Yesterday President Roosevelt in a statement made it clear that the entire responsibility was his for the issuing of the order discharging the battalion of negro soldiers for participation in the Brownsville, Tex., rioting and the refusal of permission to suspend that order. This statement relieves Judge Taft from all responsibility in the premises. Governor Johnson, of Minnesota, has sent a special envoy to W. L. Bryan to assure him of the former's support. GREAT FLOUR MILLS CONCERN IN HANDS OF RECEIVERS

Minneapolis, Aug. 8.—Incident to re-organization, certain stockholders in the Pillsbury-Washburn Flour Mills Company today petitioned the federal court for the appointment of a receiver. The petition was granted and the court named C. S. Pillsbury, son of the late C. A. Pillsbury; A. C. Loring, head of the Northwest Consolidated Milling Company, and A. C. Cobb, an attorney.

The petitioners were the Northwestern National Bank, the First National Bank, the Swedish-American National Bank, Minneapolis, and the Second National Bank of St. Paul, together with J. S. Pillsbury. There will be no interruption of the business of the company.

Business Is Profitable. Chicago, Aug. 8.—The capitalization of the Pillsbury-Washburn mills is \$5,000,000, divided equally between common and preferred stock. Outstanding bonds, according to a statement of the company, issued four months ago, amounted to \$4,150,000. The net earnings were \$642,000, against which were interest charges of \$250,000, dividend on preferred stock of \$177,000, and other charges amounting to \$200,000, leaving a balance of \$15,000.

Lee ("Daisy") Wallis, of this city, has purchased J. V. Reed's splendid residence on East Eleventh street, formerly the Park residence, for \$13,500; the deed having been passed yesterday. In exchange Mr. Reed secures the Wallis farm of 141.11 acres in section 34, township 17, south of range 4 west, the consideration given in the deed being \$14,111. Mr. Wallis will probably not live in the residence he has just purchased, as he is a single man, but may lease it to some one. One of his sisters has talked of coming to Eugene to reside, and it may be that she will occupy the house.

COTTAGE GROVE FRUIT DRIER COMPLETED

The exterior of Cottage Grove's fine fruit drier building was completed this week when the painters put the last coat of paint on the building, including the roof, and it presents a very attractive and substantial appearance, says the Leader. The building is 40x80 feet and three stories high. Its furnace and evaporator will be 12x36 feet and this will be completed in time to receive the fall apple and prune crop for drying. A meeting of the stockholders is called for Thursday, August 27, to inspect the new building and outline the season's plan for receiving and drying and handling fruit. It is an enterprise which will be of great benefit to the town and community. A cannery plant will be added to this drier plant later, provisions having been made for this addition when the building was built. The building and evaporator will cost about \$4500.

A rich strike was made in the Sampson mining claim in Bohemia recently, a well-defined five-foot ledge of rich copper and gold-bearing quartz being uncovered.
