Whenever a tagged salmon is caught the fisherman who makes the catch is requested to detach the tag and send it to Henry O'Malley, United States superintendent of fisheries for Oregon, at Oregon City, or to Master Fish Warden H. C. McAlister at Portland. With each of these tags it is urgently requested that the sender give the date of the catch, the condition of the fish and any other information he may be able to impart. The results of these experiments are of importance not only to the fisheries bureau from the viewpoint of science, but to every fisherman in the country as well, and it is desirable that the reports by the various fishermen who catch the tagged fish be forwarded as soon as possible in order that more experiments may be made before the end of the season.

## "BRYAN SURE TO BE ELECTED" SAYS L. M. TRAVIS

"I believe Bryan will be elected," was the opening statement of Lee M. Travis, chairman of the Lane county Democratic central committee, who returned this morning from the notification ceremonies at Lincoln, while talking to a Guard reporter today. "LaFollette is winning more votes for Bryan than forty Democratic speakers," was another remark dropped by the local Democratic leader.

Travis heard a speech by LaFollette in Lincoln, and he said that the partisan Republicans would swear under their breath, while the Democrats would cheer wildly with the LaFollette Republicans. While LaFollette promised to support Taft immediately after his nomination, Attorney Travis quoted him as saying that he (LaFollette) and Bryan were working for the same common cause and common ends.

While not making any direct appeal to the people for Bryan, by creating a distrust in the Republican party and by hammering away at such leaders as Long, of Kansas, who has been downed by LaFollette, and Burkett, of Nebraska, the Wisconsin senator is making thousands of votes for the great "commoner" all over the United States. Moreover, in a general way, the Wisconsin man's sentiments are much the same as the Nebraskan's, he not even hesitating to criticize Roosevelt for permitting the Freeland-Aldrich bill to pass without the president's veto.

### Hearst a Blessing

"Hearst, so far, in the minds of the big Democratic leaders," said Mr. Travis, "has been productive of nothing but good. Instead of disorganizing the party, he has joined all factions, the conservative and more radical members. The Independence party will cut no figure. The papers may have some influence, but they will be offset by such publications as the New York World, which, because Hearst has declared against Bryan, has declared for the Nebraskan. Then, too, the Hearst papers are losing circulation, and their advertising rates are falling, which shows how the tide is turning. Indeed, Mack and Nixon, who are the chief organizers at Lincoln, expressed themselves as heartily hoping that Hearst would keep up the fight against Bryan until the end of the campaign.

"The convention of the Independence party," continued Travis, "was a paid one. Two members from California with whom I talked on the train, said they had gotten their expenses paid, and would support Bryan just the same. At San Francisco they have signed statements to the same effect.

"On the trains it is easy to see how the tide is turning. Regardless of what has been said, a great part of the traveling and commercial men are fighting for Bryan, as are many big commercial houses which no one would ever think would line up in the Democratic column.

"Organized labor is getting behind the Democratic ticket as well as many big firms. Gompers, despite what has been said of him, is exerting a tremendous influence, because behind him there is so much truth that is irresistible.

### Murphy Passes Word

"Boss Murphy," of Tammany, has also passed the word through the ranks of the great New York City machine that Bryan must carry the state. Many Republicans are growing tired of their machine leaders, who are trying to escape nominating Hughes for governor. In case Hughes is nominated it will make one wing of the Republican party extremely sore, while if the New Yorker is turned down another element, probably a greater aid to the Democratic cause, will refuse to support Taft, who would not help them out, but instead said that he would take no part in local factional fights.

### Methods Changing

"Bryan is using different methods," said the county chairman. "Instead of speaking offhand, he now reads his speeches. Formerly the press carried his language and the sense terribly, but now that will be impossible, for each message will be given to every press association and read instead of delivered.

"No man has been more misquoted than Bryan in the political world," was the closing statement of the interview.

### EXAMINATION FOR TEACHERS IN PHILIPPINES

Examinations may be taken on the 25th and 26th of this month for the position of assistant teacher in the Philippines, from which position teachers may work into higher positions as they show their ability. The salary ranges for the first year from \$1000 to \$1200.

The qualifications are about equivalent to a high school education. The places in this state are Baker City, Eugene, Portland and Astoria. Women applicants may apply also, so long as they are either a daughter or close relative, of wife or fiancée of some male teacher, either going or already in the Philippines. The number of positions are limited, however. The salary ranges between \$900 and \$1100.

The school year in the Philippines begins in June and ends in March.

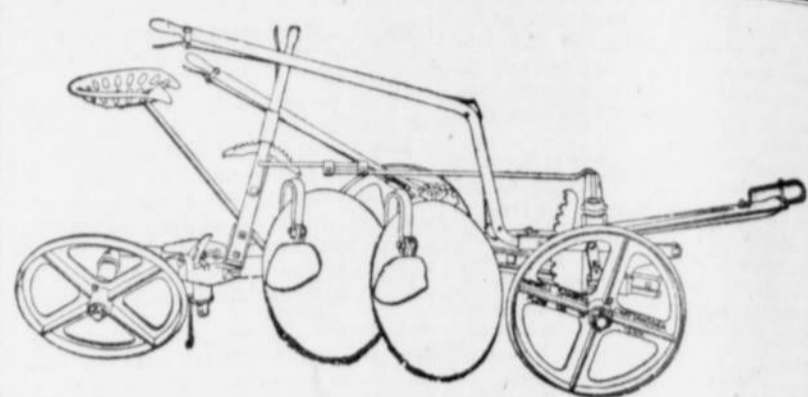
