THOUSANDS ARE SUFFERING FROM TOPEKA FLOOD

Topeka, June 9.—About seven thousand persons have been driven from their homes in North Topeka, by the flood of the Kaw. The major portion found shelter in Topeka proper, where the auditorium, school buildings and private homes were opened to them. No loss of life is reported, but there is a heavy property loss.

The crest of the flood reached Topeka this morning at 3 o'clock, and at 9 o'clock a fall of three inches was registered. Railroad traffic is demoralized.

ST. LOUIS PREPARES FOR EXPECTED FLOOD

St. Louis, June 9.—The Mississippi river in this vicinity is one-tenth of a foot above the danger line. Preparations to meet flood conditions, which are expected within three days, when the flood waters new inundating Topeka and Kansas City will reach here.
