

BRYAN DEMANDS INVESTIGATION OF HASKELL CHARGES

Detroit, Sept. 22.—W. J. Bryan this afternoon addressed a letter to President Roosevelt in reply to the president's statement, issued yesterday, in which the president appeals for support for Taft. The letter is the outcome of the Hearst-Forker controversy, and Roosevelt declares the defeat of Taft will bring lasting satisfaction to but one set of men, namely, those men who, as shown in the correspondence published by W. R. Hearst, were behind Forker, the opponent of Taft within his own party, and who are now behind Governor Haskell and his associates, the opponents of Taft in the opposite party.

Bryan goes into the charges made against Governor Haskell, of Oklahoma, that he was once in the employ of the Standard Oil Company, and which Bryan accuses Roosevelt of endorsing. Mr. Bryan's letter continues: "Your charge is so serious that I cannot allow it to pass unnoticed. Governor Haskell has denied that he was ever employed by the Standard Oil Company in any capacity, or was ever connected with it in any way, or the transaction upon which your charge is based."

"Governor Haskell demanded an investigation at the time the charge was first made, offering to appear and testify, and he demands an investigation now. I agree with you that if Haskell is guilty as charged he is unfit to be connected with the Democratic National committee, and I am sure you will agree with me that if he is innocent he deserves to be exonerated from so damaging an accusation."

Bryan says that as Haskell's chairmanship of the committee on resolutions at Denver and as treasurer of the National committee, his approval, he demands an immediate investigation of the charges endorsed by the president of the United States. He says further: "Your high position, as well as your sense of justice, would prevent your giving sanction and circulation to such a charge without proof and I respectfully request, therefore, that you furnish such proof, which you have in your possession. If you have not the proof, I request that you indicate the method by which the truth may be ascertained."

Bryan agrees without consulting Haskell that he (Haskell) will appear before any inquisitorial body that party's record. Having traveled all night from Albany, a short stop was made in Rochester between trains. Proceeding on to Buffalo, addresses were made at Broeport, Holley, Albion and at this place, where Mr. Bryan spoke from a platform in the school campus. It became evident from the outset that President Roosevelt and Mr. Taft were to be made the objects of Mr. Bryan's attack.

At Holley the president was criticized for not enforcing the anti-trust law against many of the trusts. "This is their record, and they cannot escape from it," said Mr. Bryan.

Says Senate Will Yield The speech at Albion was along similar lines, with some additional remarks in which he answered several questions put to him by the Chicago Tribune. The first question asked by the Tribune was: "If a Republican senate would not

BRYAN CAMPAIGN IN MICHIGAN Detroit, Sept. 22.—This is Bryan day in Detroit, and large crowds greeted the candidate when he arrived from Buffalo. After breakfast at the Hotel Ponchartrai he held a series of conferences with Michigan Democrats. He will go to Ann Arbor this afternoon for an open-air address, returning to Detroit to speak at the armory tonight and leaving at 11 o'clock for Columbus, Ohio.

Medina, N. Y., Sept. 21.—Renewing his campaign in New York state territory today, William J. Bryan denounced the record of the Republican party, accused President Roosevelt of purloining Democratic ideas and owing his popularity to them, and charged Mr. Taft with being unable to effect any reforms, and declared that a Democratic victory would do more to coerce Republicans in congress than any persuasion that Mr. Taft could bring to bear, if a Republican victory was achieved on

conditions concerning labor legislation, how can you promise, or even intimate, that your election would result in procuring the same senate to do for you what they would not do for Mr. Taft? Mr. Bryan replied: "If I am elected it is probable that the house of representatives will be Democratic. I can recommend legislation in accordance with my platform, and the Democrats of the house after being pledged to the same platform will approve of the measures. It will then be up to the senate, and I will not assume that all of the Republican senators will be willing to disregard a deliberate expression of opinion upon the part of the American people."

"Shall the people rule?" is declared by our platform to be the overshadowing issue in this campaign. Is the Tribune prepared to say that a Republican senate will, as a matter of course, disregard the wishes of the voters as expressed in the election of a president and house of representatives? If Mr. Taft is elected a Republican house will probably be elected, too. This will mean a rejection of the labor planks, and Mr. Taft, or, if he were better disposed toward labor legislation than he is, could hardly expect either the house or the senate to indorse measures rejected at the polls."

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MACK DENIES STORY OF BIG SLUSH FUND

New York, Sept. 22.—Norman E. Mack, chairman of the National Democratic committee, has addressed a telegram to President Roosevelt in which he denied flatly the statements in a reported interview between Timothy L. Woodruff, chairman of the Republican state committee, and President Roosevelt, printed in a local paper today, in which the president is credited with saying it is significant that \$300,000 has been found in the treasury of the Democratic party after Judge Parker had declared, throughout the last national campaign, that the party's treasury was receiving nothing from the corporations, and that it was further announced at the time of the election that the treasury was empty.

