GREAT THRONGS CHEER BIG FLEET NORTHWARD BOUND

Venice, Cal., April 25.—From the high bluffs of Santa Monica, overlooking the sea, this afternoon a vast throng of people from 8:30 to 9 o'clock this morning witnessed the procession of the entire fleet of battleships as they passed northward. No spectacle so superb has ever been witnessed on the coast of Southern California unless it was the arrival a week ago of the same ships and it will be a long time before the patriotic enthusiasm of a great multitude subsides. The forgetfulness of the spectacle made today. Men, women and children by the thousand stood in the open air all night to witness the passing of the fleet today. Since noon yesterday every available railroad and electric car has been in operation conveying the crowds, and over one hundred thousand persons viewed the brief manoeuvres of the fleet before it proceeded northward to the boom of cannon, cheers of the throng and the waving of tens of thousands of flags.

ARRESTS MADE FOR DYNAMITE OF GALLAGHER'S HOME

Oakland, April 24.—The first arrests in connection with the dynamiting of Former Supervisor Gallagher's home were made last night, when J. Kerr, a blacksmith, and another man whose name is not disclosed, were taken into custody. Kerr went to a drug store Thursday afternoon and attempted to buy nitric acid. The clerk drew the man into conversation and found he had a good knowledge of explosives. The police were notified and arrested Kerr and another man.

HOME OF WITNESS AGAINST BOMBERS WRECKED

San Francisco, April 23.—The prosecution will make a thorough investigation of the dastardly attempt to kill ex-Supervisor James L. Gallagher at the home of William H. Schneck, his brother-in-law, in Oakland, last night, when a huge bomb tore away the whole front of the house. Gallagher and his wife were upstairs at the time of the explosion. Gallagher is one of the most important witnesses for the state in the bribery and graft cases, involving Abraham Ruef and other prominent people. In an interview today Francis J. Heney said he was not surprised, and had warned Gallagher several months ago that they would "get him."

Ruef said he regarded the attempt on the life of Gallagher as a dastardly outrage, and expressed the belief that it was the work of a crank. He stated that he had received many anonymous letters threatening death in various ways because of his attitude against "higher ups." Only one person was injured by the explosion, a boy hit in the neck by a flying missile. Gallagher's hat was pierced by a splinter.

Police Are Active

Oakland, April 23.—The whole detective department of Oakland, assisted by many of the best of the San Francisco force, is trying to solve the mystery of the blowing up of the home of Former Supervisor Gallagher last night. A search of the ruins disclosed a wire, fuse and caps, indicating the use of a bomb. The city will offer a reward.

Residents of the neighborhood informed the police of the strange actions of three men noticed about the premises shortly before the explosion.

ITALIAN CAR DRIVER WON LONG AUTO RACE

Briar Cliff, N. Y., April 24.—Louis Strang, in a fifty-horsepower Italian car, won the 259-mile automobile race over the Briar Cliff course today. Cedrino, also with an Italian car, was second; Guy Vaughn, driving a thirty-horsepower American car, third; Herbert Lyttle and Paul Sartori, the only other racers to officially finish the long journey, won fourth and fifth place respectively. Lyttle drove a fifty-horsepower car of American make and Sartori a forty-horsepower Italian. Three other cars of the twenty-two which started would have been able to complete the journey, but the race was officially declared off as soon as the fifth car had crossed the finish line in order to prevent possible accident to the spectators who overflowed the course.

The time of the racers was comparatively slow owing to the intricate and dangerous course, and there were numerous minor mishaps, but nothing serious transpired.

