

SPRINGFIELD TEAM SHUTS OUT COTTAGE GROVE

He stopped two grounders that brought forth great applause from the grandstand. Smith at second accepted 11 chances without an error, while Chandler and Anderson carried off the batting honors, each man getting two hits. Next Sunday the Blues will play either Albany or Coburg. SAYS LUMBER RATES ARE TOO HIGH

Salem, Or., April 25.—Elmer L. Doolittle, of the Cerro Gordo Lumber Company, complains that the railroad rates on lumber and railroad ties on the Oregon & Southeastern are too exorbitant and asks the railroad commission to come to the relief of the lumber manufacturing interests along the line and secure for them a reduction in the tariff schedule. He says the present rate for lumber is \$1 per 1000, and that upon railroad ties 75 cents, and that when there is a market for lumber the manufacturers are hit pretty hard. He says he has paid as high as \$31.66 on a carload shipment on a seven-mile haul from his mill to Cottage Grove. The citizens of Latham, along the line of the Southern Pacific near Cottage Grove, ask the railroad commission to interfere to secure the reinstatement of Latham as a flag station for passenger trains Nos. 11 and 12, as the station is entirely without train service, except for freight. The complaint is signed by E. M. Sharp, and he states that General Manager O'Brien has been petitioned for the relief asked, but that that official has thus far ignored the people's request.

PARMENTER FINALLY LOCATED IN OMAHA

David Parmenter, the old soldier, who forfeited his bail at the last term of circuit court by not appearing for trial on the charge of bigamy, has been located at Omaha, and Deputy Sheriff C. C. Hammond left on this morning's train for that city to bring him back. Since Parmenter's departure Sheriff Plisk has been on the lookout for any news concerning his whereabouts and thinking he would go to Omaha, where he formerly resided, requested the officers to look for him. The sheriff received a wire Saturday stating that he had been found and that he had been placed in custody. Deputy Hammond at once began preparations for the trip back there and went to Salem this morning to secure requisition papers from Governor Chamberlain. He will then proceed to Lincoln to get the signature of the governor of Nebraska and then go to Omaha to get his prisoner.

Parmenter is the man, it will be remembered, who married again before his first wife had obtained a divorce, he having heard that she was dead and ventured upon a second matrimonial career without having taken the trouble to ascertain the truth of the report of his first wife's death. The Guard of Saturday printed an item about the suit of the second wife to have the marriage ceremony declared null and void.

FATAL GUN ACCIDENT AT COMSTOCK

Roy Clark, the 13-year-old son of Charles Clark, of Comstock, Douglas county, died at the Eugene General hospital Sunday morning about 7 o'clock from the effects of a gun shot wound through the abdomen. The boy, in company with Roy Watkins, another boy of about his age, were out with their rifles near their home at Comstock Saturday afternoon. Both had been sitting on the ground when the Clark boy pulled his gun, a 32-20 Winchester, toward him, muzzle first. The hammer caught on something and the piece was discharged, the bullet entering the lower part of his abdomen from the front and emerging at the back. The injured boy was placed on the train a few hours afterward and brought to Eugene and placed in the hospital with the hope of saving his life, but he gradually grew weaker and expired Sunday morning. Undertaker Gordon took charge of the remains and shipped them to Comstock Sunday afternoon for burial.

ROOSEVELT AND FAIRBANKS, SAYS YOUNG Medford, Or., April 21.—"Roosevelt and Fairbanks will be nominated by the national Republican convention when it meets in Chicago," said John C. Young, of Baker City, private secretary to Jonathan Bourne, who spent the day in Medford on a mission of secrecy, presumably looking after Bourne's interests and feeling the public pulse. "It is the field against Taft," continued Mr. Young, "and the field will win. Taft will not have over 250 votes. When it is seen, after the first few ballots, that Taft cannot win, Indiana will lead the break to Roosevelt. Nebraska will follow and there will soon be a stampede. Indiana will lead the break because Fairbanks is willing to remain vice-president if he cannot be president. The bolt will be with the understanding that he is again named. Hemingway cannot be re-elected without Fairbanks' aid, and the program will be agreeable to both him and Bourne. "What will Roosevelt say?" Well, he can't say anything; if the people want him, what can he say?"
