PORTLAND MARKET REPORT.

Portland, April 30.—“The livestock market is holding its own in a satisfactory way in all lines,” said a

commission man today. “There is, of course, a weak tone in sheep and lower prices may be announced within a few days, but for the present there is a fair demand for muttons at current quotations and it may after all not be necessary to cut prices for some time to come. Much will, of course, depend upon the size of receipts from this time on.”

“I can see nothing to indicate any weakening of the cattle market in the near future. The demand continues strong and stocks in this state are so small that it is necessary all the time to draw on neighboring states, California, Idaho, Montana and other sections, for supplies.”

“In the hog market there is no change from the conditions of yesterday. The demand is as strong as ever and prices are well maintained.”

Butter Market

There were more reports today of shading of prices by some of the city creameries, and the butter market was regarded as weak all along the line, with the belief general that lower prices would be made within a few days. Very little country creamery is now moving at the top city creamery price, the range generally being 20c to 22 1/2c a pound. Butter men reported little or no demand for their products in the north today.

Egg Market Is Steady.

A steady tone is noted in the local egg market at this time. Receipts are only moderate, although some shipments in this direction are fully up to the average of the past few weeks. There is practically no northern demand noted at the moment because of the larger supplies in local territory.

Steady Tone in Poultry.

In the poultry market the tone is quite steady; all lines being included. The receipts at this time are only fair and consist principally of old stocks. Spring chicks are just as hard to obtain as ever and the trade is wondering what has become of the large shipments that usually materialize at this period of the year. Spring ducks should be in market by this time, but none are in sight and dealers have no advice of any shipments in this direction. Now that there is a good demand for turkeys shippers are not willing to send supplies.

Potato Buying Is Heavy.

There is very heavy buying of potatoes in this territory. Orders from the south and the southwest are still showing an increase and the number of shipments is making like progress. There is practically no disposition among the producers to hold back their stocks because all seem to realize that the only way to clean up is to sell potatoes at a price the outsiders will take them at.

Brief Notes of the Trade.

Market is somewhat overburdened with cabbage and some dealers are making a concession in the price. General value unchanged, however.

Business in the hop market is at a standstill, although one or two small sales have been reported late at low figures.

Local head lettuce is arriving in good supply with demand liberal around 25 @ 30c dozen.

Cheese market is showing a good demand at this time with local supplies quite well cleaned up. More expected tomorrow, however.

HARRY BOWN CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF

Harry L. Bown, the Democratic nominee for sheriff of Lane county, was born in Fulton county, Illinois, December 22nd, 1866, and with his parents moved to Lane county in the summer of 1884 and settled near Elmira. After receiving the education afforded by the county school of the neighborhood, his father not being able to educate him further, he



worked out for neighboring farmers, thereby supplying the means to attend the Eugene public schools and thereafter taught school, and by this obtained means with which to attend the normal school at Monmouth, in 1890, and while teaching school, he was offered and accepted the second deputyship by the late Sheriff W. W. Withers, and which position he filled with credit to himself until the latter's death in 1903. During this time Mr. Bown worked mostly in the sheriff's office and was ever found accommodating, careful and accurate and a first-class and efficient clerical man. Upon the death of Sheriff Withers, Sheriff Pisk appointed Mr. Bown as his chief deputy and here his work was mostly outside the office and here he was ever found a man of clear and quick judgment, cool-headed and careful in the discharge of his official duties. Mr. Bown has a family of a wife and two boys and fraternally he belongs to the I. O. O. F. and Workmen.
