## SIMON KLOVDIAHL COMPLETES HIS NEW COUNTY MAP

Simon Klovdahl, the civil engineer, has just completed a fine new map of Lane county which he has placed on the market selling them for \$10 each. This is the first map made of the county since Joe Koch's map made fifteen years ago. New features of the map are as follows: Every township is an exact copy of the official survey, showing topography and all subdivisions, and gives acreage of all fractions; all original donation claims are shown so that any description of land, large or small, can be located, whether it is part of a section or part of a donation; new and correct boundaries of the county, of which can be mentioned the portion annexed from Douglas county, including Tillamook Lake on the southwest corner, the Lane county boundary to the northeast, and the mountain boundary with Douglas to the southeast; the new precinct divisions; county roads up to date; all the national forest boundaries, both in the Cascade as well as the Umpqua reserves; school houses, with district numbers; a special feature of much value to mountaineers is the correction of the unsurveyed portion of the Cascade mountains by data obtained from private surveys. Streams, mountains, trails, and noted landmarks have been added or corrected; the proposed Natron-Klamath railroad and the electric railroad from Junction City through Eugene, Springfield and up the McKenzie.

## KUTHE CASE TAKEN TO THE FEDERAL COURT

A petition for a writ of habeas corpus for Charles F. Kuthe, in jail in Eugene on the charge of selling non-intoxicating malt liquors contrary to a city ordinance, was filed in the United States district court today, says yesterday's Portland Journal. Kuthe, it seems, was arrested and fined \$25. Refusing to pay the fine, he was sent to jail for twelve days. The petitioners assert that the imprisonment of Kuthe is illegal for the following reasons: That the city ordinance of Eugene is unreasonable; that the city charter of Eugene does not authorize the city to make it unlawful or to prescribe a penalty for selling non-intoxicating liquors; that the legislature has no power to authorize a city to make it unlawful to sell such beverages; that the section of the city charter relating to malt liquors has been suspended by the operation of the local option laws; that the ordinance is void and that the plaintiff is deprived of his liberty without due process of law and against the constitutions of Oregon and the United States as well.