The president said he thought it was queer that such a sum should turn up after Mr. Haskell had been appointed treasurer of the Democratic National committee. Woodruff telegraphed the president that if he was quoted correctly he probably had in mind the publications in the New York American (Hearst's paper) of the story that the Democratic National committee had received from former Chairman Taggart \$300,000 alleged to have been left over from the 1904 campaign. Chairman Mack said there was not a word of truth in the story and that he had not received one cent from any one connected with the last campaign.

OYSTER BAY'S GLORY IS THING OF THE PAST

Oyster Bay, Sept. 22.—President Roosevelt and family, his active staff and secret service men left for Washington this morning. With the departure of the president Oyster Bay ceased to be the summer capital of the United States, the title it has proudly held for seven years, and which is surrendered with regret by its citizens who witnessed the departure of the president to his last term of duty in guiding the nation.

RECORD BREAKING REGISTRATION AT UNIVERSITY

Up to 4 o'clock this afternoon 251 students had registered with Registrar Tiffany at the University of Oregon. These were nearly all new students, the old students waiting till later in the week to register, and even some of the new students are waiting. This is an increase of 75 or 80 over the first year's registration last year. Registrar Tiffany estimates that the enrollment of students for the year will reach 600, judging from the first day's registration.

ROOSEVELT TELLS RAYNER FAULTS OF COL. STEWART RAILROAD WORK NEARS MONROE

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 21.—In a letter dated May 6, sent to Senator Rayner, of Maryland, in reply to an inquiry, President Roosevelt gives at length the reasons of the war department and himself for the exile of Colonel Stewart to an abandoned fort in Arizona. This letter has been given the senator with permission to publish. In part it says: "My Dear Senator Rayner: I have received your letter of May 3, and also the letter you wrote to the secretary of war in reference to the case of Colonel W. F. Stewart. The facts are as follows: "I made a careful investigation of the case of Colonel Stewart. I have before me the report of the judge advocate general upon it and full report by Major-General Duval, and have looked at the original reports of Generals Grant, Murray and others. It appears that Colonel Stewart has been 41 years in the army, having entered it when very young, so he is now entitled to retire, having served 40 years. He refuses to retire unless he is made a brigadier-general."

Monroe, Or., Sept. 21.—The grade of the Corvallis & Alsea railroad is completed as far south as Monroe, and the track will soon be laid to that point. The surveyors are now working on the Lake Creek spur and are locating an almost new line from the original survey. Work will be rushed on this part of the road, as the Southern Pacific Company is anxious to begin handling the great stand of timber in the Triangle Lake country. While it is the idea here that the road will be extended south to Eugene, it is also believed that no more work in that direction will be prosecuted until the west spur is completed. It is planned to have a big day in Monroe when the line shall have been completed to this point.

DR. IRVINE IS KILLED BY SON Albany, Or., Sept. 22.—Dr. J. M. Irvine was shot and instantly killed by his son, Baxter Irvine, this morning on his farm near Tallman. Dr. Irvine was shooting squirrels last night and left a .44 calibre rifle on a pile of grain sacks, covering it with burlap. He was standing near the sacks when his son, not knowing of the presence of the rifle, started to pull the burlap from the sacks and the gun was discharged, the bullet entering Dr. Irvine's breast, causing instant death.

SIUSLAW WANTS PLANK ROAD BUILT (The Florence West) At the August session of the county court at Eugene, a petition was presented asking that a plank road be built from Mapleton to Hale. The petition bore the signatures of several hundred voters and taxpayers residing in different parts of the county. Nearly everybody in this end of the county signed the paper, as well as many in Eugene and Cottage Grove. It was endorsed by the Eugene Commercial club and Mr. Hartog the manager of that organization appeared before the court in behalf of the petition. The matter was taken under consideration of the court but no further action was taken on the proposition. The people of the whole Siuslaw valley are very anxious to have the road built and the project has the endorsement of the leading commercial organizations of the valley. It would be a great benefit both to Eugene and to the people of this section and help develop a large portion of Lane county. In petitioning the court to have the road planked the people in this part of the county feel that they are not asking for any more than they are entitled to receive. A good road from Eugene to the coast is greatly needed and would help to keep at home in the county many dollars that are now spent in making trips to other parts of the state. Considering the cost of a plank road as compared with crushed rock, the difficulty of getting suitable material, durability, and how much easier and better the plank road is to haul over, our people are very strongly in favor of the latter and are anxious that the court take decisive action toward securing plank from some source and have the road built without unnecessary delay.

Failed to Detect Grant "In 1906, when he was in command at Fort Williams, Maine, an officer of his company, a quartermaster, was court-martialed, dismissed from the army and sentenced to the penitentiary for the perpetration of most outrageous frauds upon the government, which had extended over a considerable period of time. Apparently all this went on almost under the very eyes of Colonel Stewart, but he failed to detect the crimes of the officer, in so doing being culpably remiss in exercising supervision over his subordinates."

