OREGON WEATHER CONDITIONS FOR PAST WEEK

Following is a general summary of Oregon weather conditions for the week ending Monday, July 20, as reported by the weather bureau:

The mean temperature averaged nearly normal in the eastern counties and four degrees above normal in the western counties. The first three days were relatively cool in the western counties, and the increment of heat was all gained during the last four days, when temperatures of 90 degrees were common and the 100 degree mark was equalled or exceeded in a few localities, except near the coast, where normal temperatures prevailed. In the eastern counties the temperatures were slightly below normal until the last two days of the week, when warmer weather prevailed.

Light rains fell in the Willamette valley, the southwestern counties and along the coast on the 13th and 15th, and daily rains, unusually heavy in places, occurred on the 13th, 14th and 15th in the eastern counties. These rains, although damaging in a few limited localities, were on the whole very beneficial and effectually broke the drought which has prevailed since the third decade of last month.

Other than a few wind squalls accompanying thunder storms, no high winds occurred during the week and the sunshine was about normal.

Coast District.

Newport, Lincoln county.—The weather during the past week has been very warm and dry.

Port Orford, Curry county.—Clear dry weather prevailed during the week, except Monday, when a thunderstorm occurred with a light rain.

Marshfield, Coos county.—A light thunderstorm passed south and southeast of this station Monday evening and there was a light mist on Wednesday afternoon. Clear and moderately warm weather prevailed the rest of the week.

Willamette Valley
Portland, Multnomah county.—The fore part of the week was cool, with much cloudiness and light rain Wednesday. The latter part was warm and dry, with clear skies.

Bull Run, Clackamas county.—The fore part of the week was cloudy with light showers. Friday it cleared and generally clear.

Corvallis, Benton county.—A light thunder shower occurred on Monday. It was cool and partly cloudy until Thursday, since then it has been warm and generally clear.

Salem, Marion county.—The fore part of the week was cloudy and cool, with light showers Wednesday; the latter part was clear and dry.

ONE THOUSAND MEN AT WORK

Elgin, Or., July 20.—Track laying on the extension of the O. R. & N. from Elgin to Joseph is now going on at the rate of one-half mile a day. Work is now going on beyond the mouth of the Willamette river. At present about 400 men are employed at different places along the road, and as soon as the track is extended a distance of several miles, the crew will be increased to over 1,000 men. The road will run into the town of Wallawa by early September.

Chicago, July 21.—The Y. M. C. A. relay race, which began in New York at 10 o'clock last Wednesday morning, ended at the city hall in Chicago today at 9:38 a. m.
