## PLANING MILL MAY GO INTO INGHAM BUILDING

There are bright prospects for the establishment of another planing mill and sash and door factory in Eugene, making the fourth plant of the kind in the city. The Guard learns from a reliable source that two men are negotiating for the lease of the Ingham vinegar factory building on Pearl street and the Southern Pacific railroad, and if the negotiations terminate successfully the interior of the building will at once be remodeled and planing mill machinery installed. Mr. Ingham is expected up from Portland tonight or tomorrow to confer with these men.

The need of another mill of this kind has long been apparent. The three mills already here have been crowded with work for a long time and each is away behind on all orders, keeping builders waiting in some instances several weeks, thus retarding building operations. The plants are crowded to their utmost capacity, and are doing the best they can, but they simply cannot handle all the business that offers. The Eugene Planing Mill Company, whose plant is on Lawrence street and the railroad, have recently enlarged their plant, but this did not relieve the congestion to any extent.

Doubtless the new mill, if put in, will pay from the very start.

## REPORTED ATTEMPT TO KILL TEDDY MERE SENSATION

Oyster Bay, Sept. 8.—The sensational reports of an attempt made to shoot the president apparently have their origin in the fact that the hunting season has opened on Long Island. Close investigation fails to reveal that there has been any overt act directed against the president and Secretary Loeb says that no official attention will be paid to the matter.

Mineola, L. I., Sept. 8.—John Coughlin, the armed man arrested for attempting to reach the president yesterday, was examined by physicians today and pronounced insane. He was taken to an asylum.

Oyster Bay, Sept. 7.—A crank armed with an antiquated bulldog revolver, was caught near the president's house today by secret service guards. The man described himself as John Coughlin, a detective, and when stopped by secret service men presented a card upon which was inscribed his name and the word "Officer." He said he had come to ask the president to order 10,000 troops to catch the "yeggmen" who have been terrorizing Boston.

A secret service man stopped him and asked him his business. They tried to put him off with the excuse

that the president was busy and was not seeing visitors. Coughlin hesitated and slid his hand toward his back pocket. Secret Service Agent Adams grappled with him. Coughlin is a slight man and made little resistance. In his back pocket was the revolver.

## DETECTIVES HAVE DESCRIPTION OF EXPRESS ROBBER

Portland, Sept. 8.—Detectives have been working for weeks to solve the mystery of the disappearance of \$70,000 worth of securities and other valuables from the Union depot office of the Wells-Fargo Express Company of this city, and now believe they have an absolute clue to the identity of the perpetrator of the robbery. The package was shipped by J. H. Albert, president of the Capital National Bank, of Salem, to Joseph Myers, who on August 21, the date the securities were shipped, was with his wife a guest at the Portland hotel. The package never reached its destination, but disappeared from the express office late on the night of August 21 or early on the morning of the next day. Just who the man is who is supposed to have stolen the package the detectives will not make public. It is not certain that he is in the city or state, and his identity will not be made public until he is arrested.

**Myers Family Is Silent**  
Salem, Sept. 8.—Joseph Myers and wife held many consultations today with their attorney, but Myers refuses to discuss the robbery with anybody but his legal advisers. Attorney Richardson, who represents Myers, made several trips to the bank today, evidently to consult J. H. Albert, who expressed the missing package. Beyond saying he did not expect any sensational developments today, Richardson declined to discuss the case.

The elder Myers boys, who instituted proceedings of insanity against their father when he announced his intention of marrying, have been in close consultation with their attorney, but would not make any statement regarding the mystery or their differences with their father.

## FOUR KILLED MANY INJURED IN HOTEL FIRE

Denver, Sept. 8.—Four men lost their lives and a score of persons were injured, several seriously, in a fire that gutted the Belmont hotel, a three-story building at 1723 Stout street, early today. The guests, awakened from sleep by the cry of fire, rushed pell mell into the halls, and were hemmed in by the flames on all sides. In their mad effort to escape they fought and struggled while the rescuers were forced back by columns of flame and smoke.

Most of the killed and injured jumped from windows.

## NICK'S FINE STABLE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Cincinnati, Sept. 8.—Congressman Nicholas Longworth's two-story brick stable was completely destroyed by fire early today. Loss, \$30,000. The horses ad servants sleeping in the building escaped.

## BON MARCHE STORE CHANGES HANDS

They will rearrange the interior of the store and make a number of improvements.

As announced by The Guard some time ago, Mr. Souder inaugurated a sale to close out his stock, as he has a business proposition at Seattle that requires his time and attention.

Mr. Campbell is a well-known Lane county citizen, having resided on the McKennie for many years. Mr. Wolfe knows the dry goods business thoroughly, coming here from Kansas City, where he was in business for years. He has recently been at Springfield.

**HARRISBURG NEWS. LOCAL AND PERSONAL**

Delbert Bucknum of Creswell has been here the past few days gathering fruit from the old homestead.

Miss Mabel Esk, of Eugene, came down Sunday and is making a week's visit with her friend, Miss Ada Haskell.

Erwin Macy, who resides seven miles southeast, was in town last Saturday. He is one of the farmers who deplores the condition of the apple orchards in this territory. He says the people could have lots of fruit to market if they would take care of the orchards that are already planted. They grow up to weeds, he says, and present a decidedly backward appearance in altogether too many instances.