Motive of Murder NOT APPARENT Detroit, Sept. 22.—Wm. H. Munn, aged 26, a stock clerk at the Detroit Club, was murdered in the alley between Congress and Fort streets. Residents of the neighborhood heard the shot late in the evening. The bullet entered his right temple. He formerly lived at Colburn, Ida. The motive is lacking.

Opposes Military Trial "Now, as to your suggestion as to a trial, for the reasons given above, and also the memorandum which I have set forth, in which I point out in having a court-martial, I do not see how any court of inquiry would express an opinion to which I should pay more heed than to the judgment of Generals Wade, Grant, Murray, Duval and Davis, in accordance with whose recommendations I have acted."

POWDER TRUST SUIT OPENS IN FEDERAL COURT

Wilmington, Del., Sept. 22.—William G. Mahaffey, the special referee appointed by Judge Gray of the United States Circuit Court of the District of Delaware, today began the taking of evidence in the suit begun by the Government against the so-called Powder Trust. The principal defendant in the case is D. E. I. du Pont de Nemours Company of Delaware. Also involved are about thirty other powder concerns which are alleged to more or less controlled by the Delaware corporation. The suit is regarded as one of the greatest that the Government has ever brought against a corporation. The capitalization of the powder concerns named in the suit is in excess of \$50,000,000. The same principles are involved as in the Government's suit against the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey now in progress. The Powder Trust suit seeks to restrain the thirty or more powder companies controlled by the Du Pont de Nemours company from doing business under an alleged agreement. The suit is brought under the Sherman anti-trust law, and the Government makes the allegation that the powder companies are operating in restraint of trade. The Government's complaint is that an association composed of practically all the manufacturers of gunpowder and other high explosives in the United States was formed in 1872, the object being the elimination of all competition between the members of the association. The only companies which did not enter the agreement were the California Powder Works, the Sycamore Manufacturing Company and the Lake Superior Powder Company, but, according to the government's complaint, these three companies afterward became parties to what is termed "the combination and conspiracy in restraint of trade and commerce."

CITY COUNCIL ATTENDED TO MANY BUSINESS MATTERS

An adjourned session of the city council was held last night at which a number of matters were acted upon. The matter of the injunction suit against the city by J. R. Sellers to restrain the city and the Warren Construction Company from operating the rock quarry at the west end of the bute was brought up and the city attorney directed to look after the city's interests in the matter. The ordinance permitting the cement sidewalk along the University campus on East Eleventh street six inches above the regular grade was passed. The plat of the Hill Crest addition to the city was accepted. The fire and water committee was directed to confer with the water company with instructions to have all three-inch mains on West Eighth street where the pavement is to be laid replaced with four-inch mains. The application for an advance in the wages of the assistant fire team driver to \$25 per month was referred.

KILLED WOMAN AND BLEW OFF HIS OWN HEAD Vallejo, Cal., Sept. 22.—Mrs. Henry Mangus, wife of an electrician at the Mare Island navy yard, was shot and killed by Charles Friedberg, who then blew off the top of his head. Infatuation for the woman and jealousy of her husband was the motive. Friedberg roomed with the Mangus family until two weeks ago, when his objectionable conduct caused Mangus to order him from the house. Neighbors say he was a frequent visitor to the house during the absence of Mangus, but it is said, however, that the woman had recently been trying to get rid of Friedberg, and on Monday he said she had given him until 4 o'clock Tuesday to get out of town. He went to the house again this morning and it is thought attempted to induce the woman to leave town with him. He was drinking heavily, and it is thought the tragedy followed the woman's refusal to accompany him.

INSANE NEGRO MURDERS TWO AND WOUNDS ONE Washington, Sept. 22.—While in a demoralized fury Andrew Lightfoot, a mulatto inmate of St. Elizabeth's asylum for the insane, today killed Patrick Maloney, overseer of the grounds, and Millie Follin, a young inmate of the asylum, and severely injured Miss Robinson, another inmate. The asylum is a government institution, and Lightfoot, who has been an inmate for eight years, was regarded as harmless and for some time had been assistant to Overseer Maloney. Today he suddenly became violently insane, and grasping an iron bar crushed Maloney's skull. He then turned upon Miss Follin and crushed her skull, and in his flight encountered Miss Robinson, and tried to kill her. His aim was bad and she received only a slight scalp wound and a broken arm.

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PORTLAND WILL BE SHUT TIGHT SUNDAY Portland, Sept. 21.—District Attorney George J. Cameron has addressed a communication to the chief of police calling upon the latter to strictly enforce the Sunday closing laws, beginning next Sunday. As the result of this peremptory command every cigar store, billiard parlor, bowling alley, confectionery and fruit store and all amusement enterprises are not coming under the head of theaters, and hereafter remain closed on the sabbath, and is even threatened that after next Sunday no baseball games will be allowed. The statute exempts theatres, drug stores, doctors, undertakers, stables, butchers and bakers.