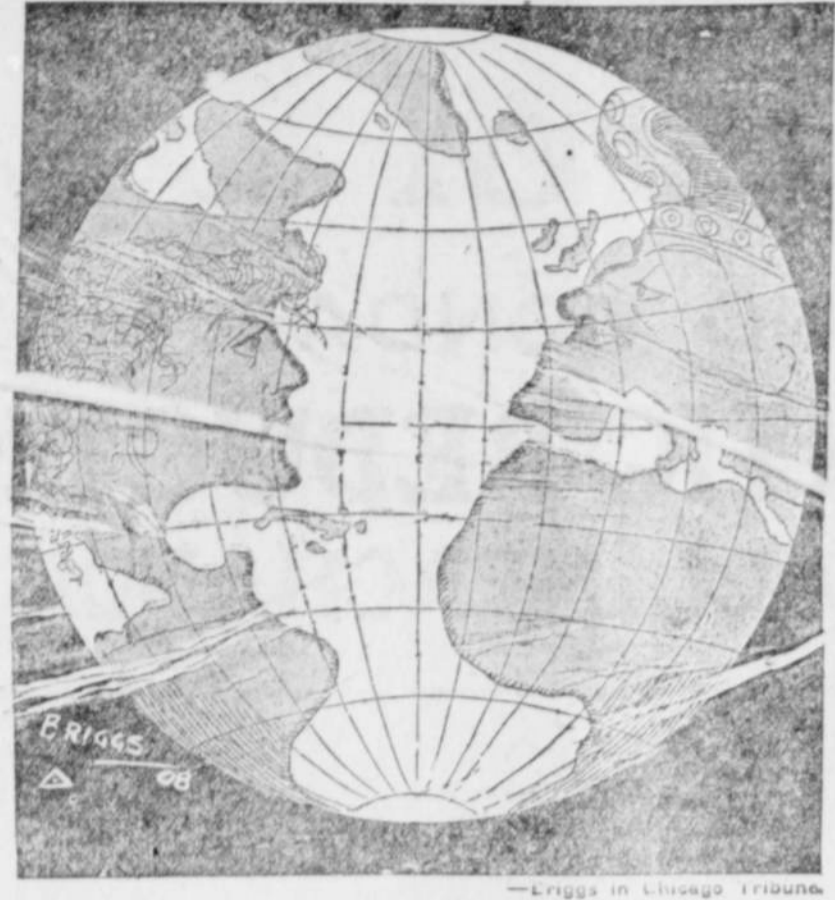
Strang took the lead early in the race and won in five hours, fourteen minutes, thirteen and one-fifth seconds.

McMinnville, April 24.—Willamette won out in fine shape at the state prohibitive oratorical contest held in this city tonight, the representative of the Salem institution taking first place. Miss Mary Gittins represented Willamette, and the subject of the oration that won first place was "The Need of Prohibition." It was delivered in a most effective manner, and the verdict of the judges met with general approval. Nott, of McMinnville, won second place with the oration, "Historic Warnings or National Peril." Third place went to A. C. Allen, of Pacific University, who spoke on the "Twentieth Century Renaissance." Lillian McVickers, of Dallas, whose theme was "My Country Shall be Pure," won fourth. S. B. Luce, of O. A. C., carried off fifth honors with "A Crying Need." "How Long Shall King Alcohol Reign?" was the subject of Beulah Spalding, of Pacific College, who was given sixth place, and John M. Mason, of Philomath, brought up in the rear with "The Need of Prohibition."

JEFFREY SECURES DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY

Portland, Or., April 24.—John A. Jeffrey is the Democratic nominee for congress from the second district. He won the nomination from Andrew Jackson Derby by a narrow majority of 145 votes, victory coming to him by reason of his having 755 majority in Multnomah county. The fight for the Democratic nomination has been a very close one. Derby has been in the lead in practically all the counties outside Multnomah in the second district. In Multnomah, however, the home of Jeffrey, Derby did not fare so well, receiving 538 votes to 1293 cast for Jeffrey. This majority of 755 saved the day for Jeffrey, by an approximate majority of 145.

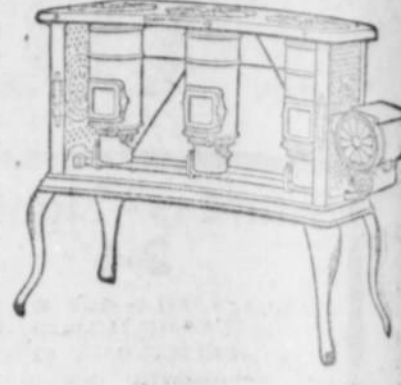
LAW'S LIMIT FOR HIGHWAY ROBBERY

Portland, April 24.—Eddy Ives and Frank Rathke were sentenced to 20 years in the state penitentiary in the circuit court this afternoon when they pleaded guilty to the charge of highway robbery. The sentence given them is the maximum and is evidence of the court's intention to stamp out the crime by administering severe penalties in the hope that it will have a deterrent effect on others engaged in the same crimes.

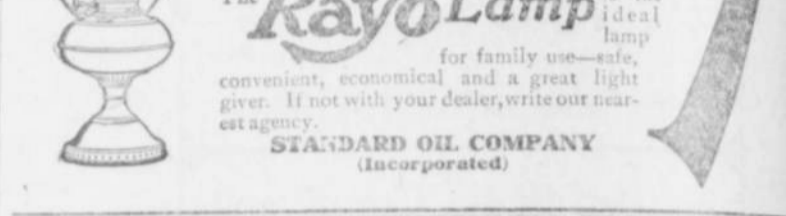
