## RELIEF BADLY INJURED IN STORM

Has Been Repaired Sufficiently to Proceed on Her Way

Manila, Nov. 25.—Admiral Sperry has received a telegram from the hospital ship Relief, five days overdue at Guam, for which port she sailed from this harbor November 15th, the message coming by the way of Sorsoyan, southern Luzon, stating the ship was badly damaged by a typhoon on November 18 and her engines disabled. Fire broke out but was promptly put under control. The Relief is proceeding to Manila under her own steam, repairs to her engines having been made by the crew.

## ANDREW CARNEGIE SEVENTY-ONE YEARS OLD

New York, Nov. 25.—Andrew Carnegie, who has earned for himself the title of the world's most noted philanthropist-capitalist, was seventy-one years old today. Thanks to his simple life and regular habits, Mr. Carnegie is in the enjoyment of excellent health. Despite the whiteness of his hair and beard he might easily be taken for a man of sixty years or even younger. His devotion to golf and other forms of outdoor recreation has kept him in the best of physical condition.

It is estimated that Mr. Carnegie's public benefactions in 1908 amount to about \$15,000,000. Since he made up his mind that it is not good to die rich he has given away a total of about \$150,000,000 of his colossal fortune and he declares he is still ready to give. Notwithstanding the generous hand with which he has scattered his millions for the benefit of the people on both sides of the Atlantic, there appears to be no chance of Mr. Carnegie dying poor. His income is estimated to be considerably in excess of his benefactions, though the latter average more than \$1,000,000 a month a year round.

## CANNERYMAN HUME DIED THIS MORNING

Marshfield, Nov. 25.—R. D. Hume, the canneryman, died at his home at Wedderburn this morning, after a lingering illness. He was one of the leading salmon exporters and prominent in the propagation of that fish, and a member of the Oregon legislature. His funeral will be held at Wedderburn Friday.

## CASTELLANE'S SUIT OPENS IN PARIS

Wants His Children and Forty Thousand Dollars a Year

Paris, Nov. 25.—The suit of Count Boni de Castellane against his former wife, who was Miss Anna Gould, and is now the wife of Prince Helle de Sagan, for custody of his three children, opened here today. The count's counsel presented the general ground for the suit, charging the alleged scandalous conduct of Prince Helle

de Sagan that he has not reformed since marriage; that the conduct of the princess before her marriage to de Sagan had been improper. He asks that the princess be compelled to contribute \$40,000 annually to the support of the children, and that the children be awarded to him because of the moral atmosphere of the de Sagan household is unfit for the children.

## PORT OF PORTLAND LAW IS VALID

Salem, Or., Nov. 24.—In affirming the decree of Judge C. U. Ganteborn of the Circuit Court for Multnomah County, in the case of Sylvester Farrell vs. the Port of Portland, the Supreme Court this morning validated the adoption of the port, authorizing the issuance of \$500,000 bonds for the purpose of establishing and maintaining an efficient towage and pilotage service between Portland and the sea. The opinion is written by Chief Justice Bean.

This action was brought to enjoin the Board of Commissioners from carrying into effect the provision of the amendment, which was proposed by the initiative and adopted by the voters on the ground that such law is void. In passing upon the salient features of the case the court held that the Port of Portland is a municipal corporation organized in pursuance of an act of the Legislature of 1901, but that it is neither a city or a town in the strict, technical sense.

Some of the leading Democratic politicians are of the opinion that Thomas R. Marshall, Democratic governor-elect of Indiana, will have some advantage as a Democratic presidential possibility in 1912 over Governor Johnson, of Indiana, and Senator-elect of Ohio. Their judgment is based chiefly upon the fact that the terms of both Johnson and Harmon will expire two years hence and they will be compelled to be re-elected to retain their prestige.

The temporary roll call of the house of representatives for the sixty-first congress has been completed and published. It shows that the next house will consist of 219 Republicans and 172 Democrats, a total of 391, as against a total of 389 in the house during the last session, of whom 225 were Republicans and 164 Democrats. The result is a net loss of four from the Republican side and a net gain of six on the Democratic side, the discrepancy being due to present vacancies. All told, the Republicans gained twelve districts and the Democrats seventeen.

Charles Harris, the old man residing above Cottage Grove, who was committed to the insane asylum Monday evening, was taken to that institution last night.

J. C. Hileman, who was in town from Mabel yesterday states that the S. F. Co's mill No. 1, will resume operation shortly. Preparations are evidently being made to resume.

## LECOMPTE EXECUTED BY REVOLUTIONISTS

Port au Prince, Nov. 25.—The report that General Lecompte, Haytian minister of the interior, was killed at Jeremie was confirmed today. Arriving at Jeremie Lecompte found the garrison of the town in the hands of the commander, Captain Ostema, of treason and had him executed. Lecompte later had two prominent citizens of Jeremie executed. These outrages wrought the people up and they armed themselves, took Lecompte prisoner and executed him.

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## COURT RULES STRONGLY AGAINST DEFENDANT

La Porte, Ind., Nov. 25.—The state scored a big victory in the Lamphere trial when Judge Richter, after exhaustive arguments on both sides, announced that he would instruct the jury that if the evidence shows that Lamphere set fire to the Guinness house, even if the fire did not cause the death of any persons therein, the jury must find him guilty of arson. The instructions will also contain a paragraph that if the jury finds that any one of the four persons in the house lost his or her life as a result of the fire, and that Lamphere set that fire, then it must find Lamphere guilty of murder of manslaughter.

## CAPTAIN THEORIN ELUSIVE SAILOR

Albany, Or., Nov. 23.—Police of this city have searched in vain all day for Captain F. Theorin, who is wanted in Portland to answer to the charge of killing M. C. Rasmussen, watchman of the steam schooner Washington. They found that a man supposed to be Theorin spent last night at a hotel here, but this man left Albany this forenoon after his alleged recognition by a sailor from Yaquina bay.

## Not in 'Frisco.

San Francisco, Nov. 23.—The police boarded the steamer Rose City this afternoon on her arrival from Portland, but failed to find Captain F. Theorin, wanted in the northern city on a charge of murder. The detectives called the entire crew on deck and thoroughly searched the vessel without finding any trace of the man.

## Politics and Politicians

Zapata is the banner Republican county of Texas. The official returns of the recent election show that Taft received 424 votes and Bryan none.

W. D. Jamison, who defeated William P. Hepburn for congress in the Eighth Iowa district, is a comparatively young man, who has been engaged in the business of making both ends meet on a weekly newspaper.

According to a report circulated in Washington friends of John Hays Hammond, the millionaire mining man, and publisher of Massachusetts, will ask Mr. Taft to make him a member of his cabinet.

Thomas R. Marshall, whom the Democrats have elected governor of Indiana, is a noted story teller and public speaker. He is a lawyer by profession and for several years was on the bench.

In all probability before the close of President-elect Taft's administration there will be four vacancies on the United States supreme court bench, and close friends of Mr. Taft are of the opinion that he is likely to appoint to these vacancies three Republicans and one Democrat.

President-elect Taft will go to New York early in December to attend a banquet of the North Carolina Society. He will remain in New York about a week as the guest of his brother and will then go south to remain until near the date of his inauguration.
