ALUMNI ELECT ALDERMAN AS PRESIDENT

In honor of his services during the recent referendum campaign, Superintendent L. R. Alderman of the city schools was elected president of the University of Oregon Alumni Association this morning, in the annual meeting of that body. Alderman was elected first vice-president, Dr. F. J. Zeigler, second vice-president, and A. R. Tiffany secretary and treasurer. The old members of the athletic council were re-elected. They are C. N. McArthur, Judge L. T. Harris, and Geo. Hug.

A vote of thanks was extended to all the newspapers and commercial organizations and other friends who aided in the winning of the \$125,000 appropriation. Among the other important business attended to was the turning over to the University of Oregon Associated students the grandstand on Kincaid field. Judge E. O. Potter was re-elected custodian of the sinking fund, and the money of which is used as a loan to help along needy students. This sum amounts to about \$300. It was also decided to make a contract with the Oregon Weekly to issue that paper for the Alumni as a body.

The dues of the Association were raised from 50 cents to one dollar. A vote of thanks was extended to the Legislative committee and their reports accepted. Congratulations were read from the Alumni of Willamette University on the success of the appropriation measure.

Resolutions.

The resolutions of the Alumni were as follows: Whereas during the recent campaign for the passage of the University appropriation bill, statements were made that the Alumni and friends of the University of Oregon are opposed to the development and perfection of the public school and high school system of the state, and whereas: Such statements are altogether incorrect, it being a matter of record that the University has always stood as a friend of the entire public school system, therefore be it Resolved, by the Alumni Association of the University of Oregon that we pledge our continued support, both as an organization and as individuals to all measures that will provide additional funds for the common schools, and also for measures designed to establish additional high schools and to perfect those already established.

We favor the raising of additional funds for the common schools by indirect taxation as far as possible, and we also favor the establishment of union high schools to the end that all pupils who have finished the eighth grade may have the opportunity of completing the high school course without leaving their homes. We believe that the common school fund should be increased to such an extent that every school district in Oregon will be able to conduct a term of at least eight months during the school year. We believe that the state of Oregon should have a public school system equal, if not superior to that of any state in the Union.

Three hundred Oregon Alumni with their friends sat down under the banquet tents on the campus at one o'clock today, and amid toasts, songs and celebration, for nearly two hours, held their annual banquet. The dishes were plentiful, rare and good to the taste, from the remarks made by the oldest Oregon graduates. Six musical pieces had been taken by Miss Parker, matron of the dormitory, that tomatoes were secured, though they had to be brought from Florida and Mexico.

Faculty Concert.

The faculty concert received great applause last night at the close of the second day of Commencement at the University. The numbers were all liked, though the audience was disappointed that Professor Glen could not render one of his well known solos, on account of the death of his father.

The orchestra under the direction of Professor Reed played three selections with encores. The choice of each was carefully made, and fitted well in the mood of the 1200 people present.

ROOSEVELT AIDS GRAFT HUNTERS

San Francisco, June 22.—"You have heart-breaking difficulties with which to contend. You have to fight, not only the banded powers of evil, but the supineness and indifference of many good men upon whose zealous support you had a right to feel that you could rely." Thus writes President Roosevelt in a letter to Rudolph Spreckels, which has just been made public, offering encouragement to those who are conducting the graft prosecution. "Do not be discouraged; do not flinch," he continues in his lengthy letter. "You are in a fight for plain decency, for the plain democracy of the plain people, who believe in honesty and in fair dealing as between man and man."

WILLIAMS GIVES UP MINORITY LEADERSHIP.

Eufaula, Ala., June 20.—Announcement of the resignation of Congressman John Sharp Williams from the minority leadership of the house was made yesterday by Congressman H. D. Clayton, chairman of the Democratic caucus. Mr. Williams, in a letter to Mr. Clayton, declares that in his retirement he is actuated solely by the belief that it is best for the party. Mr. Williams' letter says he has long contemplated this step owing to ill health. He resigns now that his successor may benefit by the training of the short session.

