GEORGE KELLY TELLS HOW TO GET RICH

Portland, July 27.—An indication of the possibilities of lumber manufacture in Oregon was the principal feature of the Booth-Singleton conspiracy trial in the federal court today. This advertisement of how to make money in Oregon lumber was made on the witness stand by George H. Kelly, of the Booth-Kelly Company, the sole remaining stockholder of the original company, which was composed of R. A. Booth and James Henry Booth, now on trial, John F. Kelly and George H. Kelly. All have disposed of their holdings except George. It was in 1898 that the four men, after a partnership, incorporated as the Booth-Kelly Lumber Company, with a capitalization of \$50,000. That was ten years ago. Today the capitalization of the company is \$2,000,000, having been increased from \$50,000 successively to \$100,000, then \$300,000, then to \$1,500,000, until its present aggregate is \$2,000,000. When the corporation was formed James Henry Booth owned three-quarters of the stock, or \$12,500. This stock he gradually disposed of while the remaining three original incorporators and outsiders increased their holdings, until in January, 1904, James Henry Booth sold his remaining stock.
