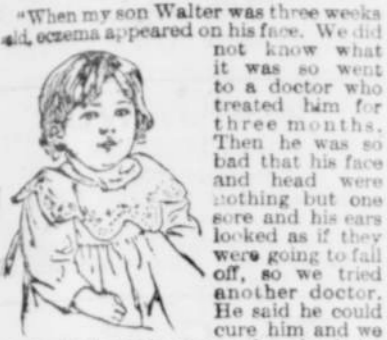

**CALIFORNIA WOMAN DROWNS IN VAT OF WINE**  
Santa Rosa, Cal., Oct. 12.—Mrs. Frances Collier, wife of a rancher at Occidental, was drowned yesterday in a vat of wine. The woman was visiting the winery on the Collier ranch and had climbed to the edge of a large vat, partly filled with wine. It soon became unbalanced, probably through being overcome by the fumes. Mrs. Collier lost her balance and fell into the vat. Her husband, before assistance reached her she had been suffocated.

# BOY FALLS FROM S. P. TRAIN AND IS KILLED

The body of an unknown boy, his neck broken and the base of his skull fractured, was picked up early Sunday morning beneath the railroad trestle three-fourths of a mile north of Oakland, says yesterday's Roseburg Review. Circumstances show that the boy, while stealing a ride on the southbound overland train, No. 15, was either thrown or fell off at the trestle, and the latter is the more probable. The body was discovered by Charles Neal, a Southern Pacific section foreman. Coroner N. T. Jewett is holding an inquest at Oakland today before a jury comprised of the following: J. E. Medley, A. E. Smith, A. G. Young, E. H. Pinkston, A. A. Smith and E. M. Brooks.

Nothing was found in the boy's clothing to identify him, but that he probably lived in Portland is indicated by the fact that his initials, "Worland & King" on the inside of his shoes. Apparently he was about 14 years of age. He wore a cap of dark color, a dark gray coat, blue sweater and corduroy trousers. His two upper front teeth are a trifle prominent and the tooth immediately to the left is missing.

Two boys, giving their names as Tom Jackson and George Murray, and about the same age as the one who was killed, are the principal witnesses at the inquest. While beating their way they fell in with the third boy at Salem, and the three rode together on the "blind" as far as Eugene, the third boy proceeding southward on No. 15, while the other two waited and rode south on the "flyer," No. 13. Arriving at Oakland and learning that a boy had been picked up dead, Jackson and Murray immediately viewed the body and identified it as that of their companion of a few hours before. They say they did not learn his name or where his home was.

# CONGREGATIONAL BOARD OF MISSIONS

New York, Oct. 13.—The annual meeting of the American Board of Commissioners for Missions of the Congregational Church opened this afternoon in the Clinton Avenue Congregational Church in Brooklyn. The reports of the board, which were made by Dr. Samuel B. Capen of Boston, president of the board. Routine business was followed by reports of Rev. Dr. Cornelius H. Patton, secretary of the home department, and Rev. James L. Batorn, secretary of the foreign department.

The reports of these and other officers showed the affairs of the board to be in a satisfactory condition. Receipts from all sources for the year were \$3032 more than in the previous year. The total receipts for the year were \$580,011, against \$577,631 for the preceding year.

One of the leading features of the meeting is the general gratification at the revolution in Turkey and the religious freedom which is now being in the country, which has not been known hitherto. It has not been possible to send the literature sent to the consuls for distribution. Already, according to information from the mission fields, the attendance upon the institutions of the board has greatly increased and there is not room for the scholars who desire to attend.

The reports show that political conditions not only in Turkey but in other countries where the board works, have opened its field greatly. In China, mission work is being prosecuted through the public streets, which fact gives striking evidence of the widespread breakdown of the idol worship of the natives.

Following the formal opening this afternoon the most of the sessions of the convention will be held in the new Academy of Music. The general prosperity of the board will be brought out in addresses by retired missionaries from different countries. Other speakers will include the Rev. Dr. George Washburn, former president of Robert College at Constantinople; Rev. Dr. Charles L. Ewing, president of the Western Reserve University; Rev. Dr. Howard S. Bliss, president of Syria and Rev. Dr. S. Parkes Cadman. The annual sermon will be preached this evening by Rev. Dr. Charles S. Mills of St. Louis.

# BULGARIA'S MILITARY RESOURCES SUMMARIZED

Vienna, Oct. 12.—The recent developments in the Balkan situation and the probability of war between Bulgaria and Turkey have aroused universal interest in the military conditions and resources of the small kingdom, bold enough to challenge the might of Turkey, Bulgaria was not always a small and comparatively insignificant country. From the seventh to the fourteenth century Bulgaria was one of the strong and prosperous kingdoms of the Balkan peninsula. It comprised a large area of fertile land and was densely populated. Its borders touched the Black Sea, the Aegean, and the Adriatic. The remembrance of the glory of its czars, Kroom, Asen and Simeon, still lives in every Bulgarian and fills his heart with pride. It was Czar Simeon who led his victorious army to the very walls of Constantinople, and it was of his time that Gibbon says: "Bulgaria assumed a rank among the civilized powers of the earth."

