THREE-STORY BLOCK WILL BE BUILT AT COTTAGE GROVE

Messrs. Dunbar & O'Loone will erect a three-story brick building on their property with a basement. Plans are now in preparation, and a thoroughly up-to-date structure will be built. The basement will be of concrete and the three stories of pressed brick. A fine glass front will be put in and an electric elevator and steam heat will also come in with the modern utilities of the store. The basement will contain the grocery department, the ground floor the dry goods and the clothing, the second floor the ladies' ready-to-wear garments and shop shop rooms, and the third floor will contain furniture and carpets. The building, aside from the ground purchase, is estimated will cost between \$5,700 and \$9,000 complete, and will be another substantial improvement to this growing little city. The Garman-Hemenway Co. will move to their newly acquired property about the first of February. Mr. Lincoln will move as soon as he finds a location and workmen will be engaged for construction of the present building, placing in a plate glass front and a balcony around the room. Work on the new brick will commence about the 1st of May, the coming spring, as soon as the weather permits. The present structure will be moved to the side street and Garman-Hemenway Co. will continue doing business in it until their new building is finished. This is an unexpected change in the building contemplated in this city, and with the present building in course of construction and those to start in the spring, a greater activity than the place has ever before seen will have started. Let the good work go on.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SECRETARY OF WAR

The total estimates of the war department for the next fiscal year, as shown by the annual report of the secretary of war, amount to \$189,755,039, an increase of about \$2,000,000 over the appropriations for the present fiscal year. This increase is largely for river and harbor work, and other public works of a civil character, for which purpose about \$24,000,000 is asked. Of this balance, about \$10,500,000 is an additional estimate for the support of the army, military academy and the militia. For military public works, such as fortifications, arsenals, military posts, etc., the estimates call for an increase of \$17,800,000.

The secretary of war especially recommends an addition of 612 officers to the army, and also approves a policy for the elimination of the service of all officers who fail to maintain the requisite standard of efficiency. Both of these propositions were before congress at its last session and will be strongly urged this year.

CONSUL MILLER LEAVES FOR CALIFORNIA

Hon. H. B. Miller, U. S. consul general at Yokohama, Japan, after a visit of several weeks in Eugene and Portland, went to Albany today to visit his brother, Hon. F. J. Miller, this afternoon and will leave that city tonight for California to join his family at San Mateo. He expects to leave San Francisco for his post at Yokohama about the first of March.

Mr. Miller, at the station this morning, stated to a Guard reporter that he was sorry his health would not permit of his staying here and visiting his friends longer. He said he was very glad to note the progress that Eugene has made in the past few years and he is reluctant to go back to Japan after seeing the progress that the whole coast is enjoying. He feels like staying to share the prosperity.

MATHEW'S DEATH STILL REMAINS A DEEP MYSTERY

(From Friday's Daily.)
The coroner's inquest over the body of Jacob Mathews, who was found dead Sunday in the cabin on the Walker place between Eugene and Springfield and who was thought to have been murdered, was completed this afternoon. The jury failed to establish the cause of death. They took the testimony of the physicians who examined the contents of the stomach. The physicians reported that there was no trace of poisoning. The jury returned the following verdict:
"We, the jury, say that deceased was Jacob Mathews and his age was 53 years. After considering all the evidence obtainable, we, the jury, say that said Jacob Mathews died from a cause to the jury unknown. We find that said Jacob Mathews died in Lane county, Oregon, on or about the 5th day of December, 1908."

PRUNE DEALERS OBJECT TO RATES

A communication has been received by the railroad commission from A. C. Burdick & Co., large prune packers of Portland, saying that notice has been given to the effect that the rate on dried fruits will be advanced on Oregon lines on the first of the year from the present rate of \$1.00 to \$1.10.
The Burdick people protest strongly on this advance in rates, which are now imposed on the minimum weight cars of twenty tons. During the time when the fruit industry was in its infancy, states the communication, the railroad company solicited the trade of the fruit growers on their freight lines, and gave the minimum weight car of 12 tons, but later they have gradually raised the weight to fifteen tons, and are now compelling the fruit men to take the service of a 20-ton car. It is apparent that the 20-ton car is too large for the dried fruit shipments, which are hardly large enough to properly necessitate so large a car.
The letter also states that the present raise in rates will be largely responsible for the decrease in the fruit business in Oregon, and that at the present time several of the farmers are digging up their trees, unable to meet the circumstances involved through shipments.
The commission has taken the matter under advisement.

CHARLES DAVIS FOUND NOT GUILTY

Omaha, Neb., Dec. 10.—After 13 hours of deliberation the jury in the case of Charles E. Davis, charged with the murder on the morning of Sept. 2 of Dr. Frederick Rustin, this morning brought in a verdict of not guilty and the judge ordered the prisoner discharged. Nineteen ballots were required to reach the agreement.
It is not believed that any further prosecutions will be undertaken in connection with the killing of Dr. Rustin, unless new evidence is discovered.

BERT KELSAY GIVEN PAROLE SENTENCE OF THREE YEARS

Bert Kelsay, a Creswell youth, who pleaded guilty to the charge of perjury a few days ago, was given a parole sentence to the penitentiary of three years by Judge Harris this morning. He gave the boy a good lecture and stated that he allowed him his liberty on the condition that he keep out of trouble hereafter. The judge stated that if he was found intoxicated at any time, frequented saloons or was caught in any crime during the three years he would go to the penitentiary to serve out full time. The boy went to Portland to work, his father, B. S. Kelsay, having secured him a job of driving a team at \$5.00 a day.

Linn and Parsons Not Guilty.
The trial of Tom Linn, charged with selling liquor, was held today. The following jury was chosen: S. B. Jackson, Jr., Thos. Gray, L. M. Tozier, E. S. Frindle, Geo. Fisher, O. W. Brobbam, A. A. Gibson, E. P. Miller, Jas. Humphrey, G. T. Ray, and B. F. Goodpasture.

After the evidence was taken the attorneys for Linn made a motion that the jury be instructed to return a verdict of not guilty. The motion was sustained and the verdict was accordingly.
The jury in the case of the state vs. Zach Parsons, accused of selling liquor on a second count, returned a verdict of not guilty this afternoon at one o'clock after having been out several hours.

BIG INCREASE IN FREIGHT RATES ON NEW YEAR

Washington, D. C., Dec. 10.—Transcontinental freight tariffs, beginning January 1 next, will be advanced on all eastbound traffic by rail and water. The class rates on west bound traffic from the Atlantic seaboard to Pacific Coast points will be increased approximately ten per cent.
