EIGHTIETH BIRTHDAY OF MRS. S. J. SCOTT

Creswell, Dec. 8.—On December 5, at her home near Creswell, Mrs. S. J. Scott celebrated her eightieth birthday. 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JOE JACOBS ONCE MORE GETS THE MAXIMUM SENTENCE

The trial of Zach Parsons, charged with selling liquor, was held today in the circuit court before a jury as follows: D. W. Brabham, Frank Goshen, R. E. Trindin, James Kennedy, Geo. Fisher, E. F. Miller, S. B. Jackson, Jr., G. T. Ray, W. E. Flak, A. A. Gibson, Otto Roberts and R. C. Martin. The jury was still out at a late hour this afternoon. Yesterday afternoon Ray Littlefield changed his plea of not guilty to that of guilty and was sentenced to thirty days in the county jail for selling liquor. Joe Jacobs entered a plea of guilty to another charge of selling liquor and will be sentenced tomorrow. Several other liquor cases were continued for the term. Cyrus Woolridge was sentenced to 15 days in the county jail this morning on a liquor-selling charge. James Carban was sentenced to pay a fine of \$300 and costs on the same charge of violating the local option law. He was brought up for sentence this morning at 10 o'clock. Judge Harris stated that inasmuch as Witter had gone out of the business and had been out since last April and as he was neither director or indirectly interested in the business at the present time and on account of his old age—76 years—he was inclined to be lenient and fixed his fine at \$250. Witter stated to the judge that he was entirely out of the business and expected to stay out. As he accompanied his husband at the present time, he burst into tears, eliciting the sympathy of the onlookers. Witter was always a law-abiding citizen as a saloon-keeper but, like many others in the same business, he kept on selling liquor after the local option law went into effect. Smyth Fined \$300. W. H. Smyth, who had entered a plea of guilty to the charge of selling liquor in Eugene, was sentenced this forenoon to pay a fine of \$300. Pony Witter, son of Charles Witter, was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail on the same charge. Bert Kelsay, charged with perjury, withdrew his plea of not guilty this morning and entered a plea of guilty. He will be sentenced Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Grand Jury Quits Till February. The grand jury last evening reported to the court that it had not finished the business before it and had adjourned till Monday, February 5, at 9 a. m. There are a number of liquor cases yet to be looked up. Parsons Jury Disagreed. The jury in the Zach Parsons liquor case reported last night that it could not agree and was discharged. It is said the vote stood 7 to 5 for acquittal. A jury in another liquor case, Parsons, was secured this forenoon as follows: F. B. Dillard, E. L. Gum, J. S. Ham, T. A. Gilbert, J. E. Lindley, A. S. Kaufman, G. N. Bryant, John Hampton, A. M. Hendricks, O. E. Roberts, T. B. Davidson, Charles Stickle. The case was still on trial at a late hour this afternoon. Linn Arrested. Thomas Linn, a former restaurant keeper here, was arrested this morning upon an indictment charging him with bootlegging, and he will enter his plea tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. LIQUOR CASES STILL HOLD COURT'S ATTENTION

(From Tuesday's Daily Guard.) The coroner's inquest over the body of Jacob Mathews, whose body was found in the cabin on the Walkaway place Sunday afternoon and who is thought to have been murdered, was begun this forenoon. The following jurors were chosen: S. M. Yoran, Wm. Preston, J. M. Howe, G. W. Griffin, C. P. Barnard and W. J. Warnock. The testimony of Drs. F. M. Day and Beardsley, who made a post-mortem examination of the body was taken. They testified that the examination failed to reveal anything that would cause the death of the man. The brain and the heart were examined and the contents of the stomach will be analyzed later. With that, the inquest was adjourned till Thursday at 1:30 p. m. at which time it is expected that the dead man's son will be here and the analysis of the stomach contents will have been made. HYDE SENTENCED TO TWO YEARS Washington, D. C., Dec. 8.—Fredrick A. Hyde of San Francisco, who was convicted of conspiracy to defraud the United States of large tracts of land in Oregon and Washington, was today sentenced to a fine of \$10,000 and to serve two years in the penitentiary at Moundsville, W. Va., the maximum sentence and penalty under the law. Joseph H. Schneider of Tucson, Arizona, and an employe of Hyde, was fined \$1,000, and sentenced to one year and two months in the penitentiary.