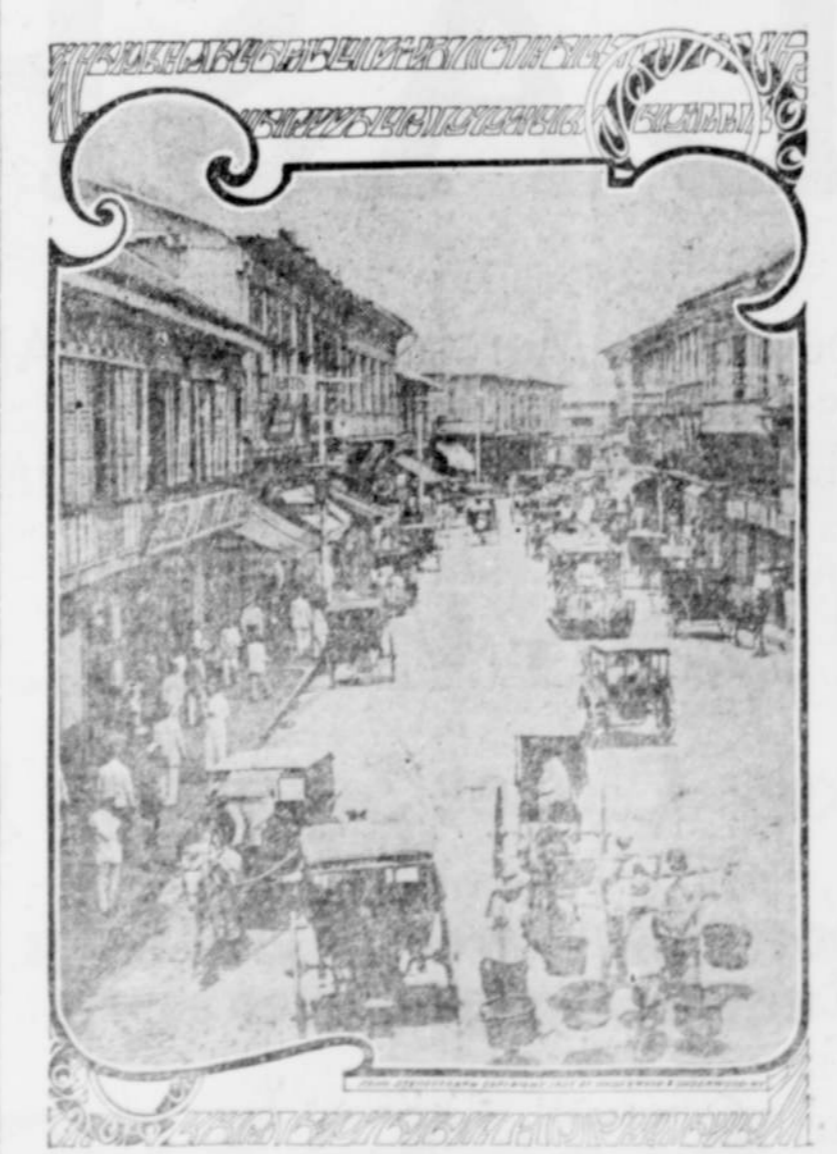
But Turkey was determined to obtain possession of the Balkan peninsula. After conquering other nations the Turks subjected the Bulgarians, whom they kept under their despotic rule for five hundred years. When the intolerable sufferings of this Christian nation under its Moslem oppressors finally attracted the sympathy of the world, Russia came to its help in 1877 and forced Turkey, by the treaty of Berlin to grant autonomy to Bulgaria. The latter country is now only a small principality of 48,500 square miles and a population of 3,310,000; yet its military organization is remarkable considering the population and its resources great than one would expect from so small a country.

Nearly 80,000 young men annually reach the age of twenty-one in Bulgaria, and of these 24,000 are taken by conscription for the full period of peace service, nominally two years for the infantry, and three years for the cavalry and artillery. After finishing their color service the men are kept for eighteen years in the reserve. This unusually long service in the reserve gives the Bulgarian General Staff a large force of trained men for mobilization purposes. It is estimated that Bulgaria has in all about 380,000 men at its disposal for immediate military use, all of whom are fully trained. After leaving the reserve the men are placed into the "Landwehr" for six years. These men too would be available for military service in case of a prolonged war. The strength of the "Landwehr" is estimated at about 65,000.

The Bulgarian army is well provided with capable officers. Many of them have received their military training and education at the National Academy, which was founded in Sofia in 1878 and has for its director a Russian, Major Robinkin. The number of cadets in attendance in former years averaged four hundred, but during recent years it has increased to five hundred and even more. The course of the school covers four years and the cadets, after graduating and serving for several years in the army, are free to continue their military education in any of the older European academies selected for this purpose by the Bulgarian government. In the thirty years of its existence the Academy has sent out more than 2,500 graduates, who are now holding officers' rank in the Bulgarian army.

# BIG LAND ISSUE IN NORTHWEST

Regina, Sask., Oct. 13.—One of the greatest land auctions in history is being conducted here this week under the direction of the Saskatchewan and Western Land Company, Limited, a wealthy organization, which had the pick of large tracts in the heart of the Canadian wheat belt. The auction is concluded it is expected that a quarter of a million acres will have been handed over to the highest bidders in parcels of various sizes. Prospective settlers are here from many parts of Canada, and the United States to attend the sale. As purchasers are not required to live on the land the sale has attracted many investors and speculators who hope to reap large profits as a result of the rapid advance in land values throughout this section of the Canadian Northwest.
