(From Monday's Daily Guard.) Springfield, 7; Coburg, 3. Eugene, 14; Halsey, 7.

Those fans who braved the heat and attended the ball game at Recreation Park yesterday afternoon were treated to a real slugfest by the locals. Everybody in the Campbell-Fellman team connected with the ball and at the end of the game the score stood 14 to 7 in favor of the home team.

In the stick work Eugene has a regular line of sluggers. Halsey tried but three pitchers, but they were all the same kind of meat for the home boys, who kept a scorching path around the stations. Eugene's new men, Mead, Clifford, Moon and Springer, are a fast bunch of experienced ball players and deliver the goods.

MILITARY ROAD GRANT BEING OPENED

The best part of the Oregon Military Road land grant, comprising 300,000 of the total of 500,000 acres, is to be thrown open immediately for settlement, and colonization work has already been begun, says the Oregon States Journal.

The company headed by R. J. Martin of Kansas City, J. H. Borders is secretary and H. C. Shimp is treasurer. These men are the same who successfully put the largest tract ever opened in Colorado on the market last year in the San Luis valley, and built an irrigation dam 80 feet high, storing water for irrigation of a portion of that tract desired for intensified farming.

Clear Title to Land H. A. Hunter, president of the Oregon Military Land Grant company, former owners of the entire 500,000 acres, returned to Portland yesterday on business connected with the formal conveyance of the title to the new company. At the Portland hotel last evening, he said:

"This grant, which extends from the Klamath Indian reservation to Lakeview, and thence through Harney and Malheur counties to the Snake river, should not be confused in the public mind with one or two railroad grants that have litigation over titles. This title to the Oregon Military Road grant is absolutely unquestioned."

It has twice been adjudicated by the government of the United States, which has decided that its validity cannot be challenged. The grant was passed from the government many years ago without any strings to it as to its sale, the price at which it should be sold, or any other complication.

Seek New Industries. The plan adopted by the colonization company is unique, and has been found successful in putting other similar tracts upon the market.

"That the company has great confidence in Southern Oregon climatic conditions and the soil of the lands to be opened for settlement is shown by the fact that they are offering \$1000 and railroad transportation to any one who will make an investigation and show that their printed literature for settlers contains any misrepresentations regarding the lands. They have offered \$50,000 toward starting industries at Lakeview, \$25,000 of which is to go for a bonus to

the first beet sugar factory started there." The lands comprise alternate sections in a strip 12 miles wide through Lake and Harney counties and a portion of Klamath county. These lands are to be divided into 5974 10-acre farms, 4050 20-acre farms, 1020 40-acre farms, 500 80-acre farms, 400 160-acre farms, 12 640-acre farms, and six 1000-acre farms.

One Uniform Price. The contracts for farms sold to settlers are certified by the Pioneer Trust company of Kansas City. The uniform price of each farm, regardless of size, is to be \$200.

Each 10-acre tract is to have five acres of irrigated land. The sum of \$200,000 to be held in trust by the Pioneer Trust company will be devoted to the construction of an irrigation system taking water from the Cottonwood river to irrigate about 1,000 acres in the Goose Lake valley.

There are irrigation projects under consideration by the company in other valleys," said Mr. Hunter, "including Sprague river valley, Drew's valley and Catlow valley. But these are on a limited scale. The largest irrigation project, and one that will be immediately developed, is already surveyed, and will take water from the Cottonwood river.

400 FEET OF CEMENT WALK AT UNIVERSITY

The University will build 400 feet of cement sidewalk along the north side of the campus, where Eleventh street is paved. Filling has already begun and the cement work will also begin as soon as the board of regents meet Saturday and appropriate the funds.

L. M. TRAVIS ARRIVES HOME FROM DENVER

Attorney L. M. Travis arrived home Saturday night from Denver, where he attended the Democratic national convention as a delegate from Oregon. He was greatly delighted with the convention. After the meeting he accompanied a party of newspaper men on a tour of the principal places of interest in Colorado, and took in all that was worth seeing.

MOHAIR MARKET IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Under date of June 1, Messrs. Poppe, Schunhoff & Guttery report the condition of the mohair market at Port Elizabeth as follows: "The depression continued the greater part of last month, but as holders of last year's summer hair accepted the situation and were anxious to make a clearance, a fair amount of business has been done on a basis of about \$4 for average and up to 8 1/2-d for better lots, while new season's summer brought from 7 1/2 d to 8 1/2 d according to quality and length and up to 9 1/2 d for special lots. The new clip is arriving very slowly, being evidently detained up-country by farmers and dealers, and nothing of any consequence has arrived as yet. There is some inquiry for summer kids up to 16d and one or two lots of last year's winter kids have cleared it on 9 d. During the past week the inquiry has become more general, resulting in a fair amount of business on above basis.

RUEF FILES CHARGES AGAINST BURNS

San Francisco, July 18.—An affidavit has been filed in Judge Lawlor's court in which Abraham Ruef charged that 1800 names have been withdrawn from the jury box and the list of these is in possession of Detective W. J. Burns and two of his assistants. Judge Lawlor will hear the matter on Monday.

SIGNAL HONORS FOR WINNING RIFLE TEAM

Washington, July 17.—Signal honors await the American rifle team on its return from the Olympic games at London, where it vanquished the teams of all the leading shooting countries. It is expected the team will reach New York Saturday, July 25, and preparations are being made for a semi-official welcome of an imposing character.

\$150,000 FOR UNIVERSITY IMPROVEMENTS

As the \$125,000 appropriation for the University began to run during the year 1907, there is now a balance of about \$75,000 in favor of the University in the office of the state treasurer. This amount represents the difference between the old appropriation of \$47,500 per year and the new appropriation of \$125,000. This fund will be considerably increased by the time the new buildings are completed, as not more than \$90,000 a year will be required for maintenance. It is estimated that about \$150,000 will be spent for buildings and permanent improvements by September 1, 1909.

Owing to the overcrowded condition of the present buildings, it is quite likely that another recitation hall will be erected between Deady hall and the new library. Other buildings that are being talked of are a large dormitory for women and an addition to the engineering building. Owing to the lateness of the season and the time that will be required for the drawing up of plans, it is unlikely that any work of importance will be commenced before spring.

This means that none of the new buildings will be ready for use before September 1, 1909. There are a number of repairs and improvements, however, that will be made at once, such as the furnishing of the women's clubhouse and the lighting and heating of the library.

President Campbell may go East immediately after the meeting of the board of regents, to secure the services of a number of additional instructors who will be on hand when college opens in September. If he goes he will visit a number of big institutions of learning in the East and Middle West.

The registrar's office is flooded with applications from prospective students, and it is certain that there will be an enrollment of not less than 550 during the coming year. The freshman class will contain upward of 250 students, as compared with a total enrollment of 160 freshmen for last year.

PORTLAND BANK TO BE REORGANIZED

Portland, Or., July 19.—A new title and abstract company has been organized with strong backing and a paid up capital of \$250,000 to succeed to the plant and business of the old Title Guarantee Trust company and the Security Abstract & Trust company. The new company will be known as the Security Title & Trust company. It will occupy quarters in the northwest corner of the Chamber of Commerce building, now occupied by the Security Abstract & Trust company.

Mrs. Marks will fit up her pharmacy in fine shape and in this splendid location will no doubt do a very successful business.
