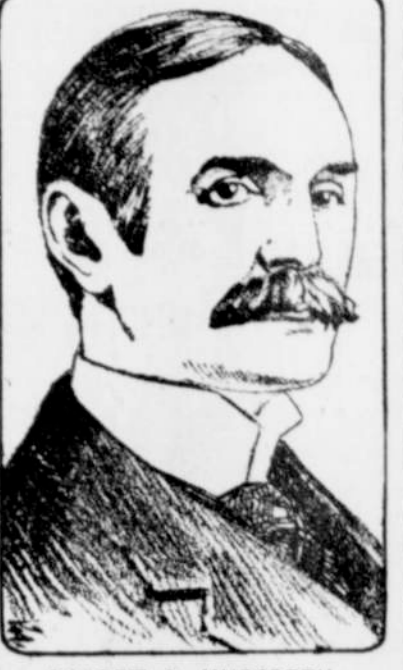

## UNIVERSITY OPENED TODAY FOR REGISTRATION

(From Tuesday's Daily Guard) Registration of students at the University of Oregon began this morning and from present indications the number will probably exceed by far the expectations of Registrar Tiffany, who has charge of the work.

The campus and buildings presented a lively appearance all day, many of the students spending most of the day about the grounds, the new ones becoming acquainted with conditions and some of the old ones showing them around.

The dormitory is already full and

some of the students have not yet found places to stay, but as the committees who look after this matter have the situation well in hand, it is expected that the students will have no trouble in finding suitable locations.

### Faculty Changes.

Following are the faculty changes since last year:

The library will be in charge of Librarian H. Douglas. Mr. Douglas received his training at the University of Wisconsin Library School, and has been librarian at Iowa State College for some years, where he greatly enlarged and bettered the library of that institution.

Dr. Jas. D. Barnett comes as an associate professor in political science. Dr. Barnett received his doctor's degree at the University of Wisconsin. He has been head of the department of political science at the University of Oklahoma, and comes here from that place. Dr. Barnett is offering a number of new courses, and which will be a very great aid to students taking courses preparatory to law.

Professor F. L. Parker takes Professor Terrill's place as head of the school of mining engineering. Professor Parker received his A. B. degree at the University of Illinois, and later his E. M. from the Colorado School of Mines. He has had practical experience as mine superintendent in Colorado, and as a mine expert in Minnesota. Professor Parker has also taught several years.

Professor Ketchum comes as an associate professor in civil engineering from the University of Illinois, at which place he received both his B. S. and his C. E. degrees. He is a member of the American Association of Civil Engineers.

James Currie, an Indiana man, comes as an instructor in the chemistry department. Mr. Currie received his A. B. degree at the University of Indiana, and also his A. M. at the same place.

As Professor Stafford, head of the department of chemistry, is in Europe studying, Dr. Shinn, who was assistant professor last year, will have charge of the department this year.

Dr. Hugo Koehler is a new instructor in the German department. Dr. Koehler received most of his training at the University of Leipzig. He has taught in both German and American colleges.

Samuel E. Elliott, an Oxford man, comes as an instructor in psychology. Professor Clark, who took Professor Shaffer's place in the department of history while Professor Shaffer was abroad last year, has been chosen assistant professor of history for this year. Dr. Clark received both his bachelor and master degrees at the University of Texas. He received his doctor's degree at Wisconsin University, an Oregon man.

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## SALMON LADEN STEAMER WRECKED ON ALASKA COAST

San Francisco, Sept. 22.—The Merchants' Exchange is advised that the American bark Star Bengal was driven ashore and is a total wreck near Fort Wrangell, Alaska. She is thought to have on board a full cargo of salmon, and is owned by the Alaska Packers' Association.

The steamer Kyack is standing by and from this fact it is believed that the officers and crew are on board. The authorities at Washington have been asked to send a cable to the steamer Burnside to render whatever aid is possible.

## Today's Suggestion by Ellen Stan.

ATTRACTIVE PRINCE CHAP COAT. PRACTICAL coats as separate coats or to complete a suit are much in demand at this season of the year. The coat illustrated is a particularly desirable model for wear during the fall season. It is simple and will be serviceable made of serge, mohair or cheviot. The splendid wearing qualities of serge at once recommend that material. Dark blue is perhaps the most practical selection for tailored suits and with a pretty satin waist of the same color will be suitable for almost any occasion.

Waists play an important part in the wardrobe this season, as they are usually of the same color as the suit with which they are worn, so particular thought should be given to the selection of a becoming color as well as a serviceable one. Nets are also used for waists in both plain and more elaborate developments.

The model illustrated is particularly easy to make, and by the use of padded cordline forms that come in any size, to place between the outside material and the lining, there will be no modification for even the home sewer in making this garment appear neat and tailor made. These inner foundations do away with all fitting, as they come in perfectly graded sizes, and all one has to do is to baste the outside material in place.

The revers and cuffs can be of satin in the same color as the material or of a pretty relief color. Black satin will make a coat that will afford excellent service, and for a separate coat this is much favored.

If this is chosen for a suit coat, a well fitting gored skirt should be selected. For stout figures a nine or more gored model is more suitable, but for a slight figure a five or seven gored skirt is pretty.

This Prince Chap coat is in twenty-seven inch length. The pattern is cut in seven sizes—from 32 to 44 inches bust measure. To copy it for the average person it requires 4 1/2 yards of material 27 inches wide or 3 1/2 yards 36 inches wide.

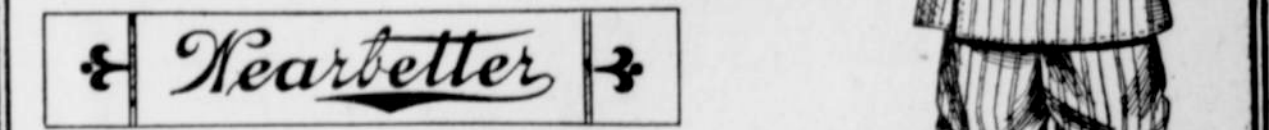
