PROSECUTION IS SHARPLY ATTACKED BY MALARKEY

Portland, Or., July 3.—Some time this evening a verdict is expected from the jury in the case of James Henry Booth. The closing argument of the defense has been made and T. C. Becker, for the prosecution, is now closing. By 5 o'clock it is believed the court will instruct the jury. County Judge L. R. Webster, having argued for the defense yesterday afternoon, ex-State Senator Dan Malarkey, followed this morning and continued this afternoon.

In his argument to the jury, Malarkey took occasion to send a few hot shots into the Government officials who are connected with the prosecution of the ex-receiver of the Roseburg Land Office. Malarkey declared it was an unequal struggle, for the Government has the machinery to bring the men from all parts of the United States to hand Booth. He said Becker was brought from New York, W. J. Burns from San Francisco, and it had money to hire spies to inquire as to the sentiment of the jurors. The lawyer declared that Burns was brought from California for the benefit, his influence would have on Frederick A. Kriba, the timber operator, who gave Booth the check for which the latter is now being tried for bribery. He told of how Richard Scott was rejected as a juror by the Government, after Scott had been followed by a Government spy for months. Just as all men profess to be who would have anything to do with the case.

UNIQUE FRESCO IN OTTO'S ESTABLISHMENT

Otto Kauffman opened his renovated establishment yesterday, and though the weather was cool, a steady throng poured through the doors for the dainties which were heaped on the counters and the fountains and kitchens. The opening began yesterday noon, when a special merchants' dinner was prepared. But the best effects of the unique decorations did not appear until evening, when the lights cast their rays over the furnishings of the interior.

While the fountain is new and expensive and the decorations in taste, the one thing that attracted the most notice was the unique fresco pennants around the room. By great effort colors of clubs and colleges from all over the United States were gathered together, as well as local organizations, so that a person from any part of the United States may see some pennant which he is familiar with.

HARRY ORCHARD MAY BECOME TRUSTY.

Boise, Idaho, July 2.—It was not until it had been fully explained to him that under the law of the state as well as under the common law he was entitled to his life that Harry Orchard became reconciled to the action of the Idaho Board of Pardons in commuting his sentence to life imprisonment. All preparations had been made at the penitentiary for his execution today, and Orchard apparently full expected to pay the penalty. Last night the death watch was removed and Orchard took his place with the other-life prisoners.

It is not unlikely that he will be made a trusty. Warden Whitney has not yet decided at what work he will be placed, but he may be given a special position.

Orchard has written this statement: "I have hoped at all times that my sentence would not be commuted to life imprisonment. My one thought has been ever since I started to lead a new life to make all the earthly realizations within my power for wrong doing, regardless of the consequences to myself or anyone else. This shall ever be my first motive in life under whatever circumstances I may be placed."

SOCIALIST LABOR PARTY WILL NOT HAVE DEBS.

New York, July 2.—The name of Eugene V. Debs, candidate for president on the Socialist party ticket, was presented for endorsement unexpectedly today at the convention of the Socialist labor party here. Debs was practically read out of the Socialist labor party at Chicago some time ago and the presentation today created an uproar and was the subject of a stormy discussion until the session adjourned this evening. The convention finally decided it would later send the Socialist Party Unity League its answers why Debs could not be endorsed.

BUILDING LOGGING RAILROAD OUT OF WENDLING

The Booth-Kelly Lumber Co., has started a force of 60 or 70 men at work building a logging railway from Wendling, six or seven miles up the Mohawk. The work will be finished in 75 or 80 more are wanted at once. The company is now gathering the men together and it is probable that there will be no more trouble in securing them, as there are a good many idle laborers in the state at present.

The company will ship the equipment for the new road from the East and it is expected that it will arrive by the time the road is completed. The equipment consists of several small locomotives and a number of log cars.

MRS. COLTON EMBARRASSED BY BANK WRECKERS.

Washington, July 1.—Financially embarrassed by the embezzlement of \$285,000 by W. J. Barnett and J. J. Brown, trustees of the estate of Mrs. Ella Colton, are going to sell her palatial residence, 617 Connecticut avenue, Washington. Although the estate is worth millions of dollars, the loss of the securities reduced the ready cash to such a point that thousands of dollars in debts and taxes remain unpaid.

Convictions at San Francisco of J. Dalzell Brown and W. J. Barnett of embezzlement in the Colton securities made it impossible for the estate to secure judgment against the defunct California Safe Deposit & Trust company, the matter having been made personal. The conviction of its officers as individuals freed the bank from liability.

Conrad P. Sime and R. G. Donaldson have been appointed trustees of the Colton estate and instructed by the court to sell the mansion. The trustees are authorized to raise a levy of \$50,000 pending the sale of the property.
