COHEN PASSES WORTHLESS CHECKS AND IS ARRESTED

(From Thursday's Daily Guard.) H. A. Cohen, a former Eugene junk dealer, was arrested at Roseburg this morning, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses.

Several days ago Cohen came to Eugene from Portland and loaded a car of junk for shipment to that city. After banking hours he went to Scott & Dodge's store and presented a check for \$50 on the Merchants' National Bank of Portland, and signed by himself, stating that he needed the money that evening and could not wait until the banks opened the next morning.

It was learned this morning that Cohen also passed a bad check on the Pollock Transfer Company for \$15.

Constable Plank returned Friday morning from Roseburg, where he went yesterday afternoon for the purpose of bringing back to Eugene E. H. Cohen, a former Eugene junk dealer, who the officers there said they had arrested, a warrant having been sworn out in the Eugene justice court charging him with obtaining money under false pretenses.

When the constable reached Roseburg last evening he found that the officers there had the wrong man, having arrested one Shaman, who was formerly in partnership with Cohen here. When they received word that Cohen was wanted, they suspected that Shaman was the man and placed him under arrest.

He was asked if his name was Cohen, but he evidently misunderstood them and said yes, and produced a letterhead with the firm name of Cohen & Shaman printed thereon. He was locked up and the officers here notified. Constable Plank, who is acquainted with both Cohen and Shaman, saw the mistake as soon as he got there. Cohen, in the meantime, is still at large.

G. F. McMURPHEY NEGOTIATES FOR BIG WHEAT RANCH

Condon, Or., July 9.—Two of the biggest land deals made here for several months were effected this week by E. Curran and J. Q. McElrod. One of the buyers is H. McMurry, of Eugene, who takes possession of the Skelly ranch, situated one mile north of town, for the consideration of \$25,000.

The prices paid for the ranches demonstrate that Gilliam county land is valuable and that the wheat interests have not received a crushing blow on account of reports of poor crops in some sections of the county.

Mr. McMurry, when shown the dispatch this morning, stated that the deal is not yet completed, but that negotiations are being made for the land. He expects to make a trip there soon and something definite will then be known about the matter. The ranch contains over 600 acres, more than 800 acres being in wheat.

WILL BUILD GOVERNMENT TELEPHONE LINE

Supervisor Seltz says the work of building the trail from McKenzie Bridge, along the summit of the mountains, to the north fork of the Willamette river at Box Canyon, a distance of seven miles, will begin in a short time and will be completed some time during the summer. These improvements are all for the benefit of the forest service. There are now 14 or 15 men at work in this capacity in the Cascades east of here under the direction of the Eugene office.
