SAYS LOCATOR SHOWED HIM WRONG TIMBER

Lloyd Bellman, who is employed in the clothing department of F. E. Dunn's store, today began suit up the circuit court against Warren Nichols to recover \$1004, which represents the amount the plaintiff is out in filing on a piece of timber land, together with interest from February, 1907.

Bellman alleges that he and Ernest R. Gilstrap, Chas. K. Komp and Gilliam T. Kitchon engaged the defendant to locate them on four quarter sections of timber land in township 19 south of ranges 9 and 10 west. He alleges that the defendant showed them some good timber and they duly paid him \$200 each, as a locating fee, and made their filings with the land office. Before they made their final proof, the plaintiff alleges, he discovered that the land they filed upon was not what they were shown, but land far inferior. Therefore he seeks to recover the \$800, expenses incurred in filing on the land, with interest, the total amount reaching \$1004. John M. and Geo. A. Pipes are the attorneys for the plaintiff.

REPUBLICANS WIN ALL BUT SHERIFF

The entire Republican county ticket was elected Monday with the exception of sheriff by pluralities ranging as high as 1500 and over. Lee ran away from Stewart in the race for county clerk, and Keeney from Stevens for assessor, by big majorities that approximate the full Republican plurality in the county. Dillard had an easy race, there being no Democrat out for the office. Bowen, Democrat, beat Griffin, Republican, by about 900 majority with the legislative Republican ticket was elected without any serious inroads on the Republican majority. Nation, advocating Statement No. 1, led with the highest vote, Bean being second and Calkins third. Edmundson's vote was considerably larger than that of Knowles.

St. Bryson is again elected justice of the peace.

Salem, May 28.—Judge Barnett, in the circuit court today, sentenced J. Thoburn Ross, the Portland banker, to five years imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$576.094. Ross was convicted of wrongful conversions of the state school funds in his capacity as president of the Title Guarantee & Trust Company. He will be confined in the Multnomah county jail, and will be allowed to reduce his fine at the expiration of his regular term of imprisonment at the rate of \$2 a day. Pending appeal he will be released under \$5000 bonds. He took his sentence with apparent indifference.

BANDITS HOLD UP GT. NORTHERN TRAIN

Great Falls, May 30.—The Great Northern train from Shelby Junction, due to arrive here at 10 o'clock, was held up by masked robbers at the stockyards, about two miles west of the city, tonight. No attempt was made on the mail or express cars, but the robbers, who are said to have been mere boys, went through the passenger coaches and made all the male passengers "dig up." They succeeded in getting somewhere between \$200 and \$300, the biggest loss being by a man who was compelled to give up \$100. The night was pitch dark and the train was stopped by turning a switch. As soon as the train stopped a fusillade of shots was heard, the purpose being the scaring of the train people and passengers. One or two men jumped off the train, and one of these, William Dempsey, of Augusta, got a bullet in his leg, breaking it. He was made to get back on the train while the robbers collected from the passengers. Ladies were told that they would not be interfered with, but every male passenger was ordered to dig up at the point of a gun. The robbers, of whom there are said to have been seven, escaped in the darkness, and although sheriffs and police are now hunting for them, so far no trace of them has been found.

STEPHEN MERIAU SENT TO INSANE ASYLUM

Stephen Meriau, who established Meriau's park, now known as Banes' park, north of the city, a dozen years ago, was committed to the insane asylum at Salem today by County Judge Chrisman, the examining physicians being Drs. L. W. Brown and W. L. Cheshtre. Mr. Meriau, whose

age is 76, has lost a great deal of money since coming to Eugene, and that fact, together with ill health, has unbalanced his mind. He was well off in property when coming here, but has lost from time to time most all he possessed. His many friends hope he may recover soon.

GENERAL LEE ANSWERS LAST ROLL CALL

New Orleans, May 28.—A special from Vicksburg, Miss., states that General Stephen D. Lee, commander-in-chief of the United States Confederate Veterans and one of the last of three surviving lieutenant-generals at the residence of Captain W. T. Riddy. Over exertion last Thursday at the ceremonies attending the reunion of the Iowa and Wisconsin veterans of the Grand Army of the Republic at Vicksburg brought on the illness which ended in his death. General Lee was born in South Carolina in 1823, and received his military education at West Point. He entered the Confederate service at the outbreak of the war and rose to the rank of lieutenant-general. He succeeded the late General John B. Gordon as commander of the Confederate veterans.

