CITY OF MEDFORD WILL REMAIN WET

Supreme Court Holds Charter Above Local Option Law
Salem, Oct. 27.—Supreme Justice Moore holds valid the provisions of the charter of the city of Medford exempting the regulation of saloons and liquor traffic in that municipality from the operation of the liquor law. This opinion is given in the case of J. C. Hall, respondent, vs. George W. Dunn, county judge of Jackson county, and the county court of that county, appellant, and is an affirmation of the decree of Judge H. K. Hanna, of the First Judicial District.

This opinion practically opens the way for every incorporated town in the state to revise its charter so as to exempt the regulation of liquor traffic within its limits from the operation of the prohibition law, no matter if the entire state be voted dry. A similar case is pending decision of the supreme court involving the question of local option in the city of Dallas.

"Where a general local option law has by a majority vote," continues the court, "been made applicable to a specified territory, of which a city formed a part, a subsequent amendment of the municipal charter authorizing the council to license the sale of intoxicating liquors impliedly repealed the prior local option law, so far as the city was concerned."
The amendment of section 2 of article 11 of the Oregon law, empowering the legal voters of every city and town to enact and amend their municipal charters, subject to the constitution and the criminal laws of the state, is not self-executing, and operates prospectively only, so that the adoption of such an amendment (the clause in the Medford charter empowering the council to regulate the liquor traffic, irrespective of any general law of the state on the subject enacted by the legislature or by the people at large) did not alter the charter of the city of Medford, as enacted by the legislative assembly on February 7, 1905.

The amended charter having repealed the provisions of the local option liquor law, so far as the city of Medford is concerned, the demurrer and in granting the relief awarded.

The court also holds in this case that a writ of review would have afforded the plaintiff a legal remedy for the injury he might have sustained in the manner indicated (the recovery of damages to stock and trade). A court of equity, according to the facts alleged in the complaint, also had concurrent jurisdiction of the subject matter of the suit and was authorized to grant a temporary injunction.

In 1905 charters were also enacted by the legislature for Condon and Estacada, embodying similar provisions, and also for Brownsville, Halsey and Junction City in which this provision is absent.

ASK STATE AID FOR MORE ROADS

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 24.—The address of A. M. Crawford on "The Future Policies of the State Land Board," the short talk of Senator Bourne and the passing of resolutions asking for state and federal aid in the construction of good roads, were the principal features of today's session of the Oregon and Idaho Development Congress.

The session was called to order this morning by Colonel E. Hofer. Three speakers were on the program today, Attorney-General Crawford, Senator Bourne and L. E. Bean, of Eugene, who made an earnest plea for the improvement of the Siuslaw harbor. In the course of his remarks he said it was the purpose of the people of the Siuslaw country to have introduced at the next session of the legislature a bill whereby the people will be allowed to issue bonds not to exceed ten per cent of the taxable property, in order to provide funds for the improvement of the harbor.

Attorney-General Crawford spoke in regard to the Oregon land grants: "The courts have sustained the government in this," said the attorney-general, "that when it makes a grant to a corporation for certain purposes, under certain terms, those to whom these grants are made cannot avoid these conditions by assignment. The same is true of wagon-road grants, and if they received these lands with the condition attached that they were to sell them to actual settlers at \$2.50 an acre, it is impossible to avoid that condition by selling to some one else. The same applies to railroad grants."
"I find that there are three cases like this that have come before the supreme court. In each case the court has ruled that the grant must be complied with. When these corporations have been forced to comply with their grant conditions, this country will be rapidly developed and settled up."

He also stated that there was urgent need of more railroads in the arid districts, and while there were several proposed routes now being considered, they were mostly for speculation and not development. To induce the building of these roads he favored non-taxation for fifteen years on all roads built in Oregon for development purposes.

Senator Jonathan Bourne, with a view to ascertaining the sentiment of the congress upon the enforcement of the corporations to comply with the land grant conditions, moved that the matter be brought to a vote, but this brought up a heated argument, and the matter was not voted upon for the reason that it was not clearly understood. The sentiment was for a compromise rather than a contest.

Many resolutions were adopted for the immediate and concerted action of all influential persons to assist in securing aid in the development work of the state.

The meeting closed tonight to meet again at Vale, Oregon, so as to give Idaho people a chance to attend.

B. F. Howard yesterday afternoon filed with the county clerk a notice of appropriation of 609 inches of the waters of Bear creek, in township 16 south of range 6 west, for power purposes. The name of the canal is to be the Howard Electric Power canal. It is to be six feet wide and three feet deep.
