# ELECTION DAY IS NOW CENTRE OF INTEREST

Washington, D. C., Oct. 24.—One week from next Tuesday there will be election in thirty-three states and territories. In the election of states a governing and other state officers, in the others minor state officers or justices of the Supreme Court, and in some, Congressmen only are to be elected. The States of Arkansas and Georgia the state officers have been chosen this summer, leaving only the Representatives in Congress and Presidential candidates in the coming election. In Arkansas and Georgia the state officers have been chosen this summer, leaving only the Representatives in Congress and Presidential candidates to be voted for.

The term of thirty-one United States senators—twenty Democrats and eleven Republicans—expired March 3, 1909. In a number of the states the senatorial choice already has been made by primary. A National House of Representatives is to be elected—the Sixty-first Congress. The present House is composed of 223 Republicans and 166 Democrats, with two vacancies caused by death, one Republican and one Democrat. Maine has already elected four Republicans, Vermont 2 and Oregon 2. The congressional situation at large is very mixed. There are sixteen ninety and one hundred close congressional districts scattered throughout the country, most of them in these states are close in the sense that the Republican or Democratic plurality in the last election was so slender that it would take but a slight change in every voting precinct to bring a reversal of the political complexion.

**The National Ticket.**  
The national tickets in the field Republican stand as follows: President and Vice-President, Republican, William H. Taft of Ohio; James S. Sherman of New York. Democratic: William J. Bryan of Nebraska; John W. Kern of Indiana. Prohibitionist: Eugene W. Chafin of Illinois; Aaron S. Watkins of Ohio. Socialist: Eugene V. Debs of Indiana; Benjamin Hanford of New York. People's Party: Thomas E. Watson of Georgia; Samuel Williams of Indiana. Independence Party: Thomas L. Higgin of Massachusetts; John Temple Graves of Georgia. Socialist-Labor: August Gilbane, New York; Donald L. Monroe of Virginia.

As usual there is one State ticket, the Democratic, in South Carolina, where Martin F. Ansel has been re-nominated for governor. For the first time in many years there is no fusion in any State, though in several states the Republican or Democratic candidates for state officers have been nominated or endorsed by one or more of the minor parties.

## McLEAN TELLS STRAIGHT STORY TO OFFICERS

B. D. McLean, of Eugene, is the man who was arrested at Vancouver, Wash., yesterday and held as being suspected of the murder of Harry T. Butterworth at Seattle, a few evenings ago. The initials and the name given in the press dispatch to The Guard yesterday were wrong. McLean lives on a farm on the Goodpasture "island" north of the city. He left here for Seattle a few nights ago, intending to consult a physician for some ailment. He also announced that he would stop at Portland and Vancouver, intending to see a man at the latter place who used to work for him. C. F. Hawkins, who lives at 663 Patterson street, said last night: "I loaned McLean my revolver and gave him six cartridges. The pistol was a 32 special Smith & Wesson and was almost new. The cartridges I took out of a box from which a few had been taken before I am quite sure they were all the same kind, as I never knew different kinds to come in the same box, and I think they were Winchester, but I am not absolutely certain about the kind. I did not load the gun but I gave McLean the cartridges to load."

McLean was formerly connected with the meat market on East Thirtieth street, being associated with Ed Bushnell. He also peddled meat on the streets for some time several years ago. He is an ex-soldier, having served in one of the U. S. volunteer regiments in the Philippines. It will also be remembered that four or five years ago he eloped with a girl residing in the vicinity of Hale street to Astoria. At that place they boarded a tug boat, and went out beyond the bar and were married by the captain of the vessel on the high seas.

Will Probably Be Released.  
The Oregonian this morning has the following: "Though unable thoroughly to satisfy the officers of his innocence and woefully perplexed in trying to give an account of his movements Tuesday night, B. D. McLean detained by the Vancouver police in connection with the murder of Harry T. Butterworth at St. John, told so straightforward and convincing a story that his release will likely be ordered immediately. Many details of the story have been corroborated and in no detail of consequence has a discrepancy been discovered. As a result of the investigation of his movements and his statement, officers endeavoring to solve the mystery surrounding the killing of Butterworth are completely satisfied."

## BRANDENBURG ARRESTED "FINGER" CONNERS FOR LETTER FORGERY

Dayton, O., Oct. 22.—As he was boarding a train here today for New York, Broughton Brandenburg was arrested by local detectives on a charge of forgery and grand larceny. A telegram from the New York police department advised the local department to hold him. He is alleged to have sold the New York Times a letter which he alleged to have been written by the late Grover Cleveland in which statement was predicted the election of Taft and which letter is now declared to have been a forgery. Brandenburg was locked up as the amount of bail was not fixed. In a statement tonight Brandenburg says he had the proper authority from Mrs. Cleveland and from Mrs. Hastings, co-executor of the Cleveland estate, before he sold the article to the Times and furthermore asks if it is reasonable to suppose that a sane man would falsify the utterance of an ex-president of the United States for \$120. At the time he was arrested he said he was on his way to New York city to give District Attorney Jerome additional evidence. He says the arrest was made by those interested in offsetting Cleveland's utterances, the object being to secure a dramatic climax just before election.

## WORK RESUMED ON MONROE RAILWAY

The citizens of Monroe are feeling better. For weeks they have been waiting the coming of the railroad, but work had been practically stopped on the line leading to that town. It has now resumed, however, and it is now only a question of a short time until the road will be completed into Monroe.

The construction gangs have not been idle while Monroe has been waiting. They have been building a branch from the main line to the foothills west of Monroe, a distance of about six miles. The work on this was practically completed last week and the grading gangs are back again on the line to Monroe.