COUNCIL PASSES ORDINANCE FOR MORE PAVING

More paving ordinances were passed by the city council at a special meeting last night, despite the strenuous protest of a number of property owners along some of the streets proposed to be paved. The ordinance covers the following: Olive street, from Fifth to Tenth; 7th street, from Olive to Oak; Sixth street, from Olive to Willamette; Oak street, from Seventh to Ninth; the width of the paving on Olive, Fifth, Sixth and Tenth streets was fixed at 42 feet; the width on Elm, sixth street was fixed at 34 feet; on Oak street at 38 feet. The ordinance was unanimously passed, and the recorder was instructed to advertise for bids.

The ordinance providing for the paving of the park streets was deferred, as the width of the sidewalks along the property side of the streets could not be definitely determined. The matter was referred to the city engineer and street committee to investigate and report an ordinance for paving same at the next meeting.

S. E. FINNEGAN'S NEW BLACKSMITH SHOP OPEN

ONE OF THE MOST UP-TO-DATE PLACES ON THE COAST—ELECTRIC POWER FOR FORGES AND MACHINERY

S. E. Finnegan, who has conducted a blacksmith shop in the McFarland building at the corner of West Eighth and Olive streets for the past several years, this morning began business in his new shop in his own brick block on Olive street just in the rear of the old shop. This shop is one of the most up-to-date places of its kind on the coast, and contains all the latest appliances and machinery known to the trade. There are three forges, built of brick and furnished with wind for the fires by an electric fan located in the basement of the building. The drills are also operated by an electric motor. The horseshoeing, wood-working and wagon and carriage departments of the shop are all separate and in charge of high-class workmen. Mr. Finnegan having personal supervision over all departments. The tire heating and cooling furnaces are inside the building, something out of the ordinary, the usual thing being to heat the tires by a fire out of doors.

Traveling men who have seen Mr. Finnegan's new shop all say that it beats anything they ever saw in their territory, and all of them take occasion to congratulate Mr. Finnegan upon his enterprise in establishing such a plant in this city.

After a few days, when everything is in good working order, the public is invited to inspect the shop. Mr. Finnegan will take great pleasure in showing visitors through the place.

JACOBS RECEIVES HEAVY SENTENCE

(From Friday's Daily Guard.) Jos. Jacobs, the West Eighth street store keeper, who was arrested last Saturday night for selling liquor at his residence, and convicted Wednesday by a jury of the offense, was sentenced by Judge Bryson, of the justice court, this afternoon to pay a fine of \$500 and to serve a 30-day term in the county jail. This is the maximum penalty. Jacobs' attorney, Fred M. DeNeffe, immediately served notice of appeal to the circuit court. After sentence was pronounced Judge Bryson took occasion to lecture the accused on the error of his ways and to admonish him hereafter to observe the law. The evidence introduced at the trial brought out the fact that Jacobs had been selling liquor at his house in the presence of his children, and that he began to break the law again soon after his first arrest and conviction, which resulted in a fine of \$100, the judge giving him a light fine upon his promise to quit the business.

SHERIFF'S OFFICE FOR TWENTY-FIVE YEARS

Harry Bown is elected sheriff in his Republican county, the only Democrat elected. History repeats itself in this instance, the county campaign of 1884 ending in the election of our one Democrat, J. R. Campbell, the candidate for sheriff.

It is a frustrating county, so far as politics goes, in this county, the minority party seeming to be able to elect their candidate a good part of the time to the office about which the heat of the political battle never fails to focus. Going away back to 1872 we find J. N. Foidoxter, Democrat sheriff for two terms, succeeded by S. B. Eakin, Republican, who made the record of holding the office three full terms. He was succeeded by J. M. Shelley, Republican, who held the office one term, being succeeded by J. R. Campbell, Democrat, who held the office two terms. His successor, J. M. Sloan, Republican, held two terms with the office again fell into the hands of the Democrats in the person of J. E. Noland, for two terms. A. J. Johnson, Republican, then held it two terms, his successor, W. W. Withers, Democrat, being murdered in his third term in the performance of his duty.

With Sheriff Withers the sea-saw ended, his first deputy, Fred Fink, present sheriff, being appointed to fill the unexpired term, with a subsequent election. And now his former deputy, Harry Bown, Democrat, has been elected by a big majority.

A rather singular co-incidence is the prominence of the initial letter "J" in the given names of so many of the sheriffs named, J. N. Foidoxter, J. M. Shelley, J. R. Campbell, J. M. Sloan, J. E. Noland and A. J. Johnson, all except the first named serving consecutively.
