COTTAGE GROVE SAWMILL WILL BE REBUILT

The McKibben Bros. sawmill, which was burned August 1st, has been rebuilt, new and first-class machinery put in, and inside of two weeks will be running again full blast and with double the former capacity. To hurry the work along a part of the new machinery from their mill northeast of the city was put into this mill which has arisen from the ashes of the old plant. This demonstrates pretty quick work on the part of the McKibben Bros. To show that their energy and enterprise is not confined to this mill alone, we publish the following letter received by them last week. It comes from the Norfolk board of trade and is as follows: "May we not lay before you the advantages of Norfolk as a manufacturing centre, with a view of securing the location of your new plant in this vicinity?" "A real estate deal involving a tract of 1023 acres of land three miles south of Cottage Grove was consummated this week, the tract comprising many acres of good grazing land as well as a fine tract of timber. The purchaser was none other than our townsman, M. H. Anderson, the deeds being made out by A. L. Woodard, the Latham sawmill man. The tract comprises what is known as the Woodard and upper Mary White places, and Mr. Woodard reserves the milled timber on the tract, it being specified in the transfer that he be given five years time in which to remove said timber. The city council held another adjourned meeting last night and passed the bridge ordinance for constructing the steel bridge across the coast fork, which is to be 96 feet span, 15 foot roadway, with 5-foot sidewalk on each side. The concrete piers are to stand on bedrock. Bids will be received up to September 14th, and the work is to be completed within 60 days of letting the contract. Separate bids will be received for the pier and steel work. An ordinance for grading Locust street was also passed. The contract for sewer work on the West Side was let to S. C. Hart for \$2906. Colonel and Mrs. Blair have exchanged their little home east of the railroad depot for 60 acres of land off the south side of the Spray farm on South Fourth street, paying \$2900 in cash also in the transaction. Albert Wallace, the brick mason, is here from Portland to act as head mason in the construction of the walls of the Spray block and the walls of the new brick of the Burkholder-Woods Company at the corner of Main and Third streets. Lane Shortridge has purchased the L. W. Baker residence property on Fourth street, consideration, \$1150. The deal was made through the W. B. Cooper real estate exchange. Three lots in the Cooper tract were sold to Sam McKernon the same day and on the same terms.

The growers at this place will pay 89 cents per 100 pounds for picking. Other country yards will follow Lee & Son in a few weeks.

PRUNE GROWERS PURCHASE PACKING HOUSE

Salem, Or., Aug. 26.—The Northwest association was found at this place yesterday for the purpose of packing prunes this season. It is a new factor in the Willamette valley prune market. It includes some of the largest growers of this section of the valley. Its members declare it will not join the packers' combine, which was formed here some time ago, and will be the only large packing firm outside the Packers' association. The new Growers' association has purchased the packing plant of Lesselle Bros., at Albany, and will operate it. The plant has a capacity of 150 cars for the season. The capital stock of the new concern is \$10,000.

Among the growers who joined in organizing the new concern are L. M. Gilbert of Rosedale, Enos Pressnall of Salem, S. P. Kimball and M. M. Ellis, of Dallas, A. L. West and L. M. Crozier of Rosedale. L. M. Gilbert was elected president, Enos Pressnall vice-president and S. A. Lesselle secretary and manager.

PENDLETON SUFFERS FROM SERIOUS FIRE

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 21.—New buildings will soon arise on the scene of this morning's fire, which destroyed \$50,000 worth of property. The First Christian church, which lost a frame building valued at \$18,000, with \$8000 insurance, will replace the old structure with stone. The Wilcox Implement company, which lost the entire stock valued at \$30,000, with \$15,000 insurance, immediately opened an office across the street and wired for new stock. The company will erect a new building at once. Only two automobiles and roll-top desk were saved from the largest stock of implements in Eastern Oregon.

The fire started in the barn of the Golden Rule Hotel, and spread rapidly before a strong wind. All the buildings burned were frame. The city council announced the fire district will be enlarged to take in the burned district, and will allow no more frame buildings.
