

ATTORNEY GENERAL BONAPARTE REPLIES TO DANIEL'S LETTER

Washington, Oct. 13.—Attorney General Bonaparte has replied to a second letter from Josephus Daniels, chairman of the press bureau of the Democratic National Committee, in which he complains that in the attorney-general's answer to his first inquiry as to trust prosecutions he had not differentiated between the prosecutions under the Sherman anti-trust law and those under other laws.

Answering the inquiry specifically, the attorney-general stated that under the Sherman anti-trust law passed in 1890 there have been 45 proceedings in all, 56 under Republican and nine under Democratic administration, 46 since Mr. Roosevelt became President in September, 1901, and 19 during the preceding 11 years.

Among the prosecutions of the Democratic administration the attorney-general says, is included resistance to the petition of Eugene V. Debs for a writ of habeas corpus.

It is also asserted that four out of nine proceedings under Democratic rule were against labor organizations and their leaders and that under the public rule there have been in all three such proceedings out of 56.

CITY WILL HAVE POWER PLANT ON MCKENZIE

The regular meeting of the city council was held last night with a full board present.

After the reading of the minutes the first matter to be taken up was the bill of T. H. Ellis for \$500, 80 per cent payment for the cement curbing on West Eighth street from Washington to Monroe. The bill was ordered paid.

A petition for an arc light at the intersection of West Tenth and Jefferson streets was referred.

The matter of the construction of the sewer between Second and Third streets, it being claimed that it is not being constructed in a manner up to standard, was referred back to the sewer committee.

In all street and sewer work the city engineer was instructed to furnish duplicate copies of plans and specifications for contractors as well as for the recorder's file.

The sewer in the alley between Fifth and Sixth streets from Jefferson street west to Blair was accepted and the contractor was paid the balance on his contract, less the usual amount held back. Other street matters were referred to the street committee with power to act.

At the suggestion of Architect Hunziker a change was ordered in the building ordinance providing that all three-story buildings should have 12-inch walls throughout.

The bill of McClain & McArthur, the engineers who surveyed the route of the proposed gravity water system, was referred to the finance committee. The amount of the bill is \$1574.70.

A petition for a sidewalk on the north side of Seventeenth street from Willamette street to Stewart avenue was referred.

The matter of opening Olive street was referred.

Contractor Matthews was ordered to be notified that he must finish up the streets in East Eugene which have been under contract for the past four months.

The report of the committee on the lath and plaster building for George Fisher was in favor of the building and a motion was made to have the council authorize an ordinance drawn to cover the case. It resulted in a tie vote, as follows: Fisher, Berger, Gilbert and Williams voting aye; and Garrett, Roach,

JENKINS LUMBER COMPANY BURNED OUT AT BLAINE.

Bellingham, Wash., Oct. 13.—Fire, started by incendiaries at 10:50 o'clock last night, destroyed the entire plant of H. L. Jenkins Lumber Company at Blaine, Wash., valued at \$500,000 and threatened for several hours to wipe out the entire waterfront of Blaine, carrying with it two other valuable mills, the plants of two canning companies and the city dock.

Through the heroic efforts of the Blaine fire department, assisted by hundreds of volunteers, the flames were confined to the Jenkins plant, of which nothing was left but smoldering embers. Nothing was saved except the company's stable, a few books and two pieces of furniture. Included in the loss were a sawmill, with a capacity of 100,000 feet of lumber daily, shingle mill, capacity 600,000 shingles daily; a planing mill with six planers, eight dry kilns and a two-story office building.

The plant was one of the largest in the world, but had been idle for
