TIMMONS SAYS HE DID NOT CUT HIS OWN THROAT

Salem, Oct. 22.—C. Y. Timmons, who yesterday killed his wife by cutting her throat with a razor, and who is in the hospital about to die from the terrible injuries to his own throat, which were at first believed to have been self-inflicted, today subscribed to a confession as to the murder of his wife, but declared he did not know who cut his own throat.

In his tale he recites long weeks of alleged cruelty. He claims his wife had threatened to kill him; claims she had proven untrue, and that many times he had encountered this hysterical "Bob" in no pleasant manner.

In his statement Timmons told of his marriage in Portland in May, 1907, thus clearing a disputed point. He states he has a brother living at Portland on East Clay street, between Eleventh and Twelfth streets.

Every pressure was brought on Timmons to secure a truthful confession. In the silence of the sick room, with the nurses near like angels of death, with the physician's statement ringing in his ears, with the pain of his wound inflicting tortures upon him, with the belief that in a few hours he would be called before the judgment seat at the side of his wife to tell the story of the murder to a higher tribunal, dramatic Timmons swore he would utter no falsehood in his confession.

FROZEN TO DEATH IN MOUNTAINS AT WALDO LAKE

Earl Dodd, aged 20 years, son of W. S. Dodd, who resides near Natron, was found dead near Waldo Lake Saturday morning. He had been out hunting and had evidently lost his way and frozen to death.

The news of the finding of the body reached Eugene Sunday evening by telephone from Lowell. The message came to Coroner Gordon. A messenger was sent out from Waldo Lake Saturday morning to the Stiers ranch at the road, thence further down the road, where a phone message was sent to Lowell and it was repeated there to the coroner. Permission was wanted from the coroner to remove the body.

Few particulars of the death of the young man were obtained from the messenger. He was engaged at work with J. F. Gold, John Kroger and Dick Hilder on A. B. Hays' Irrigation reservoir at the lake. Thursday morning he left the camp with his rifle, with the intention of killing some game. He did not return that evening and his companions became anxious. Friday morning they started out to look for him and his untimely death.
