Line.

The grant has for several years been held by Congressman Andrews, of Minnesota. It extends in a strip 12 miles wide from the summit of the Cascades to the Snake river opposite Silver City, Idaho. The portion involved in the transfer just made begins at the east side of the Klamath Indian reservation and includes all the lands east of that division point. From the day the grant was made by congress in 1864 nothing has been done to encourage settlement and development. The new owners propose immediately to reverse this policy and will encourage settlement by the sale of land in small tracts.

## LIQUOR MEN WIN IN ELECTIONS

Chicago, April 21.—The saloon forces were generally successful in the forty or more towns and villages of Illinois which voted on the local option question today. Definite figures are lacking in many cases, but it seems certain that not more than 100 saloons were voted out of business. The larger cities almost without exception retain their licensed dramshops.

Chicago, the largest city in which the question was an issue, gave the saloon a majority of 3352. The principal exceptions to the general result were Elmhurst, Thebes, Pinckneyville, and Naperville. Some 35 saloons lost their licenses in these four cities.

In Cook county 12 of the villages bordering Chicago balloted for or against the liquor interests. In only one, however, was there a change from previous conditions, Barrington going "dry" by a small plurality. Ten others voted to retain their saloons and one decided not to admit the dramshops.

Pinckneyville, Ill., April 21.—Pinckneyville was today added to the list of "dry" cities. The anti-saloon forces paraded the streets and the schools were closed because of the absence of pupils who were participating in the parade.

## SCORE OF SMALL MILLS RESUME NEAR ELGIN, OR.

Elgin, Or., April 21.—There are 23 sawmills located near Elgin, but soon after the money flurry last year the greater number of them shut down. Last week several resumed operations, and inside of two weeks 14 more will be running. Most of the mills are small ones, employing from ten to fifteen men, but the resumption gives about 200 men work, and as all the mills are tributary to Elgin this means a great deal to the merchants here.
