ROBERT BOYD, FROM KANSAS, BUYS ONE OF BEST WHEAT FARMS IN WESTERN OREGON

J. R. Hill, formerly county commissioner, today sold his fine 800-acre farm, lying five miles southwest of Junction City, to Robert Boyd, recently from Kansas, for \$21,000, the deeds having been passed today. The Garrett Real Estate Company made the sale.

This is one of the finest, as well as one of the largest wheat farms in Western Oregon. Mr. Hill is one of Lane county's best farmers and his place has attained a high state of cultivation. He will probably remove to Eugene and retire from active business. Mr. Boyd arrived in Eugene only a few days ago.

WIDOWS' PENSIONS ARE INCREASED

The widows of old soldiers in Eugene and Lane county are rejoicing over the fact that the Salloway pension bill, increasing their pensions, has been adopted by both houses of congress, and is now a law. Their pensions will hereafter be \$12 per month. Widows should understand that no application and no services of an attorney are necessary to secure them the increase under this law. Those who are on the roll will have their pensions increased at the next payment by the pension bureau without any action on their part. The only application necessary will be from those who have heretofore been denied pensions on account of having an income in excess of \$250. This qualification has now been abolished and those who have heretofore been rejected for that reason can now apply and receive their pensions.

GAMBLING CASE FROM COTTAGE GROVE

Constable Plank went to Cottage Grove last night and placed Andy Graham under arrest on the charge of permitting gambling to be carried on in his hotel there. He appeared before Judge Bryson, of the Eugene justice court, this forenoon, and pleaded not guilty, demanding a jury trial. The case was set for tomorrow afternoon at 1 o'clock.

Philadelphia, April 25.—The feat of the performance of hundreds of athletes at the annual relay and field sports held on Franklin field today under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania, were of the highest order. One world's record, that for the pole vault, was broken by W. R. Dray, of Yale (12 feet 6 1/2 inches). Dray tried to clear 12 feet 10 inches, but was too tired. The University of Pennsylvania won the blue ribbon event of the meet, the mile relay, for the championship of the United States. Her only opponent was Chicago, who ran Pennsylvania to a sensational finish.

PITTSBURG BANKERS LOOKING TOWARD OREGON
The Fish Lake water system is under option to J. S. and W. S. Kuhn, of Pittsburg and New York, two of the wealthiest bankers of the smoky city. They are heavily interested in water and irrigation corporations, owning over 40 waterworks plants in various parts of the country. They are at present building immense irrigation works at Twin Falls, Idaho, which are among the greatest in the world, and will eventually cover 500,000 acres of land at a cost of \$10,000,000.

The deal is now at a point where the land owners can decide whether the works are to be built immediately, or not. INCREASE FOR INDIAN WAR VETERANS
Washington, April 27.—A favorable report was today ordered on Senator Ankeny's bill increasing the pensions of Indian war veterans and their widows from \$8 to \$12 per month. The committee declined to report a bill which would place these veterans on the same footing as service pensioners of the civil war, whose maximum pension is \$29 a month.
