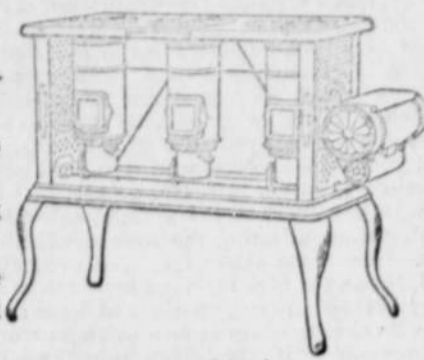

BELLE GUNNESS'
MURDER FORTUNE

La Porte, Ind., May 18.—In her campaign of murder Mrs. Belle Guinness is said to have carried on a very profitable "business," which, according to the latest figures obtainable netted her \$55,000. A tabulation which follows shows how she obtained sums of money from these victims:
M. Sorenson, first husband, life insurance, \$8000.
Peter Guinness, second husband, life insurance, \$4000.
Charles Erdman, Newcastle, Indiana, \$5000.
Ole Budsparg, Iola, Wisconsin, \$2,000.
John E. Moe, Elbow Lake, Minnesota, \$1500.
Andrew K. Heigell, Aberdeen, South Dakota, \$2900.
George Berry, Tuscola, Illinois, \$1500.
Henry Gerhalt, Iola, Wisconsin, \$1000.
From fire insurance on Guinness home in Chicago, \$3500.
In addition to these sums Mrs. Guinness is supposed to have received \$1000 each from four men whose bodies were found on the "murder" farm, and \$1000 each from fifteen men with whom the woman had been corresponding. This makes a grand total of \$55,000 which Mrs. Guinness is supposed to have received. The authorities have failed so far to learn what the woman did with this money. It is thought the \$720 which she put in the bank shortly before her home was consumed by the flames was all the money that was left. It is likely she invested most of the money she took from her victims in real estate.

DIVINITY SCHOOLS'
NAME CHANGED TO
BIBLE UNIVERSITY

The board of regents of the Eugene Divinity School has changed the name of the institution to the Eugene Bible University, and the articles of incorporation have been amended so that the scope and work of the school is enlarged. The institution has been steadily growing since its organization, over twelve years ago, and it has been deemed advisable to add other departments and to increase the number of instructors. When the new term begins in September there will be several additional members of the faculty, and new departments will have been added by that time. The new stone building, now in course of erection, will be ready for occupancy then and there will be facilities to handle a much larger number of students than at present. There are 53 students in the Divinity School proper at the present time and the total enrollment, including those in the school of music, the school of oratory, and the preparatory department, is 125. The school had only four students the first year of its existence.
Commencement Exercises
The commencement exercises of the school will begin next Sunday, May 17, with the baccalaureate sermon, which will be delivered by Rev. C. Hilton, of Milton, Oregon. The program for Sunday and the day following is as follows:

VINEGAR AND CIDER
FACTORY TO BE BUILT

N. A. Reynolds, of this city, formerly in the real estate business, has let a contract to Soren Jensen for the erection of a frame building, 50x100 feet in dimensions, and one story high, to be erected on his lot at the corner of West Second and Blair streets, in the Blair Street addition, for a cider and vinegar factory. Mr. Jensen will begin the work of erecting the building on the 20th of this month, and will have it completed and ready for the machinery some time before the apple crop in the fall is ready to be utilized at the factory.
Mr. Reynolds has ordered his machinery from Mt. Gilead, Ohio, and it will be here in the course of a few weeks. Besides cider and vinegar, it is proposed to manufacture apple butter and cider jelly and perhaps other products of similar nature.
The plant will not be built on a very extensive scale, but as the business increases more machinery will be added from time to time. However, Mr. Reynolds expects to pay a large sum each year for apples, and the plant will be a wealth-creating means among the farmers and fruit-growers.