JEAN RED CAPTURES REAL ENGLISH LORD.

London, June 23. With King Edward and Queen Alexandra smiling approval from their private gallery, Jean Reid, daughter of Whitehall Reed, American ambassador to England, was married this afternoon in the Chapel Royal of St. James Palace to Honorable John Hubert Ward, brother of the Earl of Dudley and Esquary in waiting to the King.

NEWS OF LOWER SIUSLAW PART OF LANE COUNTY

The postoffice at Alene has been moved from W. T. Carle's place to Mr. Ferguson's residence near the Alder Ridge schoolhouse. T. J. Biron and family and his mother, Mrs. Kennedy, started Monday on their way to Lakeview, Oregon. They will make the trip with teams and expect to be on the road about two weeks, stopping a few days with relatives at Cottage Grove. The Saubert mill is sawing out timbers to build a set of ways at Acme on which vessels can be hauled out to be repaired when necessary. As soon as the ways are completed the schooner Coguille will be put on dry dock, and some work done on the hull. Jesse Rounds and partner, L. B. Caultfield, came in from Eugene for a look at their property near Florence where they propose to engage in raising cranberries. They returned to Eugene on yesterday's stage. Ralph Hunt came in from Eugene the first of the week and is at work surveying the grounds of the Tallicooms Lake Club, a few miles south of town. He will divide the ground up into lots and survey out the streets. — Florence West.

TWO GUILTY; TWO NOT GUILTY OF FRAUDS.

Washington, June 21.—Hyde & Schneider were found guilty; Benson and Diamond not guilty. The jury came into the court from late this afternoon and rendered the verdict. The court thanked the members and released them from further service. The jury had been out since one o'clock Friday afternoon. Washington, June 22.—The jury in the Hyde-Benson-Schneider-Diamond case reported to the court this morning they were unable to agree and were sent back for further consultation. The quartet was indicted four years ago for alleged conspiracy to defraud the government of land.

Obituary.

Rev. Andrew M. Sweeney was born November 11, 1841, in Jackson county, Ind., and moved with his parents to Davis county, Mo., in 1848. He was a soldier in the civil war, enlisting in 1861 and serving during the entire war in the Union army, his service being mostly in Missouri. He united with the Christian church in 1866 and became a minister in that church, being ordained in 1871. He was married to Miss Belle Terry November 11, 1872, at Gallatin, Mo., and as a result of that union eight children were born, of which seven are living; the oldest and two other sons are in Canada, three sons reside at home in Eugene, and the only daughter, Mrs. J. A. Powell, resides south of Cottage Grove. Rev. Sweeney moved to Nebraska in 1877, from thence to Washington in 1885, where he was pastor of the First Christian church of Tacoma, which was built during his pastorate. He came to Oregon in 1887 and moved to Canada in 1898, returning to Oregon in 1904. He has three brothers and sisters surviving, one brother and two sisters in Eugene and the others are in Missouri. He died June 19, 1908. The funeral service will be held from the Christian church on Thursday, June 18, at 2 p. m., and interment will be in the Masonic cemetery.

GOOD WORK ON ROAD TO LORANE

The south Lorane road, or rather the McKernan road to Lorane, which is now undergoing improvement, presents a most pleasing appearance, especially to those who have to travel it in the winter time, says the Cottage Grove Western Oregon. The road has only been opened to the public three years, and when opened, that was about all that could be said about it. Since then, with the exception of a little volunteer work, the road has been neglected until this season. This spring through private contribution of the many citizens of Cottage Grove, special tax levied by the people living between here and Lorane, assisted by the county court, aggregating \$1650, the work is made possible. M. B. Stone of Lorane, was given the general superintendency with Curtis Veatch, assistant. Mr. Stone took direct charge of the work on the Lorane end and Mr. Veatch on this.

The work is being accomplished from both ends, a crew working from this side to the top of the grade and another from the Lorane side. The grade is one of the best established in this section and the work throughout is being done in the most painstaking way. The only thing to be regretted is that there is not more funds available to the end that the road may be complete in every detail.