It is estimated that a farmer in the Willamette Valley can make \$1000 on every acre planted with mulberry trees as soon as the Kuykendall device is placed on the market. The soil and climate of the Willamette valley are especially adapted to the growth of the mulberry and this device will make the silk industry very profitable. After a test soon to be made in California, we will be given an opportunity to enter into an industry that will make the hop industry look decidedly sickly.

## HUNDREDS MAY LOSE LIVES IN FOREST FIRES

Duluth, Sept. 8.—Reports received today indicate that forest fires are raging along the northeast shore as far as Grand Marais, west to the Western Mesaba ranges, south to within ten or fifteen miles of Duluth, and as far north as the extreme northern edge of the ranges and perhaps much further. Settlers are being burned out by hundreds, and from six to seven hundred settlers are fighting for their lives with no avenue of escape open.

The fire has been penned in and the flames are rushing toward the lake shore. Grand Marais, it is said, will be a total loss.

## BELIEVE BRITISH HAVE MET DISASTER

San Francisco, September 8.—Anxiety in regard to the British ship Aeon, sailing from this port July 6 for Samoa and not since reported, has almost deepened to a certainty that the vessel has met with disaster. In addition to the crew she had on board Captain B. R. Patrick, of the United States navy, and family, and the wife of Naval Lieutenant W. Riddle.

## S. P. TIE PRESERVING PLANT AT WORK

Cottage Grove, Sept. 7.—On Thursday of last week the big tie-preserving plant of the Southern Pacific railroad company steamed up at the Latham siding, one mile south of this city, for the usual fall and winter run. This will result in the various sawmills hereabouts finding ready sale for all of their railroad ties. In fact the Brown Lumber Company and several other local sawmill companies are already billing out two and three carloads of ties per day from their yards to the tie plant, which gives employment to a large number of men and maintains a good-sized payroll. All this will assist in stimulating business in this city and the various lumber camps tributary.

"A beautiful little town" every one pronounced it. Automobiles were kept busy all day showing the visitors above point was the state university, and the visitors went through the buildings in crowds, and expressed openly their surprise at the extent of work shown there. They were pleased with the improvements which have been set on foot there since the lifting of the referendum on the University appropriation. Instructors and students were in the various departments to show the visitors about, since the fall work will not begin for two or three weeks.

Dr. Homer I. Keeney was one of the Portland visitors, and he expressed his unbounded delight on learning that Professor John Straub, of the Greek department, was to be one of the initiates. "I have been waiting for ten years to get even," said the doctor delightedly, with sad reminiscences of his Greek verbs when he was a student at the University of Oregon. And it is whispered that the young doctor has no chance. Judge Lawrence T. Harris, circuit judge for the Second district, came in for his share of honors, and Dr. Littlefield, of Newberg, and Dr. Davis, of Albany, were also marked men. A number of the candidates went up on the special and life was made a burden to them.

There were 308 Shriners who left Portland Saturday morning, and 50 were picked up en route to Eugene. The day was full of excitement, with sightseeing throughout the day, the parade at 1 o'clock, following a business meeting, and the initiation in the evening from 8 to 11, when a banquet was served in a neighboring hall during most of the night. This special dispensation meeting was so successful and so much enjoyed that the Shriners are planning another for Ashland in about two months.

## MCARTHUR MAY BE REPUBLICAN SECRETARY

Clifton N. McArthur probably will be the new secretary of the republican state central committee, says the Oregonian. At the conference of the state committee held in this city Saturday, Mr. McArthur was selected as the proper man to succeed Otis Patterson, of Grant county, whose resignation has been accepted. The appointment of a successor to Patterson was left to State Chairman C. C. C. but it is reported that he agreed with the members of the committee in their choice and promised to name the representative-elect from Multnomah and Clackamas counties. It is expected Chairman C. C. C. will announce the appointment either today or tomorrow so that the new secretary may begin his duties Tuesday, when the Republican campaign in this state will be opened in earnest.

Mr. McArthur is a vigorous worker in the party's ranks and always has taken an active part in political affairs. He was reading clerk of the house of representatives at the legislative session and in June was one of the three Republican Voters' Choice legislators elected from this county. He will represent Multnomah and Clackamas counties in the house next winter. Mr. McArthur was out of the city yesterday, as also was Chairman C. C. C., but it is understood that McArthur has been induced to accept the secretaryship if it is tendered to him.

## HUNTER WANTED FOR EMBEZZLEMENT

Salem, Sept. 7.—R. G. Hunter, until recently local representative for the International Correspondence Schools, is being sought by the police for alleged theft and embezzlement. Hunter is charged with having bought a large bill of furniture on the installment plan and then having borrowed \$150 from each of three different men on the furniture. For this and other alleged offenses he is badly wanted. His wife is alleged to be with him.

Halsey, Sept. 7.—Mrs. N. H. Cummings, an invalid, who lives near Halsey, came to town last Friday and had seven teeth extracted by a dentist from Harrisburg, who comes to Halsey each Friday. Her mouth bled so badly that night that a physician was called, who expressed fear of her bleeding to death. She was unable to go home, and is at the home of her father-in-law, Berry Cummings, where she is scarcely able to move from loss of blood. Mrs. Cummings experienced the same trouble a few years ago from the same cause.
