CHANGES IN PLAN OF THE FOREST SERVICE OFFICERS

On December 1, the Forest service office in Washington will be abandoned in its extensive scope, and the working force will be distributed along the district headquarters in the West. The move is made to facilitate the handling of all kinds of business and chiefly concerns the public in regard to the greater convenience in making examinations of homesteads, contests, or timber claims, that will be provided.
A. E. Cohoon, supervisor of the Sluslaw forest reserve, says that there are about 400 employees at the head office in Washington, all of which will be distributed among Portland, San Francisco, Missoula, Denver, Ogden and Albuquerque, New Mexico. The district of which Portland is the head is composed of Oregon, Washington and Alaska.
In all the forest service there are perhaps 1200 employees. There will be but a handful of these left at Washington, D. C., all complaints going to the district headquarters, Gifford Pinchot, the head forester, with his small corps, will only act on matters of policy.
Supervisor Cohoon describes Pinchot as a wonderful man. He works on what to him is no salary, being a millionaire, and cares for nothing but his forest work. The salary is \$5,000 a year.
Under his policy and due to his advice, Congress in 1906 passed act by which settlers can take up homesteads in the forest reserve so long as they actually live upon the land. Of course no timber is permitted to be filed upon.
In the Sluslaw reserve there are 175 such applications. Some of the ranches inside the forest reserve pay well. One that the supervisor knows brought into its owner last year something like \$1800.

LANE COUNTY STUDENTS AT O. A. C.

U. S. EXAMINATIONS FOR PHILIPPINE SERVICE

The United States Civil Service Commission announces an examination on December 29-30, 1908, in this city to fill a large number of vacancies in the positions of clerk and teacher in the Philippine Service. Further details may be learned at the postoffice. The entrance salary of the majority of male appointees will be \$1200 per annum, although some appointments may be made at salaries of \$1000 or \$1100, based upon the experience and the relative standing in the examination, and they will be eligible for promotion up to \$2,000 per annum for teachers. Eligibility in the assistant examination is required for promotion to the positions of division superintendent, which carry salaries ranging from \$1600 to \$3000.
Women will not be admitted to the teacher examination unless they are the wives, immediate relatives, or fiancées of men examined for teacher or assistant or appointed to or already employed in the Philippine Service as teacher. Each woman applicant should state definitely in her application the name, address and relationship of such person. Only a small proportion of appointments can be made from the female teacher register, and such appointees usually receive entrance salaries of \$1000 or \$900.
It is desired to secure as many eligibles as possible who are college graduates, and especially of normal schools. Persons with training and experience in industrial work and in agriculture are desired, and preference in appointment will be given them.
The Philippine school year begins in the early part of June and ends with the month of March. So far as possible all appointments of teachers are made with a view to their arrival at Manila before the beginning of May. In this way the contract period of two years expires with the school year. Later sailings are sometimes permitted, but few appointments are made during the remainder of the year.
