MONTGOMERY IS CONVICTED AGAIN

Pittsburg, Oct. 28.—William Montgomery, cashier of the Alleghany National bank until the discovery of a shortage of its funds of more than \$1,200,000 early last summer, was sentenced today for the second time this week, found guilty of embezzlement and abstraction of funds, his pecuniary liability in the two cases amounting to \$613,000. As in the first case, Montgomery offered no testimony in defense. The jury was out less than two hours.

New York, Nov. 3.—11 p. m.—The Herald says that Taft has 306 electoral votes and a plurality of 150,000 in New York—also that Hughes wins by close to 45,000 plurality.

SWEEPING TAFT VICTORY
New York, Nov. 4.—Indications are that the following votes will be cast in the electoral college for Taft: California, 10; Connecticut, 7; Delaware, 3; Idaho, 3; Illinois, 27; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 10; Maine, 6; Massachusetts, 16; Michigan, 14; Minnesota, 11; New Hampshire, 4; New Jersey, 12; New York, 39; North Dakota, 4; Ohio, 23; Oregon, 4; Pennsylvania, 34; Rhode Island, 4; South Dakota, 4; Utah, 3; Vermont, 4; Washington, 5—total, 275. CARRIES NEW YORK CITY

BRYAN'S NEIGHBORS
TENDER OVATION

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 2.—The greatest demonstration in the history of Lincoln was given to W. J. Bryan by his fellow townsmen tonight on his return to his home city at the close of his campaign. Non-partisan in character, it was participated in by Democrats and Republicans alike, and was cheered through the entire population of the city. The reception was tendered him as a candidate, and not as a man who had been elected. In the parade which followed his automobile from the Union Pacific station, however, many political transparencies were carried.

Bryan Moved to Tears
Mr. Bryan reached his home city at 8:20 o'clock. His train was met by a tremendous crowd, and as the score of carriages and automobiles forming an immediate escort started across the viaduct from the railroad station the great parade fell into line behind him. The parade moved through the main street of the city, through solid masses of cheering humanity, and returned to the Hotel Lincoln, where Mr. Bryan spoke, overlooking the public square.

Mr. Bryan's speech was greeted with vociferous cheers. The candidate was moved to tears as he made an affectionate reference to his wife, and when he closed, the demonstration accorded him was such as he rarely had experienced in his three campaigns.

Solemn Pledge to Supporters
"I believe I am going to be elected," he said. "More than that, I believe that it is going to be more than a bare victory. I believe that there is a stirring of the conscience of the American people; a moral awakening, an uprising that means a sweeping victory, and I will swear in your presence that no one who votes for me will ever have occasion to be ashamed of the vote he casts."

In the course of his speech Mr. Bryan said:

"There are unimportant features in public life, but its rewards far outweigh its unpleasant parts, and nothing has occurred in my life that I appreciate more than the cordial reception that you have given me in my home city at the close of this campaign. To have lived among you with the publicity that attaches to the present campaign, and then to have this evidence of your good will makes this night memorable in my life. While it has sometimes been humiliating to have it thrown up to me that my city has never given me a majority vote, we will give it to you this time. While I regret that it has been humiliating, yet, as a matter of fact, I have always had a large complimentary vote from the Republican citizens of Lincoln.

Speaks for Republican Votes
"Without the votes of many Republicans I would not have been elected to congress in 1892, for my majority was only 149, and without that election I would not have been nominated for the presidency in 1896. Therefore I can feel grateful to the Republicans who gave me my start, and whose votes were absolutely necessary to my election on that occasion. And whatever the Republicans of Lincoln do in the future, they have done enough in the past by laying the foundation of my political career to make me their debtor while I live."

Last Speech of Campaign
Marysville, Kan., Nov. 2.—William J. Bryan concluded his campaign of the state of Kansas and of the United States before an enthusiastic audience here tonight.

It was the last political speech of the campaign, his address to be given at Lincoln being non-partisan, but simply a talk of a neighbor to his neighbors. Mr. Bryan realized that it was the concluding speech of the campaign and his words were given with more than ordinary feeling. His oration was delivered with all the earnestness at his command, and as he declared that he had given an impulse to honest politics and helped to create a sentiment in favor of reform, he was wildly applauded by the large audience. Following is the conclusion of the last campaign speech made by Mr. Bryan in 1908:

Has Stood Rigid Test.
"Ladies and gentlemen, I am now 48 years of age. It is eighteen years since I began my political career as a candidate for congress. I told the people of my district that if elected I would not try to get their hands into other people's pockets; that I would simply try to keep other people's hands out of their pockets. For eighteen years this thought has run through every speech and act I have given. I have never forgotten the Jeffersonian maxim of 'equal rights to all, special privileges to none.' I have tried to help make this government a government of the people, by the people and for the people.

"For eighteen years you have had a chance to scan my every speech and act. While Republican leaders have disappeared as a result of investigations, I have invited the scrutiny of my opponents and have outlived their criticisms and their misrepresentations. I know not what the future has for me; I know not whether it is my duty to stay in the White House or continue to perform the work which I have tried to perform as a private citizen; but I have not lived in vain. I have given an impulse to honest politics; I have helped to create a sentiment in favor of reform and as a candidate I have but one thing to rely upon—the confidence of the masses in my fidelity to their interests.

Lines Up Taft With Trusts
"My opponent has been lined up all those years which are considered rather in politics; but I would rather have the love of the people, the affection of the multitude in whose behalf I have fought than to hold any office. If I enter the White House I shall enter it free to keep the pledges I have made; free to serve with singleness of purpose. If I am elected I shall for four years, devote whatever energy I have and whatever ability I possess to the one object of making this government again a government in which the people rule and order in its every detail shall draw from society a reward proportionate to the service which he renders to his fellow men."