TWELVE INJURED IN

Columbus, May 19.—The Norfolk & Western passenger train was wrecked by spreading rails two miles west of here today. There was but one coach on the train, in which twenty people were riding. This coach turned over, injuring about twelve people.

LAST DAY'S SESSION
OF STATE GRANGE

(From Friday's Daily Guard.)
Most of this forenoon's session of the state grange was taken up with the discussion of matters pertaining to taxation. A tax committee appointed at last year's session to investigate the various systems of assessments and taxation in the state reported, and the report was adopted. The report was a most interesting and instructive one.
The regular tax committee reported in favor of a state tax commission and also in favor of classified assessments.

A resolution in favor of the public accounting system for all public officers was adopted. Under that system each officer is required to make public his accounts.
Following are the resolutions in full on the right of recall and on the district representation system:

Recall Resolution.
Whereas, Since the beginning of civilization it has been one of the fundamental principles of business that an employer had the right to discharge an incompetent or unfaithful employee; and
Whereas, The voters of Oregon have for years gone to the ballot box on election day to employ their public officials, and are not given the power to discharge them should they prove unfaithful to their trust; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Oregon State Grange in session assembled, That we approve and endorse the proposed amendment to the constitution of Oregon known as the recall amendment, and such as is now submitted to the voters of this state for the coming June election.

Single District System
Whereas, The Oregon State Grange—together with other granges and conventions—has gone on record favoring the election of our state senators and representatives by the single district system; and
Whereas, This system would divide the state into 60 representative and 30 senatorial districts, and thus by creating smaller districts would bring the choice of a legislative member nearer home to the people and place their actions under a more careful scrutiny; therefore be it

Resolved, by the Oregon State Grange in session assembled, that we reaffirm our stand for this system, and that a committee of seven (7) members be created by the state master to give the subject a thorough study and frame an amendment providing for the same, to be introduced at the next session of the legislature, such bill to contain in part the following provisions:

1. Each district to contain only one member.
2. Cities to be divided separately from the balance of the county where such cities contain a sufficient population for one or more members.
3. The distribution of the members of both houses to be made according to counties approximately at the same ratio as now.

Degree Work Last Night
Last night at the armory a large class of candidates was given the higher degrees of the order. 54 receiving the 3rd and 7th degrees. The work was put on well and was very impressive. It lasted till about midnight.

Yesterday afternoon, after The Guard's report of the day's work had been handed in, the following business was transacted:
A resolution was adopted favoring a law to be passed at the next session of the legislature restricting bill board advertising along the public highways.

The committee on education recommended that the school money be distributed to the districts according to the number of teachers and not the number of pupils. It also recommended manual training in the public schools and that Master Buxton and Lecturer Waldo be appointed as a committee to act in conjunction with a like committee from the legislature embodying these principles. It was recommended that the county treasurers receive and pay all warrants to school teachers. The report was adopted.
Memorial services were held during the latter part of the afternoon in memory of John R. Waldo, of Macleay grange; Mrs. W. D. Hare, of Washington county; W. P. Anderson, of Linn county, and J. B. McPherson, of Washington county.

BIG CHIEF UMAPINE
BUYS A BUBBLE

Pendleton, May 18.—Umapine, sub-chief of the Umatilla tribe and one of the wealthiest Indians on the reservation near this city, has ordered a motor buggy from a local firm, and so far as is known is the first Indian in the Northwest to take a fancy to the horseless carriage. Umapine is one of the most progressive Indians on the reservation, and for several weeks has been hanging around the automobile garages, looking anxiously at the big machines. He finally decided on a motor buggy valued at \$500. He will have a half-breed nephew for a chauffeur, it is said, and will use the buggy in making his daily trips to the city. He owns a large tract of wheat land and is very prosperous. Two years ago Umapine startled local storekeepers by buying a \$40 alligator hand grip before starting for Washington, District of Columbia, to confer with the Indian commissioner. He is a full blood Walla Walla Indian, belonging to the Umatilla tribe.
