RACE RIOT ENDED IN OKLAHOMA

Oklmulgee, Okla., Nov. 16.—Quiet prevails here today following yesterday's battle between the officers and negroes in which five negroes were shot to death. The state militia has been ordered to be in readiness, but will not come here, the local officers say, as there is absolutely no need of their presence.

Oklmulgee, Okla., Nov. 15.—Eight persons were killed and ten others injured this afternoon in a fight between Jim Deckard, a negro desperado, and local officers. The dead: Edgar Robinson, sheriff of Okmulgee county.

Henry Klaber, assistant chief of police of Okmulgee.

Two negroes named Chapman, brothers.

Jim Deckard, negro.

Three unidentified negroes.

The wounded: Steve Grayson, Indian boy, fatally.

Vic Farr, chief of police, shot through shoulder.

Deputy sheriff, name not leant, arm broken.

Seven others slightly wounded.

FIGHT STARTS TROUBLE

The disturbance began at the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad station, where Jim Deckard engaged in a fight with an Indian boy, Steve Grayson, and beat him into insensibility with a rock.

YALE WINS FROM PRINCETON ELEVEN

Princeton, N. J., Nov. 14.—Princeton closed an inglorious football season with a defeat at the hands of Yale today, 11 to 6. Outplayed in the first half 4 to 0, Yale came back determined for the second and simply carried Princeton off its feet. Working like a piece of machinery in the opening half, the Orange and Black returned for the second session to show only spasmodic flashes of the brilliancy displayed earlier in the day.

In the second half Dillon, the plucky Princeton captain, was knocked senseless and cried bitterly when carried from the field. Seven substitutes had to be put in during the last half by Princeton, the team losing heart when their captain was disabled.

The Multnomah-Whitman college game at Portland Saturday resulted in a 11 to 5 victory for Multnomah.

PENN WIPES OUT WOLVERINE TEAM

Ann Arbor, Nov. 14.—The greatest throng in the history of Michigan's gridiron battles, estimated at 22,000 people, crowding the bleachers, saw Michigan go down to defeat before Pennsylvania in one of the most decisive struggles ever played between the giants of the East and West. Michigan was utterly annihilated in the game, losing by a score of 29 to 0.

Worn out in the second half, and with a line of frequent substitutions, what promised to be a good game on the part of the Wolverines degenerated into a scoreless for the Quakers.

George Hadley, of Lorane, was in the city today. He says the new R. F. D. route is a great convenience. The route is on trial, but the people of the section hope to make it permanent.

RUEF'S LAWYERS ASK FOR CHANGE OF VENUE

San Francisco, Nov. 16.—When the trial of Abe Ruef was resumed today in the courtroom it was half filled by armed policemen, detectives and deputy sheriffs. Attorneys Ach and Dozier, counsel for Ruef, immediately asked for a change of venue, and in support of their application affidavits, sworn to by Ruef himself and by Ach and Dozier, were read, setting forth that as a result of the shooting of Heney in the courtroom Friday the jury was under the impression that Ruef was in some manner connected with the affair, and therefore it could not help but have been prejudiced against the defendant, and that tragic affair had caused such intensity of public feeling that threats of violence were being made, not only against Ruef, but against his counsel; that, therefore, it would be impossible for the defendant to be given a fair trial in this city.

At the table and in the same chair where sat Heney when he was shot was his assistant, John O'Gara, from the district attorney's office, and by his side were Hiram Johnson, Matthew L. Sullivan and Joseph J. Dwyer, who volunteered their services to take up Heney's work. Upon the request of O'Gara, Judge Lawlor granted a continuance until tomorrow morning, to give the prosecution time to file the necessary affidavits in a counter-showing.

OREGON WINS IN SUPREME COURT

Washington, Nov. 16.—The controversy between the states of Oregon

and Washington over the boundary line at a point near the mouth of the Columbia river was settled by the supreme court of the United States today. The decision, which was announced by Justice Brewer, and which recognized the justice of Oregon's contentions in the dispute, involved the control of a number of islands of importance to the fishermen of the region.

REPUBLICAN LEADERS CONFER AT HOT SPRINGS

Hot Springs, Va., Nov. 12.—What must be designated as the "most capital" session to have been established here in the Virginia mountains, President-elect Taft has surrounded him today the largest coterie of statesmen and politicians that have been with him since the election. Vice-President-elect Sherman arrived today with William L. Ward, of New York, national committee man from that state, and Representative Theodore A. Burton, of Cleveland, came on the midnight train for a visit of at least 10 days.

Senator Bourne, of Oregon, arrived yesterday, and Senators Burkett, of Nebraska, and Scott, of West Virginia, came in today.

"I am here just for fun," said Mr. Sherman. "Yes, you may call me Mr. Vice President. I like it. I play golf and I have my sticks with me. I shall stay a week at least. My long suit is talking as I play and if I can get up a game with Judge Taft I shall do my best to talk him out of his good playing."

"Seriously," Mr. Sherman added.

TRIAL OF FRED CRAIG BEING HELD

The trial of Fred Craig, charged jointly with Harvey Jones with contributing to the delinquency of Addie Watts, a minor girl, is being held today. A jury as follows, was chosen: Geo. H. Bogue, E. F. Miller, A. M. Gilbert, Jas. Hayes, T. J. Buckley, Frank Hampton, W. M. Green, D. M. Purkerson, J. W. Seavey, T. A. Gilbert, E. K. Chapman and C. P. Barnard.

The taking of testimony was in progress at a late hour this afternoon.

Jones Will Be Sentenced Tomorrow.

The jury in the case of the State vs. Harvey Jones, charged with the same offense that Craig is being tried for, which found him guilty Saturday, recommended a light sentence. This was agreed upon before the jury could agree upon a verdict. The penalty is only a county jail sentence. Sentence will be pronounced tomorrow.

Martin and Hayes Win.

In the case of W. G. Martin and C. M. Hayes vs. L. G. Clark, to recover money, the jury Saturday afternoon returned a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs in the sum of \$290. FEDERATION FAVORS ASIATIC EXCLUSION

Denver, Nov. 16.—The American Federation of Labor's resolution on the subject of the exclusion of Asiatic races was adopted by the convention as reported by the committee on resolutions. The resolution declares that "the terms of the Chinese exclusion act should be enlarged and extended so as to exclude permanently from the United States and its insular territory all races native of Asia, other than those exempted by the present terms of the act."

COMMENDS NEW DOWAGER TO REGENT

Peking, Nov. 16.—Following the publication yesterday of the late emperor's valedictory, commending reference of the empire's affairs to the regent dowager, who is now dead, another edict was issued this morning, giving the late dowager's valedictory, commending the new dowager, Yehonala, to the confidence of the young emperor's regents. The new emperor's installation on the throne and the naming of the era will take place, it is expected, on the Chinese New Year, January 21.
