# INDIGNANT REPLY OF ARCHIBALD TO CHARGES

Standard Oil Magnate Seeks to Explain Morrison Appointment

New York, Oct. 26.—John D. Archibald, of the Standard Oil Company, made the following statement this afternoon regarding the letters read by W. R. Hearst at the Carnegie Hall meeting Saturday night:

"I am very sure that until Hearst read the letter neither Judge Morrison nor Judge Henderson had any knowledge of my having written Governor Stone in their behalf. Judge Henderson was not appointed by Governor Stone to the supreme court, but was three years later appointed by Governor Pennypacker to the supreme court judgeship. If, however, any feeble word of mine could have influenced in the slightest degree the selection of these gentlemen for their respective positions, I would be very proud of it. Their states have no better servants than they, and I certainly have never asked a favor of them of any kind, either for myself or for the company with which I am connected.

"My letters to General Elkin relating entirely to contributions to the Republican state committee, then engaged in the campaign preliminary to the nomination of Mr. McKinley, a subject regarding which I think Mr. Hearst should be a little sensitive, for was it not the election and tragic death of Mr. McKinley that came near costing Mr. Hearst his precious neck?

"The statement regarding Judge Haight is in connection with an old case that has been explained and exploded so many times that it would be a simple waste of time to the public to go over it again.

"The intimation by Mr. Hearst that he has had any communication from me or any of my associates in connection with the stolen letters is a lie.

"The only favor which I would ask or hope ever to ask of Hearst is that he return to me the letters handed him by his larcenous gentleman friend which were written from Japan, relating to the fatal illness of my daughter in that country."

# ROOSEVELT IS FIFTY YEARS OF AGE TODAY

President Spends Day Working Hard at Official Duties

Washington, Oct. 27.—President Roosevelt was fifty years of age today. He began his fifty-first year by getting to his desk early and spending the day at hard work. He received such members of his cabinet as were in town and discussed matters relating to their departments.

"Information has been delicately conveyed to me that if I stop reading letters right now all will be forgiven, but if I make another damaging disclosure, the whole power of the Standard Oil Company will be exerted against me.

**Archibald Letter**  
26 Broadway, December 5, 1902.—My Dear Governor:—I am sure you will pardon any seeming presumption on my part in writing you on a subject which both personally and on behalf of my company I am greatly interested. It is to urge the appointment of Judge Morrison, of McKean, to the supreme bench, vice Mitchell, deceased. Judge Morrison's character for ability and integrity needs no word at my hands, but aside from these great considerations his familiarity with all that pertains to the great industries of oil and gas in the important relation they bear to the interests of the western part of the state, make him especially desirable as a member of the court from that section. Hoping that it may prove possible for you to favorably consider Judge Morrison's appointment I am, with every high regard, sincerely yours, JOHN D. ARCHIBALD.

**Morrison Appointed**  
"I do not intend to make the slightest comment upon the letter. But I feel it liberty to inform the public that Judge Morrison is today a member of the supreme bench of Pennsylvania, and that he reached that high position either through his ability and integrity, or through his familiarity with oil and gas."

**Roseburg Wins Trophy for Third and Last Time**  
Splendid Score Made By National Guardsmen this Afternoon

Roseburg, Or., Oct. 27.—The regimental trophy and individual medal were both probably won by the Roseburg National Guardsmen this afternoon for the third time, making their ownership permanent.
