GERMANY ISSUES OFFICIAL STATEMENT

Tells Why Apology is Demanded of the French. Berlin, Nov. 5.—The viewpoint of Germany in the Casa Blanca affair is explained officially by the foreign office today. "All we demand is a simple statement of regret from France for the violation of the neutrality of the German consular office at Casa Blanca, an expression such as would be demanded by any nation whose officers had been subjected to attack. Unless this is forthcoming there will be no object in continuing further negotiations. We cannot permit this point to be submitted to arbitration, for we regard it as a point of national honor that such regret should be expressed. We do not desire the French officials concerned be reprimanded; that the French soldiers be punished or the adoption of any measures of discipline whatever. Concerning other points of difference we are prepared to arbitrate. We acknowledge that something might have occurred on the German side which could have been avoided, while the French also must admit from her side that unnecessary acts have been committed."

Tacoma, Nov. 5.—A strong movement has been started in Tacoma and other northern western cities today for the appointment as secretary of the interior in Taft's cabinet, of Judge R. A. Ballinger of Seattle.

DIVORCE CASE FILED IN COURT TODAY

James Laxton of Springfield, today instituted suit in the circuit court against his wife, Lulu G., for an annulment of the marriage contract and the custody of their two minor sons, William E., aged 17 years, and Walter L., aged 15 years. Laxton, in his complaint, says they were married in Eugene on October 25, 1890, and that his wife has been guilty of cruel and inhuman treatment during the past year, in that she has remained away from home and refuses to cook and provide for him and the boys. The plaintiff alleges that she has tantalized and harassed him by telling him that she intends to get a divorce.

YOUNG EXPLORER WILL HUNT WITH ROOSEVELT

Los Angeles, Nov. 7.—Attracted by the remarkable achievements of Edmund Heller in his explorations of strange and little known lands in Africa and elsewhere, President Roosevelt has selected the 26-year-old Riverside youth from a list of hundreds of eminent scientists and naturalists of the nation, who aspired to the place to accompany him to the wilds of Africa next March. The honor comes to the California boy unsolicited and unexpected and the fact of his appointment was first learned from his mother, Mrs. Marion Heller, of Riverside, who received a letter from the youthful explorer telling of the plans.

JOHN LARSON SENTENCED TO ONE YEAR IN PRISON

The grand jury late yesterday afternoon returned indictments as follows: Norman Luck, larceny from a dwelling at Irving; John Larson, larceny from a dwelling at Sycamore; Harry Murphy and Robert Harvey, who had up and assaulted M. W. DeWald at Cottage Grove. Luck, when arraigned, entered a plea of guilty today and time for sentence was fixed at Saturday at 9 a. m. Harvey and Murphy each entered a plea of not guilty. Larson pleaded guilty and was sentenced to the penitentiary. The other indictment against him, for stealing a suit of clothes from Chas. Smith in the McFarland lodging house in Eugene, was dismissed and "not a true bill" was reported by the grand jury. "Not a true bill" was also reported in the case of the state vs. Jim Cheezem, charged with assault with dangerous weapon.
